President Taft President Taft at Washington. However matters were quited answer was received 'requesting Governor Curry to remain in office and expressing confidence in his adminjstration. The gov ernor then withdrew his resignation and will continue for a time as governor of New Mexico. Regarding the cause of Governor curry tendering his resignation, we quote from the Monday's is
sue of the Santa Fe New Mex sue of the Santa
ican, which says:
"The immediate cause for his sudden resolution was a telegram tary of the Interior Ballinger, refusing Governor Curry indireetly permission to come to Washington, to take up with the president and the secretary of the in erior, matters of great importance in the commonwealth, but not appertaining to statehood. While this answer of Secretary is recent on accordance with uncalled order, yet it seemed curry took it as an expression of ack of confidence in him, that he inmediately wired his resignaect upon the qualification of his uccessor.
Governor Curry said this morn ing that he had intended to tenfuture, but he was prompted in resigning a little earlier than he fact that he had telegraphed to Secretary of the Interior Ballinger for permission to go to Washportance to New Mexico and it

## ORDINANCE NO. 12

An ordinance deffining vagrants and providing punishment for
agrancy and other purposes.
Be it ordained by the board of trustees of the town of Portales, New Mexica
Section 1. All persons who are idle and dissolute, and who go
out begging; all persons who use juggling or other unlawtul about begging; all persons who use juggling or other unlawfo drunkards, common street walkers, prostitutes and keepers of houses of prostitution, lewd, wanton and lascivious persons, in
speeech or behayior; common railers and brawlers; all persons who peech or behavior; common railers and brawiers; all persons wo all persons who are idle and dissolute and who neglect all lawful uasiness, and who habitually mis-spend their tme; all persons odging in, or found in the night time in outhouseas, shed parns or unoccupied buildings and not giving a good account of them
selves, and all persons who are known to be theves, burglars piekpockets, either by their own confession or otherwise, or by having been convicted of larceny, burglary, or other erimee against The laws of the territory and having no lawful means of support and found prowling around the
Sec, 2 Any person found guilty of being a vagrant shall be sentenced to pay a fine in the sum or not less than three nor more for a term of not less than infisenment in the town or county jail discretion of the court and if sentenced to jail shall be required to perform labor upon the streets or alleys or pubbic property of the
