## FIRST LIONS CLUB SWIM MEET SCHEDULED FOR WEDNESDAY NIGHT

The Dimmitt Lions Club's first annual Swim Meet will be held at the Dimmitt Swimming Pool Wednesday night, August 13, beginning at 8:00 p. m. The event, planned to be held in connection with a beauty contest several weeks ago, was postponed by order of the County Health Officer. Medals ordered for the meet at that time and the tentative arrangements will be used in the meet Wednesday night.

The age groups, both for boys and girls will be the same, in each event.

First and Second place medals will be awarded to the boys diving contest, in two divisions—boys up to 15 years of age and 15 to 20 year of age. Each contender will be allowed to make three dives with his best performance being used in the competition.

In the girls' diving contest the same age groups and regulations will be used as in the boys' contest.

With boys competing against boys and girls against girls, in the swimming contest, the youths up to 15 years of age will compete for first and second place medals, in races 40 yards on back and 40 yard any form.

In the age groups of 15 to 20 years first and second place medals will be awarded in a 40 yard race on back and 500 feet any style.

Judges will be Messrs. Elliston, Kelly and Hudson.

Contestants are urged to register with Mr. Blaine at the swimming pool as soon as possible.

A small general admission charge of 10, and 25 cents will be made.

## Association Recommends Farm Program

A three-point program for farmers and ranchers under today's "high price conditions" was recommended by officers and directors of five production credit associations in annual conference in Amarillo on July 30 and 31, according to R. A. Axtell, a director of the Plainview Association.

First, the group recommended that proper soil conservation practices be followed, Mr. Axtell said. "Good productive land is the best assurance of future income from which to meet expenses and repay debts. The more a farmer or rancher does to protect his soil, the better credit rating he will have with his production credit association. The association can go with him further and stay with him longer if he keeps his land highly productive so he can get a greater income from his operations year after year."

Second, the directors recommended that farmers and ranchers reduce debts while prices are high. Figures were cited showing that in 1919 it took 11 steers weighing 1,000 pounds each to pay a \$1,000 debt. In 1932, it took 24 steers; in 1939-15; in 1941-12; in 1945-8; in 1946-7.

Third, the group recommended that production credit associations complete their job of retiring their government capital. Reports show that on May 31, 1947, the 36 associations in Texas had \$3,856,389 in earned surplus, \$6,227,090 in member-owned capital and the government's investment is down to \$2,455,000.

The Plainview Production Credit Association has 1,007 stockholders, a total earned surplus of \$80,250, and a member-owned stock of \$163,120, with a government capital investment of \$50,000. "Our plans are to repay \$45,000 of this government capital by the end of 1947," Mr. Axtell said.

The association was represented at the Amarillo conference by the following directors: W. A. Painter, Plainview; W. W. Branscum, Muleshoe; D. T. Northcutt, Silvertown; R. A. Axtell, Dimmitt; and by M. R. Snyder, Secretary-Treasurer.

## Remedy For Hot Weather Dangers Given

If your work is such that it causes excessive perspiration add a pinch of ordinary table salt to each drink of water you take, to prevent heat cramps. This is advised by Dr. George W. Cox, State Health Officer, to prevent a possible increase in the number of heat victims in Texas as the thermometer hits 95 degrees and above.

Laborers, mechanics, farmers, and white collar workers whose work causes them to sweat profusely, are in danger of having their body salt content become deficient with resulting heat cramps or heat fog. Salt is a prominent constituent of sweat; the body may lose as high as 40 to 50 grams of salt during hot days.

In industry, a method of preventing heat cramps is to take a tablet of pure salt or a mixture of salt and dextrose with each drink of water. Workmen whose duties require muscular exertion should be especially careful to add more than the usual amount of salt to what they eat and drink.

Heat cramp is characterized by pains (cramps) in the abdominal region, headache, and in severe cases, by nausea and vomiting. The body temperature remains about normal, likewise the pulse rate. Body salt losses occur without the knowledge of the individual until there is a deficiency; then the abdominal muscles begin to cramp.

Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused by sweating.

It is a wise precaution to keep the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramp.

## FRIED CHICKEN FOR NEXT WINTER

Fried chicken can be a year round food for the family table if some of them are saved for the freezer locker, suggests local County Home Demonstration Agent.

She says the young birds are best for fried chicken and getting them ready for freezing is the same as for eating. But, it is easy to pick the chicken if it's dipped into a semi-sealing water for half a minute. This means the water should be about 128 degrees.

Suggestions on freezing include cutting up the chicken into pieces exactly as you would cut them for frying. The next step is to cool the pieces and pack into moisture vapor-proof containers or wrapping paper. Put the amount needed for each meal into a package. Make the package as air-tight a spool. Freeze quickly, and store at zero degrees or lower. If the home freezer is used, the chicken may be killed in the afternoon and frozen that night. If a commercial freezer locker is used, the chicken may be killed in the morning, and taken to the locker early in the afternoon.

## BOYCE HOUSE

Visited Oklahoma City recently to make a speech, first time I'd ever spoke in Oklahoma. Upon strolling out of the hotel soon after arriving, I saw billows of black smoke - a big fire was in progress in the center of the business district.

Next morning I was awakened by a heavy clap of thunder. The Oklahoma city weatherman had predicted "no rain" so all the weather did was to present a electric storm, whip up a 59 mile an hour wind that flattened some temporary buildings and pour down three inches of rain in a couple of hours. In fact, the weatherman missed so badly that I thought I was back in Texas.

The visitor was made to feel like a "visiting fireman" for Fire Chief McAlpine took me on a tour of the city. Half a mile before you get to the capital, there is a row of oil wells on state-owned land. The derrick of the last one is a hundred yards or so from the capitol, but the hole was so curved by directional drilling that the bottom was under the capitol.

In front of that structure is an immense flight of steps. You climb it and then, before you break into a smile of triumph, there is an even more immense flight of steps in front of you. You climb that - and discover that you are on the third floor of the building! The capitol is a very impressive edifice.

One of the biggest thrills in visiting Dallas is to ride the street cars. Lately I've had to go back and forth between the office of Harley Hightower in Oak Cliff (he is the publisher of "cub reporter") and down town Dallas quite a bit; and the street cars cross the trinity on a long trestle like bridge, with a few rises, dips and curves thrown in - negotiated at so lively a pace that it reminds one of the thriller at an amusement park. Look far below and you see cars crawling along a highway, engines puffing through railroad yards and tiny figures of fishermen on the bank of the river. The wheels of the trolley rattle and clatter and it sways up and down and the wind tosses your hair. All this for only 6 cents.

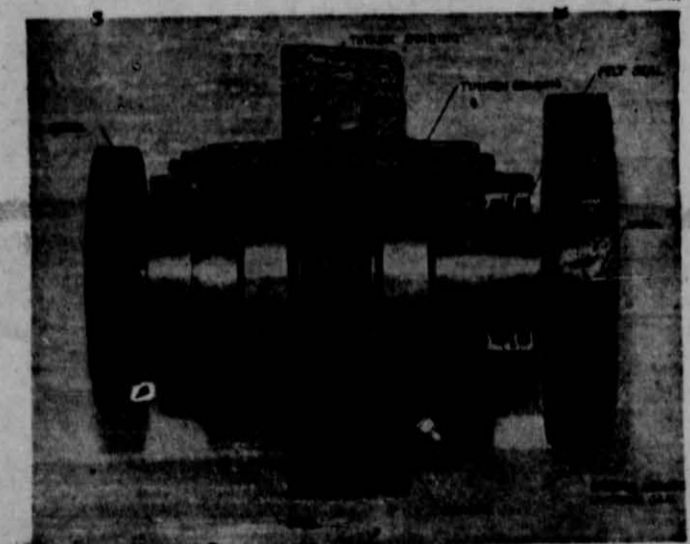

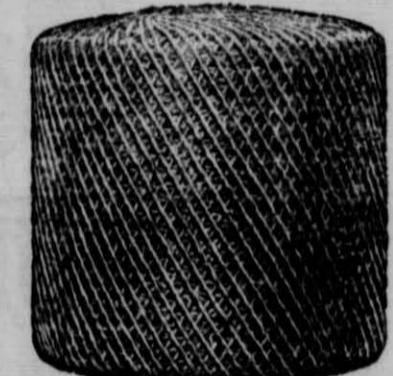

### PICKLED PEACHES

Pickled peaches are one of America's favorite sweet spicy relishes, says Mattie Lee Seago, County Home Demonstration Agent.

The Agent recommends this recipe using 8 pounds of small or medium sized peaches; after peaches are washed and pared, two cloves are stuck in each peach, or the 8 two-inch cinnamon and 2 tablespoons of whole cloves may be tied loosely in a clean, thin, white cloth and placed to cook with 2 pounds of sugar, 1 quart vinegar and 1 cup water for 10 minutes. The peaches are added to the liquid and cooked slowly until tender but not broken. After standing overnight, sirup is drained from the peaches and spices removed. The sirup is boiled rapidly until thickened, and poured over peaches already packed in clean, hot sterile jars. The jars are sealed tightly.

To give time for the flavor to be blended, the jars of peaches should be kept in a cool place for several weeks before serving.

### LAZY DAIZY CAKE

(By Miss Mattie Lee Seago) Sorry to have been so slow getting this recipe for those who are interested. Mrs. Luss of the Flagg community and Mrs. Horace Brooks were kind enough to supply the recipe for your use.

**CAKE**—Eggs, 1 cup sugar. Beat eggs well and add sugar. 1 cup flour, 2 t. baking powder, 1/4 t. salt. Sift flour and measure, combine salt and baking powder and add to mixture above.

1/2 c. milk 2 T. butter. Melt butter in scalded milk and add to above mixture while hot, beat well. Bake about 20 minutes in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.)

**ICING**—While cake is still warm and in pan mix:

5 T. butter, 4 T. cream, 9 T. brown sugar (1/2 cup), 1 cup coconut or nuts (chopped). Bring mixture to boil, pour over cake and brown in oven or broiler. This is delicious and quick.

**CRANBERRY COCKTAIL:**

4 cups cranberries—Cook five minutes and force through sieve. Two-thirds c. sugar

One-third c. lemon juice—Mix and add to above mixture. Chill and serve with ice cubes or serve hot.

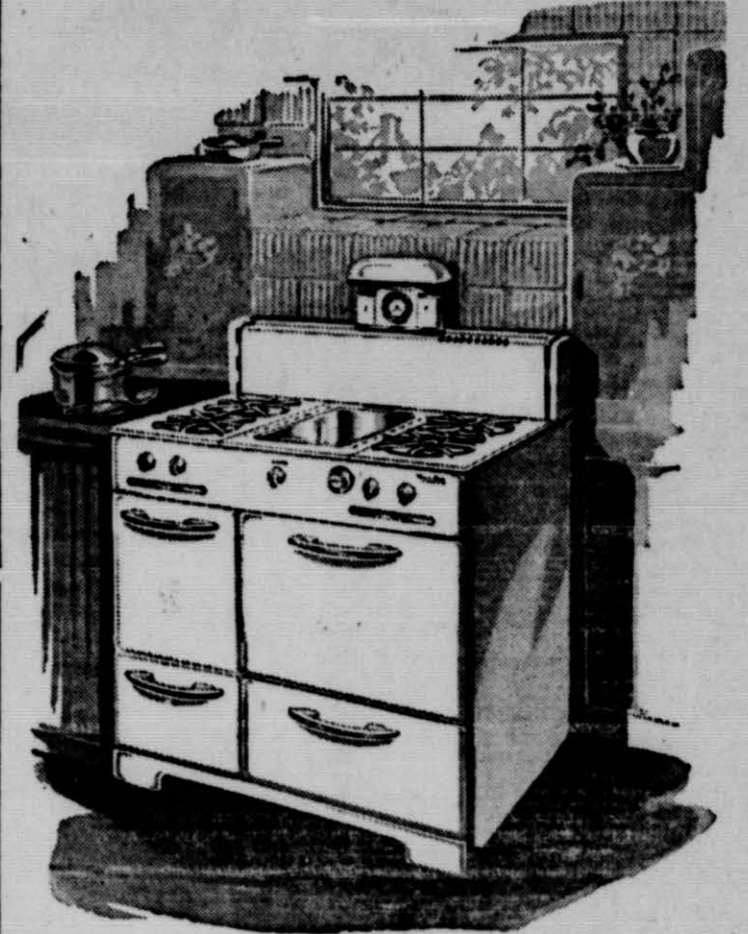
