WE NOTE WITH growing irritation the tendency among many to change the designation of July 4 from Independence Day to some other term -- such as Loyalty Day or the like.

July 4 is the annual observance which marks one of the most important events in the world's long history -- the American Declaration of Independence.

Heaviest amounts in the county were in the Cross Plains area where totals ranged from 4 to 4.50 inches. Clyde received more than 1.50 inches of moisture and Eula received about an inch. Amounts were lighter at Baird and Putnam, where .70 and .60 of an inch, respectively, fell.

Callahan County has had oil production of some variety since 1923. From the first well through 1963, wells in the county had produced some 45,875,000 barrels of oil.

Texas as a whole has produced more than 27 billion barrels of oil during the past 69 years of recorded production. Oil income in the state has averaged about \$3 billion a year in recent years, according to Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Assn.

Only 51 of the state's 254 counties have no crude oil production at present.

"The widespread development of production in all sections of the state has been fostered by the state's oil and gas conservation laws," James L. Sewell, president of the association, said.

WWI Veterans Meet Aug. 12

The first reunion was held in 1959 in the home of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Shanks, and was designed for World War I veterans living in Callahan County. But interest in the event grew rapidly and it was opened to all interested veterans and moved to the Legion Hall to provide more space.

Veterans and their families from many parts of Texas are expected for the event.

oil the Texas Railroad Commission has encouraged development of resources in every sector -- both in drilling and in the building of a transportation system to get the oil to refineries," he said.

There are 35 counties in Texas which produces 25,000 barrels of oil or more per day. The three largest are Andrews County, 195,000 barrels per day; Ector, 164,000 barrels per day; and Crane, 114,000 barrels per day.

Gregg County is the only one in Texas which has produced more than two billion barrels of oil. Ector and Rusk has produced over one billion prior to 1965, and Andrews County celebrated its billionth barrel this year.

By way of comparison, here are production figures on counties around Callahan:

Shackelford Tops Shackelford has had production since 1910, produced about 10,000 barrels a day and some 3,657,000 barrels per year. Total production to Jan. 1, 1964 was 97,082,000 barrels.

Taylor County has had production since 1929, produces about 12,700 barrels per day and had 4,640,000 barrels in 1963. Total up to 1964 was 51,402,000 barrels of oil.

Brown County produces 800 barrels per day or about 281,000 barrels in 1963. It has produced 40,027,000 barrels of oil since 1917.

Eastland County produces 1,600 barrels per day or 585,000 barrels in 1963. Production began in 1917 and totaled 119,265,000 through 1963.

Fort Davis National Historic Site was established as part of the National Park System in 1963. The Fort is located on the northern edge of the town of Fort Davis, Texas, and can be reached from U. S. Highway 290 on the north, 90 on the south, and then by paved Texas Roads 17 and 118.

At nearby Davis Mountains State Park, motorists will find it

far enough south for comfort in the winter, yet high enough for pleasant summer touring.

The Park's camping area is equipped with concrete tables, cooking grills, showers and restrooms. The camping fee is \$1 per day per car.

Indian Lodge, at Davis Mountains State Park, affords sleeping accommodations for tourists and its own special brand of West Texas cooking.

A few miles from the Lodge, the highest paved highway in Texas climbs Mount Locke to an elevation of 6,791 feet. The McDonald Observatory and Harvard College Solar Radio Laboratory are located on Mount Locke.

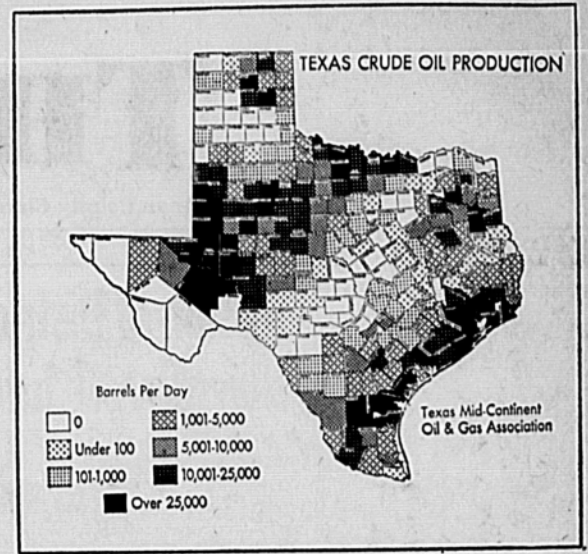

Planning Is Necessary for Good Cotton Insect Control Results

Good cotton insect control just doesn't happen. It must follow a plan. And, according to County Agent Pat C. Garner, the planned program must include use of the right insecticide at the right time, in the right amount, and in the right way.

When you are right all the way, you can't be wrong, he adds.

In order for cotton producers to have the latest available information on insect control methods and recommended insecticides, Experiment Station and Extension entomologists at Texas A&M University working with their U. S. Department of

Agriculture counterparts, annually provide this current information.

The information was recently released by the Texas Agricultural Extension Services as L-218, "Texas Guide for Controlling Cotton Insects." Also, in order to further localize the recommendations, guides have been prepared for certain specified areas of Texas, Garner said, including the Rolling Plains. Copies of the publications containing information needed by Callahan County growers are available at the county agent's office, he said.

He also suggested that growers pick up a copy of B-933, "Cotton Insects." This publication contains valuable information on the life history of cotton insects and how to identify them. The county agent also states that he has other publications available on many subjects relating to cotton production. They are available for the asking, he said.

Outdoors In Texas

By VERN SANFORD

Teach the beginning fisherman the bait-casting rig, first. After he masters it, instruct him in spin-casting. And then spinning.

Finally, give him at least an introduction to fly fishing, if only to complete his education.

Most of the fish he seeks can be taken with a bait-casting rig. And it is tops for black bass.

Furthermore, when he goes to the Coast, all he needs is to get a bigger reel and a longer rod and develop the two-handed surf casting toss. That is if he wants to hurl his bait far out and if he expects something sizeable to hit the lure. Anyway he will be familiar with the gear.

There are times when spin-casting is the preferable method. And there are other times when spinning is better. I use the two terms to designate the closed-face and open-face spinning rigs.

Spin-casting — that's the closed-faced reel — is so simple, so easy, and so efficient that it has made rod and reel fishermen out of untold thousands who never would have had the patience to learn bait casting. This is an American version of the ancient European thread-lining. It's designed to make everything easy for the angler. And it pretty well does.

At first the closed-face reels were full of bugs. But in today's brands these bugs have been eliminated. I wouldn't want you to be fooled, however into thinking that you can't get into trouble when you fail to keep a little tension on your line, or when you let the nylon monofilament form into loops and swirls.

When that happens, and the stuff gets bunched up, you might as well figure on cutting out the tangle and starting over. Nothing looks more hopeless than a knotted, tangled mess of monofilament.

But if you've got the time, and the patience, eventually you can untangle it. Best tools for the purpose are small tweezers and Mom's knitting needle.

One of the disadvantages of the spin-cast reel is that you have to take it apart to see how much line is left on your spool. This is easy to do. And replacing old line with new is a simple operation.

Line deteriorates. So test it frequently. Line is cheap. So change it often.

Now, what about the open-faced spinning reel?

This one mounts on the bottom of your rod, not the top. You hold this outfit in your right hand all the time and wind with your left.

This is the rod and reel European invented a long time ago. U. S. soldiers in World War II brought it home with time. We thought it was new, but it wasn't. The English, French, Italians, Swedes and Norwegians have been "thread lining" for quite a few years.

Some anglers like spinning better than spin-casting. There are several reasons. First, your spool is there in plain sight all the time. You can see whether you have the right amount of line on it, or too little, or too much. And you can easily adjust accordingly without taking the thing apart.

Even more important — you can hold the rod in one hand and reel with the other, without changing hands.

Spinning reels come in all sizes. You can get the ultra-light outfits with their two-pound lines for panfish; or you can get salt-water reels that will take heavy lines for the big ones. There are in-between sizes, too.

If my partner and I are going for the big black bass of lunker size, I use my bait-casting rig. It consists of a stiff five-foot glass rod and an Ambassador 5000 reel.

If we're minnow-fishing for perch or white bass, I use an ultra-light five-foot spinning rod with a Micron reel and a four-pound test line. With this outfit I can use a free-swimming minnow — without any sinker — and cast him well out then let him find his way slowly down to the depths where the whites are congregated.

My favorite closed-faced spinning reels are the Bronson and the Zebco. I use the Zebco Model 33 reel with matching rod; and the Bronson Model 63 rod and reel combination. Both come packaged in a mighty handy zipper'd case.

The audience with the President climaxed three days of sightseeing, meetings and educational activities for Black, who returned home June 14.
