#### PLANTS UP IN FRAME GARDEN AT COURT HOUSE

The Frame Garden on the Cour House lawn has plants up. The winds blew, the sand piled in, the temperature dropped, yet plucky plants have proudly reared their heads above the ground.

The frame garden has lettuce radishes, spinach, swiss chard, carrots, and beets planted.

Quick maturing vegetables such as Tendergreen mustard, Black Seeded Simpson lettuce, Scarlet and Double Curled parsley will be ready to eat 30 to 60 days fro planting time. Where the size of the frame garden is limited the vegetable seed planted should be

chosen largely from this class. King of Denmark Spinach, Lucui tural Beans, and Alaska English peas take 60 to 80 days and are classified as moderately quick maturing vegetables.
