them to eat before long. Let's take a quick look at what the Republicans have been able to do in their four years in Washington. First off they set out to decrease our surpluses-but now we have on hand about three times the amount of all farm commodities that we had in 1952. Value of these products in 1952 was about \$2.4 billion and the latest figures of October 31, 1956, showed 8.1 billion on hand. Next they were going to cut the farm program cost to the government so naturally we come up with something like this: Cost to the government of all price support operations from October 17, 1933 through December 31, 1952 totaled \$1,064 million. Cost to the government during the first 46 months of President Eisenhower's term of office was \$2,665 million. The Republicans managed to spend 21/2 times as much money on farm supports in four years as the Democrats in 20 and left the nation's farmers in worse

economical shape. Ridiculous? We've got the fig ures right here on our desk. And before all the surplus is liquidated the farm cost for the past four years is apt to be doubled. What if all other Republican government agencies are doing as swell a job as our Department of Agriculture and Secretary of State? This faux pas in govern ment has reached the point that it's not even comical anymore.

There are at least a dozen people, besides ourselves, in Dimmitt who owe Governor emeritus Allan Shivers an apology.

Liberal democrats here, as all over the state, were probably dumbfounded at his appointment of William A. Blakely, a millionaire lawyer from Dallas, to the Senate post formerly occupied by new Governor Price Daniel.






