Mr. Knight had been asleep probably ten minutes, using an overcoat for a pillow, and his head had slid down against his right shoulder. ## Plant Peanuts.

The Fort worth Record advises the farmers of Texas to plant peanuts and this same advice will
apply equally as well to the farmers of southeastern New Mexico The Record says:
'The peanut thrives best on light, sandy soil and its cultivation is easy. It presents the adadvantage of leaving no waste for the farmer at the time of harvest. The nuts sell for a good price and the vines relieved of the nuts make an excellent hay and leave the ground free of dead vegetation wherein insect enemies of the farmer may hibernate. On the light, sandy lands of the state it would appear that the cultivation of peanuts would be as profitable as the cultivation of cotton. Anyhow, the experiment is going to pay good re turns for all that it costs the farmers, whether they get a good farmers, whether they get a good
crop or not. If they become in-
terested in peanut culture to the extent of trying it, the lesson which the change will teach in diversication will be worth all that will pay just as well. Therein lies the primary benefit of the peanut agitation.

Aside from this, it may be pointed out that there is a rich field for development in side industries in connection with the cultivation of peanuts. The nuts, as everybody knows, are becoming more and more an edible product. Time was when the chief
end of the peanut was to comend of the peanut was to com-
plete the enjoyment of the visitor to the county fair or the circus, and tons of the nuts have been consumed in that manner without thought on the part of the consumer concerning the possibilities of the lowly edible. But now the food artists have evolved most palatable concoctions in
which the peanut is the chief constituent, and some social functions are not considered complete unless dainty viands enriched with peanut butter or pastes are served. Large quantities of these products are served in Texas every day. Pick up one of the bottles containing peanut butter and read the label carefully. You will find that the product was made in Canada or Detroit, Mich., and if you will but think a mo ment you will be compelled to admit that perhaps some of the very peanuts constituting that butter were grown in Texas. In other words, the people of Texas produce the raw material, some other products and sell it to the Texans, and the Texans pay the f eeight both way
'With increased peanut cultivation in Texas, the opportunity for manufacturing plants would multiply and the production of new wealth would be the natura result. And what is true of peanuts is true of many other pro
ducts of the soil that are suscept ducts of the soil that are suscept mous yields in the virgin soil of this state. It's up to the farmers
to plant peanuts and many other products that would materially increase their bank accounts.'

## Brand Book Issued

The New Mexico brand book, issued by the Cattle Sanitary board of New Mexico, showing all the brands on cattle, horses, mules and asses, re-recorded under the provisions of the act approved February 16th, 1899, and all other brands recorded since May 1st, 1899, to December 31st 1906, has reached this office and is a neat little volume of much terest to cattle men
It contains 536 pages of brands and an index of 109 pages, 24,656 brands are recorded in all. Of these 276 are single "A" and 230 letter " J " singly and in combination with other letters, figures and characters there are 2,622 brands, 1,395 are recorded in the simple " S " and with it as the indicative letter, 1,380 in "A"' while " H " has 874 and ' Q " only
48 .

The 24,656 brands are recorded under 18,530 names, 103 under Archuleta, Baca 284, Chavez 497, Gallegos 181, Garcia 321, Gonzales 264, Jones 104, Lopez 159, Lucero 205, Martinez 374, Romero 25 Sanchez 272, and Vigil 170.
The book is a convenient size about $5 \times 8$ and three-fourths of an inch in thickness. It is printed the compiling of it was most exacting work, requiring great care on the part of those in whose enarge it has been and taking the erire time of two persons for The name of $t$
