Salt deficiency may be prevented by taking salt in various ways. Where prepared tablets are not available, table salt may be added to each drink of water. Milk is a source of salt and will help to make up for the deficiency caused

It is a wise precaution to ke the body supplied with salt, and thus avoid much possible suffering and loss of time from heat cramp.


