

## THREE CENT POSTAGE IS LIABLE TO BE USED AGAIN

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Plans for building a new tax law took more definite form today as preparations were completed for the actual beginning tomorrow of revision of the revenue laws by the House leaders propose to do from Chairman Fordney of the committee, and information leaked out indicating that the three cent postage stamp might be restored to as a revenue producer. The return to the three-cent stamp was understood to have been discussed at the conference Saturday between Secretary Mellon and Mr. Fordney. The suggestion will be taken up with the postoffice department before any further moves are made, it was stated.

## HIGH SCHOOL BOND ISSUE

Portales and District No. 1 Will Vote on \$80,000.00 Issue August 27th.

On last Thursday the School Board of the Portales school district met and acted on the petition of the Delphos district asking to come into the Portales consolidated district. The Board accepted the petition and received Delphos into this district and asked the Mayor to call an election for a bond issue of \$80,000.00 for the purpose of building a high school building for Portales.

Elsewhere in this issue will be found the proclamation calling this election for August 27th.

This is a move which puts Portales forward and will make her the best school town in the state. And as to the districts coming into the Portales district, this will give them better school advantages than they can hope to have under the old district school system.

The high school will conduct a department in agriculture and a liberal acreage will be set aside for this purpose.

This move will bring hundreds of new people into the town and county for school advantages and will be a benefit to every resident of the county.

### PREPARE LAND FOR WHEAT

Farmers who are contemplating the planting of wheat this fall are urged to prepare their land at once so as to conserve moisture. E. P. Kuhl, who has made a study of this in several sections of the United States, says that wheat should be planted by August 20th, if possible so as to make good roots while moisture is plentiful. He says that if it grows too rank it can be controlled by grazing. He also advocates the summer fallow system as used in the north west.

## SINGER IS KILLED IN CHURCH OVER ALLEGED FAMILY AFFAIRS

PLAINVIEW, July 25.—Marvin A. Washington, aged forty, married, was shot and instantly killed in the Plomot Methodist church fifty-five miles northeast of here, Saturday night, and E. A. Preston, aged thirty-seven, married, went to Floydada and gave himself up to officers, admitting the shooting it is alleged.

Washington was singing with the choir, and the song had just been concluded. The choir was seated, Preston entering and seating himself in the front row of the choir reservation. As the choir arose to begin the next number, Preston left his chair and turned to Washington, saying, "I am going to kill you—there is the cause!" With these words, with a pistol in his right hand, and a letter thrust towards Washington with his left, Preston is alleged to have fired six shots in quick succession, four of them taking effect, and Washington dying instantly.

## SAYS RAILROADS GET HALF VALUE OF CATTLE FOR SHIPPING

TOPEKA, Kans., July 26.—Railroads are receiving 50 to 60 per cent of the value of cattle shipped to market from Kansas ranches, John A. Edwards, President of the Kansas Livestock Association, told the Public Utilities Commission in the hearing here on an application for reduced freight rates on Kansas shipments. W. J. Todd of Maple Hill, J. R. Crumie of Emporia, and M. C. Campbell of Wichita, three of the most prominent cattlemen of the state testified at the hearing and bore out the Edwards statement. Judge S. H. Cowan, of Ft. Worth, Texas, represented the shippers in the presentation of their case.

## CROPS GOOD BUT WEEDS GROWING TOO

Uncle Polk Williams was in town Tuesday and stated that crops were fine in the Inez community, but that weeds were also growing, and that the farmers were having to make a hard fight to exterminate them. He says that grass is the best he ever saw it.

## SAVE BREEDING CATTLE AND STEERS WILL TAKE CARE OF THEMSELVES SAYS STOCK MAN

"Save the breeding cattle, the steers will take care of themselves," said an Amarillo cattleman, Saturday in speaking of the conditions that face the livestock industry. "The fifty million dollar pool will not greatly aid the industry for several reasons. In the first place it is not but about one tenth of what is needed. I could loan the entire amount to cattlemen in the Panhandle. The cowman who has a 25 per cent equity in his cattle and the balance well secured has never been unable to secure money on cattle. The interest rate will aggregate I believe about ten per cent and I am of the opinion that there is not a man in the Panhandle who can raise cattle and pay that for his money."

He is saved within five years the people of America will be crying for beef but there will be no beef. I know of many little men who have already shipped their cows to market and many more who will ship theirs this fall. They are the boys who must be helped. The steers will take care of themselves.

"Personally I have never been able to see why the banks of the country preferred loans on steers to loans on young cattle and cows. The breeding stock will produce enough in time to pay it out, while if the market is bad for two months during the summer the man with a loan on steers suffers exceedingly. I believe that the time is near at hand when the banks of the country will realize that the best loans are the loans to the man who has a herd of breeding cattle. When that time does come it seems to me that conditions will be greatly improved in the cattle business."—Amarillo Tribune.

## FORDNEY TARIFF BILL TO RAISE COMMODITY PRICES

WASHINGTON, July 25.—Disagreements of experts as to the practicability of American valuation provisions, proposed in the Fordney tariff bill, marked the first consideration given the measure today by the Senate finance committee. The committee heard statements by Thomas W. Page, chairman, and William Burgess, a member of the tariff commission, but their views differed widely as to what effect the suggested basis of levying import duties would have on the consumer on the one hand and on the manufacturer and merchant on the other.

Mr. Page contended the new plan meant higher prices on American commodities which compete with imports subjected to the import tax, while his colleagues held that pyramiding of prices was not more likely to result under the home value basis than under the present system of assessing duties on the foreign plan. Designedly the American valuation plan is to defeat under valuation of imports, and gather more revenue.

"Lovers of pleasure more than God" go to the base-ball game instead of church—go to picture shows instead of prayer-meeting. Why? They love pleasure more than they love God.

God says "From such turn away"—but this crowd "will not endure sound doctrine." These "wells without water, clouds that are carried with the tempest" who "speak great swelling words of vanity" would tell you that the "world is growing better." But it is all bosh!

**NEW MEXICO FARM NOTES FOR WEEK ENDING JULY 21ST**

The price for products grown by the farmers of the state on July 15th, averaged as follows: Hogs \$8.00, beef cattle \$5.00, veal \$7.75, sheep \$5.00, and lambs \$6.50, all per hundred pounds (live weight); milk 38 cents per gallon; wool 12 cents and chickens 20 cents per pound; beans \$2.80, sweet potatoes \$2.00, alfalfa seed \$7.50 and grain sorghum 45 cents per bushel; eggs 20 cents per dozen; alfalfa hay \$10.00, broom corn \$50.00 and cotton seed \$20.00 per ton. The market is dull, and generally shows a decline for most products from last month's prices.

The attention of county Farm Bureau marketing agents is directed to the fact that the Asst. Chief of Staff for Military Intelligence of the Eighth Army Corps Area of Fort Sam Houston, Texas, wishes to know the location of marketable crops in the state, with a view of purchasing supplies for the maintenance of troops. J. L. Crossley, Moriarty, New Mexico, wants a car of corn in bags.

The State Corporation Commission has requested this office for estimates of crop production, and farm prices, to be used in a hearing to be held August 15th, before the Interstate Commerce Commission, in an effort to secure freight rate reduction on hay and grain in New Mexico.

Weather conditions have been favorable for all crops and ranges. Local showers have relieved the drought condition in Grant, Luna, Hidalgo and Sierra counties. Crop prospects, ranges and livestock conditions were never better for the whole state.

**Chaves County**—Wheat yielding from 25 to 40 bushels. Second cutting of alfalfa "rank" and selling at \$7 to \$12 for the best. Shearing completed and considerable wool selling.

**Gurry County**—Row crops in fine shape, pastures and livestock excellent. Wheat \$1.00 per bushel. Poor market for livestock, and last year's grain. Disease among chickens at St. Vrain, causing heavy losses.

**Grant, Luna, Hidalgo and Sierra Counties**—Having many local

showers with greatly improved conditions. Cattle poor, but ranges "greening." Water for stock yet scarce in some localities. Few farmers planting late crops following rains July 15th. In Deming, the Irish Cobler potato is yielding well and the quality is good, but freight rates too high for shipping with profit.

**Quay County**—Plenty of rain crops and ranges good. Some farmers still planting fodder crops. All crops late and will suffer if the frost comes early. Acreage about average. Prices low. Demand light.

**Torrance County**—Lots of local showers. Some hail damage to wheat. Crops, ranges and stock in fine shape.

**Union County**—Wheat cutting about over. Good yield with price of \$1.00 to \$1.10. Crops and livestock in excellent condition. Fat cows 4 cents per pound, hogs 6½ cents. No sale for wool.

The general Jersey situation was discussed in an informal way by the members present and it was agreed that the dairy cow business is to enjoy reasonable prosperity in the immediate future just as it is standing the attacks of depression now. Today Roosevelt county is probably in as good condition as any county in the state and it is felt by the Jersey breeders that this condition exists largely because of the steady incoming cream checks to the dairyman and particularly to the Jersey man.

Most members present expressed themselves as favoring the bringing in of registered Jersey

calves and the organization of clubs to take them. It was not deemed advisable, however, to start such a movement until the recently organized pig clubs have their stock placed and are on a secure footing.

DEMOCRATIC IN POLITICS

WILL THE DAYS OF THE  
CATTLE TRAIL COME BACK?

A press headline states that Colorado stockman beat freight rates by driving cattle to market. This brings back to the memory of the old timer when the herds were driven overland to Wichita and Kansas City markets.

In those days the freight rates on livestock did not bother the ranchman. In the spring the cattle were gathered and started for market and in the fall they reached their destination fat and ready for market. What would be the result if New Mexico stockmen should combine their herds and drive them through instead of shipping? If grass could be secured enroute as it was forty years ago, the railroads would be forced to see the justice of reducing freight rates, so that the grower would have a little left. But today the drive would be impossible owing to the settled condition of the country. Wheat farms have taken the place of the broad plains of grass land. The herds would be confined to lanes, and would soon be leg weary and starve for grass and water.

This is a day of steam and electricity, and the old time conditions have passed away. The white face, which has long been king of the range, is giving way to the dairy herds, and the big pastures to the farmer. Prosperity has not flown. She is still here awaiting the wooing of the individual or community, which ever is willing to get into the collar and do his or their part to promote, support and meet the conditions as they arise today.

This cannot be done by howling about hard times. Do your part and make the drive with the same perseverance that the cowman of 40 or 60 years ago did when he started to market with his herds.

The future of the meat supply is in peril. Train loads of young calves pass through daily going to the markets, which fact will react on the meat supply of the country in the next few years. The cow and the heifer have never had their proper value considered in financial circles. The steer has always held preference with the money lender, and now that the calf crop is going to slaughter, where is the future supply coming from? It would be well for the financial interests of the country to get together and formulate some plan whereby the breeding stock of the future may be conserved.

Have you noticed how the real big merchants of the cities have increased their advertising? The successful merchant increases his advertising space when business is dull and hard to get. The small merchant too often yields to the temptation of cutting his advertising in dull times, believing that he is "saving expenses." It is the most expensive "saving" he can undertake. He is cutting the heart out of his business and sooner or later will succumb to the merchant who has vision enough to keep after the business during hard times.—Randall Co. (Tex.) News.

The News is in receipt of a bulletin from the Southern Pacific Railway announcing that this company has reduced the freight rates on fish oil, nut oil and whale oil from California to points east of Chicago. This is good news to the people of Roosevelt county and now it only remains for them to drive the fish and whales of Roosevelt county to California, where they can be rendered into oil for shipment to points east of Chicago. The nuts of the county could be used as herders and rendered up also.

The interest in a community canning plant continues to grow. It now looks as if Portales will have a 5,000 can a day capacity plant before the potato crop is gathered this fall. If Portales canned potatoes equal in flavor

the cured variety, Portales Valley will be world famed in a short time.

The Republicans of Roosevelt county have organized a Bursum Club. The Democrats of the county will organize a "this is how it happened" club in the latter part of September. Strange what interest they are taking in the coming senatorial election.

With the increasing dairying and cream production of Roosevelt county, the time is drawing near when there will be a need for a condenser in the Portales Valley to take care of the skimmed milk. This is a valuable product and with a condenser would add many dollars to the till of the dairyman.

Tariff and taxation work really has been started by Congress says a late report from Washington. Comforting indeed. A special session was called for that purpose three months ago. No doubt Republicans are proud of their record for achievements.—Amarillo Tribune.

There seems to be considerable criticism of the town marshal for the enforcement of the town ordinances. The News does not attempt to pass on the town ordinances as to whether they are just or unjust, but an officer is supposed to enforce the law as it is written, and should have the support of the entire public in this enforcement. If a law or ordinance is unjust, then it is the duty of the citizenship to get behind the lawmakers, be they state or municipal, and bring such a pressure to bear that the objectionable law will be repealed. Laws are made for the protection and not for the purpose of harassing the public.

be used, 1st basal must be used first, 2nd basal second and 3rd basal must be used last.

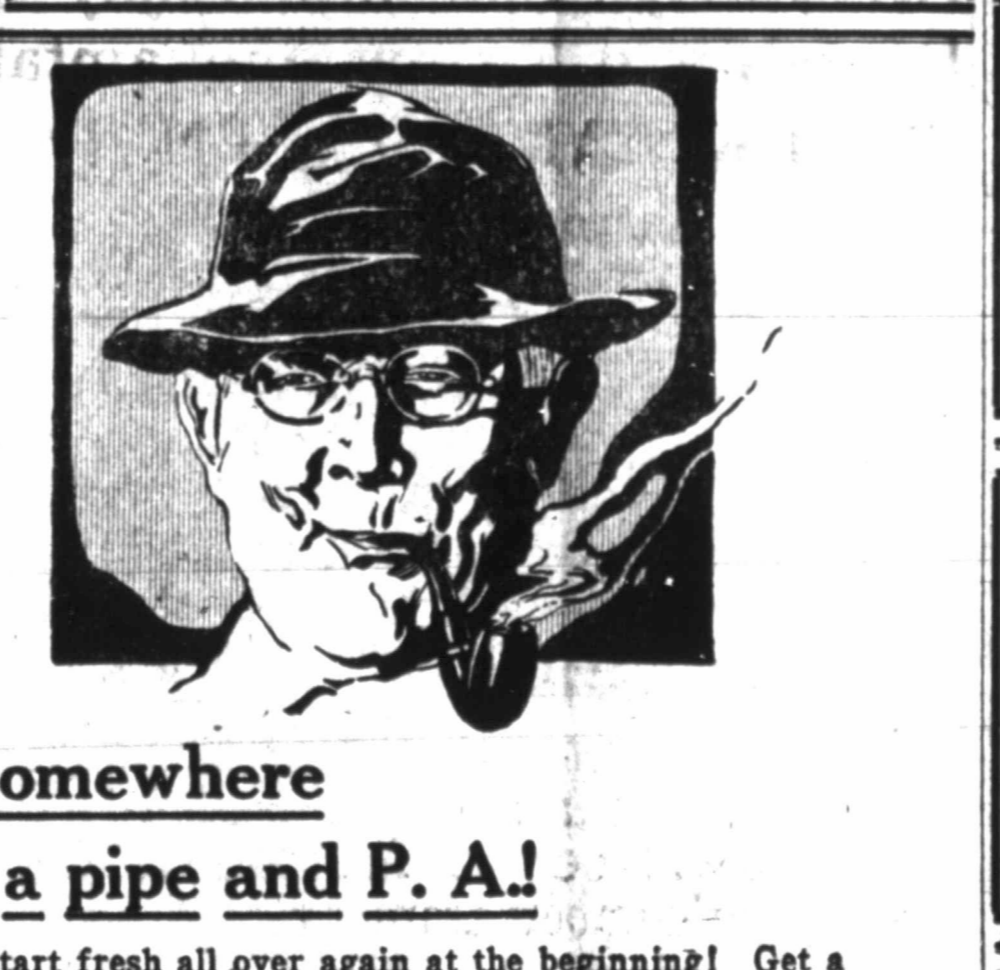

This year arrangements have been made with the Civil Service Commission to hold this preliminary examination on October 29, 1921, at convenient points. Those desiring to avail themselves of this opportunity should write me well in advance of that date so that the Commission can be advised.

The requirements of admission to the Academy are that candidates must be of good moral character, physically sound, well formed, and of robust constitution. Height shall not be less than 5 feet 2 inches between the ages of 16 and 18 years, and not less than 5 feet 4 inches between the ages of 18 and 20 years, and the minimum weight at 16 years of age shall be 111 pounds with an increase of not less than 3 pounds for each additional year, or fraction of a year over one-half. Candidates must be unmarried, and must be not less than 16 years of age nor more than 20 years of age on April 1st of the calendar year in which they enter the Naval Academy.

Upon nomination, candidates will be required to take the mental examination given by the Academy on the third Wednesday in February or the third Wednesday in April, or they may be accepted by certificate from a recognized school. The physical examination is usually given the first week in June. Upon these examinations depend the candidate's admission to the Academy.

The applicant must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of New Mexico. In writing he should give his full name, the date and place of birth, past residence, length of residence in New Mexico, height and weight, education and naval training if any, and a small photograph of himself, if possible.
