

The total poll tax collected in 1906 amounted to \$25,000. Revenue derived from this source will be much larger this year. as more vigorous efforts have been made to collect money due on poll tax. The total bonded indebtedness of the public schools of the Territory represents \$439,-650. Special taxes of from three mills up have been levied in the various school districts to meet the interest and pay part of the principal.
