### ANOTHER CLOVIS MAN BUYS PORTALES LAND

Lee Hainline Recognizes the Advantages Which the Portales Valley  
Has to Offer to All.

He Buys the Bushong Place Which Was Made to be Irrigated, Lying  
Perfectly for Irrigation.

The W. B. Reid land company, Monday, sold eighty acres of the "Hub" Bushong place, five and one half miles west of Portales, to Mr. Lee Hainline, of Clovis, New Mexico. Mr. Hainline has for the past seven months been weighmaster at the Santa Fe depot and he very frankly states that the practical demonstration of what had been done on some of the irrigated lands of the Pecos Valley during the past few months, put him to thinking, and that the more he thought the more convinced he became that he needed some of this irrigated property. For instance he said that as weighmaster, it was his duty to weigh the contents of freight cars passing through Clovis and, that during certain seasons of the year, he weighed on an average of twenty to thirty cars of alfalfa which had been shipped from the Pecos Valley to points in Tennessee. This, he said, was the circumstance that made him anxious to acquire some irrigated land, and, being acquainted with the nature of our soil and the inexhaustible water supply which underlaid it, made the Portales Valley the most desirable place in the world for him to make his beginning. Also the further fact that we have not the alkali in this valley to contend with which is so prevalent in the other irrigated districts of eastern New Mexico, nor has our lands yet reached that stage of development which demands a prohibitive price for their acquisition, however, the time is very short when any of it will be sold under the two hundred dollar mark.

The place was surveyed and the levels taken last Monday afternoon, and the entire eighty acres showed only a variation of ten inches between the extreme high and low points or, in other words, taking the highest point, which was the northwest corner, the land sloped from there in all directions to the land line, uniformly to the lowest place, the lowest place being exactly ten inches lower than the northwest corner, or highest place, barely enough fall to allow the water to flow freely. Mr. Hainline located his well and has contracted for the drilling, also he is in the market for the power to operate his pump.

This place will be put in alfalfa grapes and apples just as soon as the land can be broken out and put in the proper condition for their cultivation. Also this gentleman has a bunch of twenty-eight good brood mares and will raise mules in connection with his fruit farm.

This does Portales get another of Clovis' very best and most

well to do and influential citizens and Portales is extremely happy to welcome Mr. Hainline and his family to our midst.

#### Ben Smith Puts Out Orchard.

Ben Smith, secretary of the Portales Irrigation company, and his brother-in-law, Flue Anderson, of Bethel, are planting forty acres of orchard on their home place some nine or ten miles from town.

The trees came in some few days ago and since they arrived the whole neighborhood around Bethel has certainly been busy. Mr. Anderson is superintending the planting of these trees and no doubt they will give a perfect stand as this gentleman is thoroughly drilled in tree planting, having not only studied it but having had practical experience before.

The trees are being set just twice as thick as it is intended they shall remain when grown, but who do you think will have the nerve to go and cut down such fine trees as the Portales valley grows, even if they do realize that they are too thick. The way they stand at present is fifteen by thirty feet and when they are thinned they will stand thirty by thirty.

The stock put in to stay consisted of four hundred and sixty Johnnathans, four hundred and sixty York Imperial, four hundred and sixty Black Ben Davis, and six hundred and sixty Stark's Delicious. The fillers were eight hundred King David and seven hundred Champions. Fifty summer apples and one hundred plum trees were also put out in the orchard, covering a total of over forty acres of land.

#### The Lima Bean Profitable.

After investigating the lima bean industry of the county it has been ascertained that the lima is a prolific bearer in this section and that no one should fail to put in some of these beans. From all accounts it seems that there are two varieties that are best for this section and they are the Henderson Dwarf and the King of the Garden or some similar pole bean. The Burpee Bush is also stated as being a prolific yielder but not so early as the Henderson.

The main difference in the pole and bush bean seems to be only in the vine and there is very little difference so far as yield is concerned. But since there are few rail fences in this part of the universe and not very many trees or something similar to tain the pole beans on it seems that the bush beans would be preferable for this valley. Again the wind would not hurt the bush like it would the pole and this is another point in favor of the bush bean.

Don't be afraid to plant them for fear that there will be no market for them because you must remember that the farmers are at last organized and will have a market for everything that is raised in the valley if there is a market for it in the world. Of course this does not mean that there will be a market for the lima beans in the green state but it is probable that there will be a market for some of them as green beans, especially the earliest ones.

### MOUNDAY WRITES IN REGARD TO FACTORY

He States That a Bill is Now Before the Senate the Passage of Which  
Will Stop Building of Factories.

And it Will Also Mean Practical Closing of the Factories Now  
Running. They Ask Help in Defeating Bill.

A joint letter from the officials of the American Sugar Manufacturing and Refining company states that the prospect for the beet sugar factory for the Portales Valley has in no wise been abandoned, but that on the contrary every effort is being put forth to make it an assured fact. The one and only obstacle in the way of immediate construction work is the pending adverse legislation now before the congress of the United States. Mr. MounDay says very frankly that if sugar is put on the free list that installation work on new factories would be discontinued and that those plants now in operation would be compelled to shut down.

These people are as much injured, if not more by this condition as our own people and will be much the heavier losers should they be forced through this vicious legislation to abandon the manufacture of beet sugar entirely. There has never been any question as to the good faith of Mr. MounDay and associates and they could not possibly have foreseen that congress would attempt to put the product of their mills on the free list. It is to be hoped that these matters will soon be cleared up and the readers of the Times are assured that actual construction work will begin on the Portales Valley plant immediately if the tariff is not taken off from the beet sugar.

Six cups sugar, one and one half cups syrup, one and one half pints of cream or new milk. Cook until it makes a soft ball when tried in cold water, stir all the time, add one lb. English walnuts and beat till creamy and pour into buttered pans.

Who said onions? Portales valley is getting ready an immense acreage for the fall trade and the secretary of the Portales Cantaloupe and Produce Association says he has the markets for all the farmers can raise.

And now there is a widow woman in Portales who got "Sven-galed" on the patent oil burner graft to the tune of \$500.00, represented by a mortgage on her homestead for that amount. How long, men, are you going to stand for this business?

As a means of separating a man, or woman, from their money, easily, rapidly, thoroughly and without having to give anything in return for it, the patent oil burner graft has the blue sky peddler skinned more ways than a farmer can whip a mule, even though the mule's name was "Maud."

Are the farmers of the Portales valley behind the times? Well we should say not. They have organized an incorporation which will in the course of a short time be one of the greatest business concerns in the west and is at present one of the largest undertakings in the eastern part of New Mexico.

Here is still another that will make some of you sit up and take notice. The Portales Cantaloupe and Produce Association is perfecting arrangements whereby they will be able to handle a car of green beans every week instead of shipping them out by the ton per day as they had originally intended to do. Rogers wants to sign up for a great deal of this acreage.

Have you heard the sweet potato call yet? If not you are behind. The Cantaloupe and Produce Association have been notified by their members that there will be an acreage which will produce from thirty to fifty cars of the sweet spuds and the Association has in turn notified the farmers that they will have a market for all the potatoes they raise, whether thirty or two hundred cars.

Every person who is interested in the proposed beet sugar plant in the Portales Valley is earnestly requested to write to Senators A. B. Fall and T. B. Catron asking them to use every effort at their command to defeat the proposed abolition of the tariff on beet sugar. This is necessary at this time by reason of the fact that should this tariff be removed there will be no more beet sugar factories erected in the United States and thus will Portales lose a three million dollar industry. Attend to this matter at once.

Adjutant General A. S. Brookes was Tuesday reappointed as such adjutant general by Governor William C. McDonald. There is not, probably, another

as well qualified gentleman in the state and none better qualified in the United States, to fill this responsible position as is General Brookes, and Governor McDonald made a very wise as well as non-political appointment in this instance. General Brookes is a perfect soldier, an affable gentleman and a tireless worker for the good of the national guard of New Mexico which state is to be heartily congratulated on the fact that it will receive the benefit of his continued services.

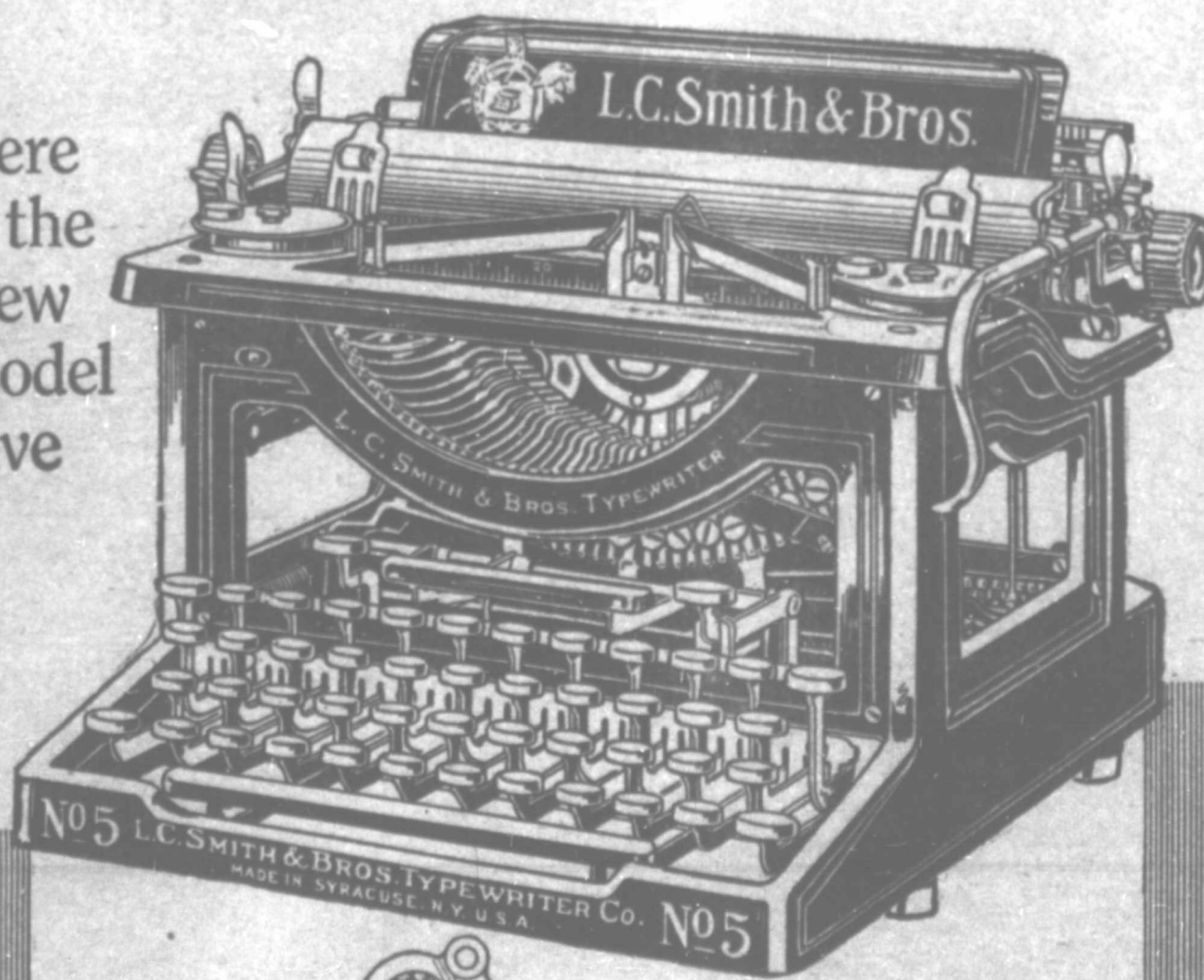
