

Whistleblower suit headed for mediation

A whistleblower lawsuit brought against the City by Muleshoe by former city police officer Chris Lopez is headed for mediation.

Representatives from both to trial sides are scheduled to meet Tuesday in Lubbock with a third-party mediator to try and hash out an agreement.

It will be the first sit-down meeting between the two parties since the lawsuit was filed in Austin two years ago.

"Hopefully both sides can give a little and we can get this behind us," said Muleshoe City Manager James Fisher, who will attend the meeting along with two lawyers representing the city.

Fisher met in executive session with the City Council earlier this week to discuss the

He said mostly they discussed the mediation process and the pros and cons of going

Mediation is a requirement in Travis County before a lawsuit can go to trial.

In April, a Travis County judge denied a motion by the City to have the case dismissed. The City had petitioned the court for a summary judgement, which means the plaintiff must supply enough proof of wrongdoing to warrant holding a trial.

Lopez was fired in June of 1995, about a week after a traf-

County awards fuel bid

The Bailey County Commissioners Court Monday awarded its yearly fuel contract to Bailey County Propane.

Bailey County Propane had the lowest bid among four local contracts to provide the County with diesel fuel and unleaded gasoline. The bids are based on profit margins because of the constant change in the fuel market.

Others bidding were Dale Oil, Western 66 and Morrison

Last year, the County used slightly more than \$59,000 worth of fuel.

In other action Monday, Commissioners also approved the purchase of equipment to replace and relocate an emer-

gency radio signal tower. The County and the City of Muleshoe will share the \$7,532 cost of installing a new repeater system, which is used to relay radio calls by emergency per-

Even before a June lightning storm knocked out the old system, emergency personnel had trouble communicating by radio in the southern and western most sections of Bailey County.

The County will also approved the purchase of a transmitter for the Sheriff's Office at an approximate cost of \$800 as part of the upgrade.

LUBBOCK — The cash- interest loan from the Department of Agriculture, will go toward a \$29.4 million debt owed to the Farm Credit Bank and regional Production Credit Associations.

The eradication foundation was \$37 million in debt when the state Supreme Court declared the program was unconstitutional in May.

The program was revived and restructured during the recent State Legislature and now comes under the direction of the Texas Department of Agriculture.

The old obligation was overhauled into a \$29.4 million debt July 7.

The legislation created six statutory zones in the state, including two on the High Plains. Each zone votes whether it wants to join the foundation.

No voting date has been scheduled yet for the Northern High Plains zone, which includes Bailey and Parmer Counties.

Beginning in 1978 with Virginia, states across the South have instituted eradication programs and reduced their numbers dramatically.

Test scores continue on rise

Muleshoe Independent School District students continue to show overall improvement on the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills tests, with elementary school reading scores the only red flag among the 1997 results.

MISD Superintendent Bill Moore was generally pleased with the results, which he released during Monday's school board meeting.

"There are areas — as always — that we need to focus on," Moore said. "We're continuing to see improvement overall. We just have to work out some blimps as we go along."

Discussing the results with the Board, Moore concentrated on 51 categories that broke down the results into demographics and individual scores for reading, writing and math.

Improvement was seen in 61 percent of the subgroups. Most pleasing was the overall math scores, said Moore, which showed improvement

in 75 percent of the groups.

On a broader scale, the number of students that passed all three tests improved in four of the seven grade groups.

The sixth grade, with a 13 percent improvement to 78 percent, made the biggest jump.

The third grade and eight grades both showed the biggest decreases, at five percent.

The most disturbing part of the results was that third-grade reading scores dropped in all three demographic groups, and in the fifth grade they dropped dramatically in two of the three

At the fifth-grade level, reading scores plummeted 20 percent for Hispanics and 17 percent for economically disadvantaged students.

"It's something that has us concerned and

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State accepting bids for new **EQIP** program

TEMPLE— Bailey and Parmer County farmers and ranchers may apply for the new Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP) from now until Aug. 1.

The new conservation program, a result of the 1996 Farm Bill, offers producers with serious soil, water, and other natural resource problems technical, financial and educational assistance.

According to John P. Burt, State Conservationist for USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), EQIP is not like other pervious conservation programs because it is limited to livestock or agricultural production that can provide the greatest environmental benefits at the least cost to the program.

Twelve Geographic Priority Areas (GPA), encompassing 167 counties, are the primary target for over \$8.7 million EQIP funds allocated to Texas.

Officials have earmarked a little more than \$600,000 to the priority area comprised of 13 counties, including Bailey and Parmer.

Applications would be prioritized after Aug. 1.



The free telephone service linked ranchers looking for hay with suppliers nationwide willing to donate or sell it.

"Farmers and ranchers have always jumped in to help other producers in time of need,"

Perry said. "The hotline was a great example of producers helping producers.'

During the height of the drought, two or three TDA employees spent eight hours a day answering hotline phones. Calls peaked at 3,683 in May 1996 and averaged 1,957 a month between May and August.

TDA supplied ranchers with a list of hay suppliers broken down by state. Suppliers were also listed on TDA's Internet web site.

Six months ago TDA stopped accepting our-of-state calls on the hotline, limiting the service to in-state hay providers.

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PGC executive director Johnson retires

When Donald A. Johnson joined the staff of the Plains Cotton Growers, Inc. almost four decades ago, a blight had damaged the reputation of the region's top money crop.

High Plains cotton was stigmatized as a low quality fiber.

The PCG, organized just

four years before Johnson came on board in 1960 as a field representative, intensified a quality improvement program that eventually led to some of the producer group's hallmark achievements.

Johnson, who has served on advisory panels for U.S. presidents and secretaries of agriculture and a delegate and producer advisor to International Cotton Advisory Committee meetings, retired July 1 as executive leader of the 15,000 member PCG.

Fortunately he plans to remain active in the cotton industry and in PCG endeavors.

One of Johnson's first jobs in working with farmers and ginners was on quality improvement. The program, still an integral part of PCG activities, over the years has dramatically elevated the market position of High Plains cotton. "We have much better varieties now," Johnson points out, spinning performance of High "and that didn't come about by accident."

The Plains Cotton Improvement committee, established in the mid-1980s in collaboration with area cotton warehouse leaders as an adjunct of the PCG program, supplied fund for expanded plant breeding and research that brought higher-yielding, higher-quality varieties.

High Plains cotton today is known around the world for its fiber strength and quality characteristics especially suitable for open-end spinning.

But back in the early 1960s, critics castigated the high Plains as producing an unwanted fiber that was contributing disproportionately to the building of an all time high U.S. cotton surplus.

A nationally known industry official declared in comments widely reported in trade publications that a way to solve the cotton crisis was to get the High Plains out of the cotton

The PCG stepped up grants to the Textile Research Center at Texas Tech University. The grants were used to conduct independent studies on the

Plains cotton.

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Improved yields hike Texas wheat estimate by 15 percent Figagement

AUSTIN — The 1997 Texas winter wheat crop is forecast at 118.9 million bushels, up fifteen percent from' last month as a result of improved yields and an increase in acres for harvest. The July 1st estimate is fifty-seven percent above both last year's production and the 1995 crop.

According to a July 1st sur-

vey conducted by the Texas Agricultural Statistics Service, statewide yield is expected to average twenty-nine bushels per acre, up three bushels from last year and up one bushel from last month. Harvested acreage, at 4.1 million acres, is expected to be up forty-one percent from 1996 and up eleven percent from the June

1st forecast.

Production on the Northern High Plains is forecasted at 49.0 million bushels, up fortyfour percent from last year and nineteen percent above last month.






