
PAVING IN LAS GRUCES TO START FEBRUARY 15 WILL COST OVER \$20,000

Las Cruces, Jan. 16.—Announce ment has been made that the paving contract which was let some time ago, will be started about the middle of the coming month, or as soon as the present work is completed. This will make a total of over \$60,000 worth of paving that has been done in the city in the past six months and will give the city some of the finest streets to be found in the southwest. When all the work is completed practically all of the principal streets of the city will be paved and the main street will be one of the widest paved streets in the state.

RUMORS OF AN ICE PLANT

Rumors are afloat that Portales is to have an ice plant. That probably has nothing to do with the supply of ice which has been plertiful all over town the past few days.

In this chart is shown graphically the relation between New Mexico's increasing governmental costs and the state's taxpaying ability. It will be seen that population increased only 10 per cent, and the assessed valuation of property 110 per cent, during the ten year period 1910 to 1920. It is probably that the increase in the actual wealth of the state increased at a ratio considerable less than that of assessed valuation. While these evidences of taxpaying ability show such moderate increases, we find the total cost of operating state, county and municipal government, including roads and schools, increased 271 per cent., the total taxes levided for all purposes increased 231 per cent. and the total of all oustanding bonds increased 140 per cent. The disbursements of the state which are, of course, included in the total costs of government increased 473 per cent, and the state disbursments for educational purposes also included in the total show an increase of 538 per cent. The taxes levied in 1910 for all purposes amounted to \$3,400,000 and in 1920 to \$11,250,000. We invreased our total bonded indebtedness from \$6,500,000 in 1910 to \$15,625,000 in 1920 for state, county, municipal and school district purposes. In 1910 we spent for all state, county and municipal purposes in cluding schools and roads \$3,500,000, and in 1920, \$13,000,000.

DOES ADVERTISING PAY?

Advertising Recess.

After reading this article you of having parties name dafter n write your own answer. Denver Grocer reports that the publication of two large firms illustrates clearly what happens when advertising campaigns are suddenly shut off on the grounds of being needless expense. The first example is that of A. & P. Pears, the British Soap makers, whose product was made familiar all over the world by persistent and clefer advertising. Because their factory was selling all it could produce, the Pears people decided to cut off the advertising as useless expenditure. For a period of six months it was cut off, at which time Pear dropped 35 per cent of its total business. It cost the concern \$6,500,000 additional publicity to get back to where it was before the gap occurred. The other instance is that of the Quaker Oats company, whohave just disclosed the fact that in one year they hopped-skippedjumped and fell from a profit of more than \$3,700,000 to a loss of more than \$5,800,000. This reduced the Quaker Oats company's surplus from more than \$11,500,-000 to about \$1,200,000. In other words a depreciation in surplus of approximately one thousand per cent. From Amarillo Tribune-The contract for the paving of the unpaved sections of Van Buren Street between Sixteenth and Twenty-fourth Streets has been awarded by the City Commission to the Plains Paving Co., of Amarillo, it was announced Tues-

day by J. G. Colby, city manager. The contract price for the city's one-third of the paving on that street was \$18,111. The property owners on each side of the street are to pay the remaining two-thirds of the cost.

Work of laying the pavement on Van Buren Street has been in progress for some time, but the portion which has already been completed and opened for use was done under the "cooperative plan," the city paying its share of the cost by doing the excavating, hauling and grading. 

"We are importing at the rate of about \$300,000,000 worth of foreign goods per month into the United States," declares Congressman J. W. Fordney, Chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee. "Most of those goods could be made here. There is not a manufactured article." There is not a manufactured article There is not a manufactured article produced in the United States in which the labor cost is less than 90 per cent. of the total cost—I mean, following the raw material from start to finish. Now, if that is true, of the \$300,000,000 that we are send-ing abroad each month to have foring abroad each month to buy for-eign made goods, \$250,000,000 is going out from the people of the United States to employ German, French, English, Japanese and Chi-nese labor, while our laborers are walking the streets in idleness.


