SEARCH IS ON FOR GOLD DUST II

Serving as "press agent" for a string of famous "horses" can be mighty interesting, according to R. W. Reynolds of Putnam, father of Roddy Reynolds, owner of the string.

Leader of the bunch is Gold Dust I, the little stick horse that gained international fame about four years ago when he traveled to hundreds of places on five continents by hitching rides. He did this in about seven months and came home.

Gold Dust II was not so lucky. Capitalizing on the reputation of his predecessor, Gold Dust I he was a popular pony everywhere he went traveling without difficulty through Europe on to Japan and throughout the islands of the South Pacific.

Exhausting places of interest to visit in Australia, he started home when he was either corralled by some rustlers or just plain got lost.

Roddy and his dad still think there is a possibility that he will show up. In the meantime, editors of papers over the world are being contacted with a request that they make inquiries of their readers about the pony.

They are finding most of the editors cooperative. During the last month at least three large papers have run stories about the Gold Dusts and made inquiries about the missing pony. Two of them were in Canada and one at Johannesburg.

As a result of these inquiries messages have come from those sympathetic with Roddy. Most applaud Roddy for his unique project. One lady at Vancouver is very insistent that Roddy write the story of Gold Dust. She has even promised to send a copy of a story written by a little Indian boy who had whitened a little canoe and set it adrift on the Great Lakes. The name of the book is "Paddle-to-the-Sea."

She even chose a title: "The Adventures of Gold Dust." Who knows, perhaps Roddy or someone will write the story.

Resolution passed by the Board of Directors in regular session, July 20, 1965, pertaining to customer storage of grain.

All grain brought in to the Co-op for storage, **TO BE EQUALIZED TO 12% MOISTURE.** Example: For each percentage point or fraction thereof over 12% up to and including 14% to be deducted from total pounds of grain brought in, for storage.

No grain over 14% moisture to be accepted for storage.

NO MILO to be accepted under 53 lbs. per bushel, also must be clean and sweet.

NO OATS to be accepted under 30 lbs. per bushel, also must be clean and sweet.

NO BARLEY to be accepted under 42 lbs. per bushel, also must be clean and sweet.

MIXED GRAIN must be of good quality and clean and sweet.

NO OTHER GRAINS TO BE ACCEPTED FOR STORAGE.

Only the amount of grain a customer reasonably expects to use in one season to be accepted for storage.

Any grain a customer sees he is not going to need, to be sold to the Co-op at the prevailing shipped in market price, less 3c per cwt. per month of fraction thereof. If a customer wishes to sell his grain to another customer the same storage rate shall apply.

If a customer wishes to take his grain out whole he is to be charged 15c per cwt. for bulk grain, 25c per cwt. sacked in customer's sacks.

The Co-op reserves the right to limit the amount of grain any one customer can put on storage. On first come first served basis.

USS RANDOLPH — Fireman Apprentice Charles P. Correll, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. Selmon Correll of Rt. 1 Baird, is serving aboard the anti-submarine warfare support aircraft carrier USS Randolph operating in the Mediterranean with the U. S. Sixth Fleet.

Randolph is the flagship for Task Group Alfa, which consists of the Randolph, six destroyers and two submarines. Providing the Randolph's air power are two air anti-submarine squadrons, a helicopter anti-submarine squadron, and a de-

tachment of airborne early warning patrol aircraft.

Randolph's first port visit was Rapallo, Italy, June 30-July 5. Other ports of call scheduled include Genoa and Naples, Italy; Marseilles and Cannes, France, and Barcelona, Spain.

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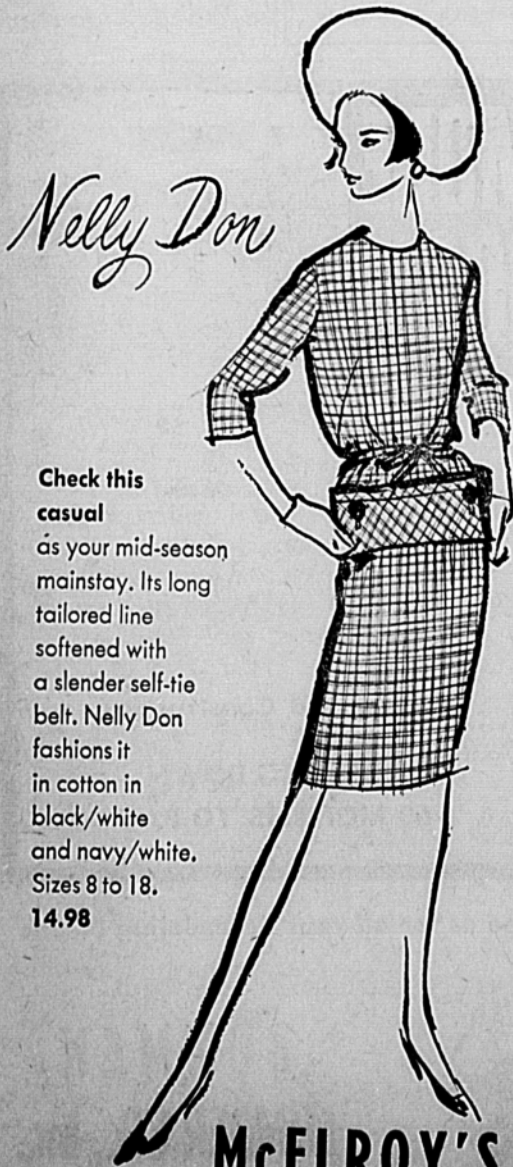

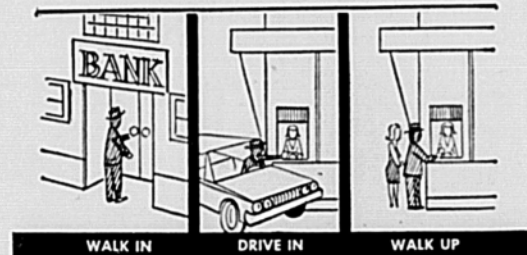

AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — Our nation seemingly has more than its share of world problems. Some have been assumed -- others have been thrust upon us.

Meeting these challenges in our own interest should be our first concern.

While making it a matter of "misery loves company," the Communist world has its problems too.

While necessary to appraise our strength and our weaknesses, the inventory is not complete until we make the same appraisal of the adversaries. To penetrate the Iron Curtain and the Bamboo Curtain with accurate estimates is not easy. A few things, however, are in evidence.

Russia has had to put more of her resources into building agriculture to the point where she can feed her people. It appears they are having real difficulty in finding money for anything more than home defense.

Fairly good information points to another grim agricultural year for Communist China. There likely is small chance she can do more than equal last year's grain production. At the same time, the nation will add 10 to 15 million more people to its population.

From the political standpoint, Ben Bella's overthrow makes Russian foreign aid to Algeria a probable loss. The Soviets had invested considerably in a steel plant in Algiers and the Red Chinese had counted on Ben Bella to carry the ball for them in Africa. The new government is no bosom friend with the West, but it threw a monkey wrench into the Afro-Asian Conference to be held in Algiers, and also forbade the holding of the Communist Youth Festival scheduled near the end of July.

Following these events several African nations have denounced the Chinese Communist for attempting to corrupt their governments.

In the Caribbean the Communists were sure they had the Dominican Republic in their power, but the President of the United States changed their minds.

Fidel Castro is having to sell breed cattle to pay off Cuba's current debt demands.

After heavy Communist expenditures in the Congo, Moise Tshombe has fairly well stabilized things there for the present. Arms are not flowing into the Congo from Algeria and Egypt.

Finally, the rift between the Soviets and Communist China appears irreparable.

From the military standpoint, Russia is committed to aiding North Viet Nam. Even with plentiful military supplies, their problem of getting them into operation in Viet Nam is not helped by the Gobi Desert and the Himalaya Mountains.

In spite of the tremendous manpower of Red China and her growing submarine capability, the key railroad from Southern China to North Viet Nam is approximately 300 miles long, has about 140 bridges and 60 tunnels. Over this line must travel the bulk of her military aid to Hanoi.

When the chips are down and an all-out effort on our part is invoked, the vulnerability of supply lines to North Viet Nam is tremendous. In addition, other military targets are highly vulnerable.

The situation in South Viet Nam is bound to get worse before it gets better -- our position in Berlin -- our stake in the Dominican Republic -- our commitment in Korea -- our relations in Latin America -- the weakened position of NATO, mainly because of France -- are problems no less. These are not all, and we need no more. However, we can not run away from those we have. At the same time, the other side in this world's ideological, economic and military conflicts is far from having things its way.

Perhaps one of the greatest items of credit are signs of our willingness to assert ourselves on the side of right and not let our timidity paralyze actions which we know must be taken to sustain the right.

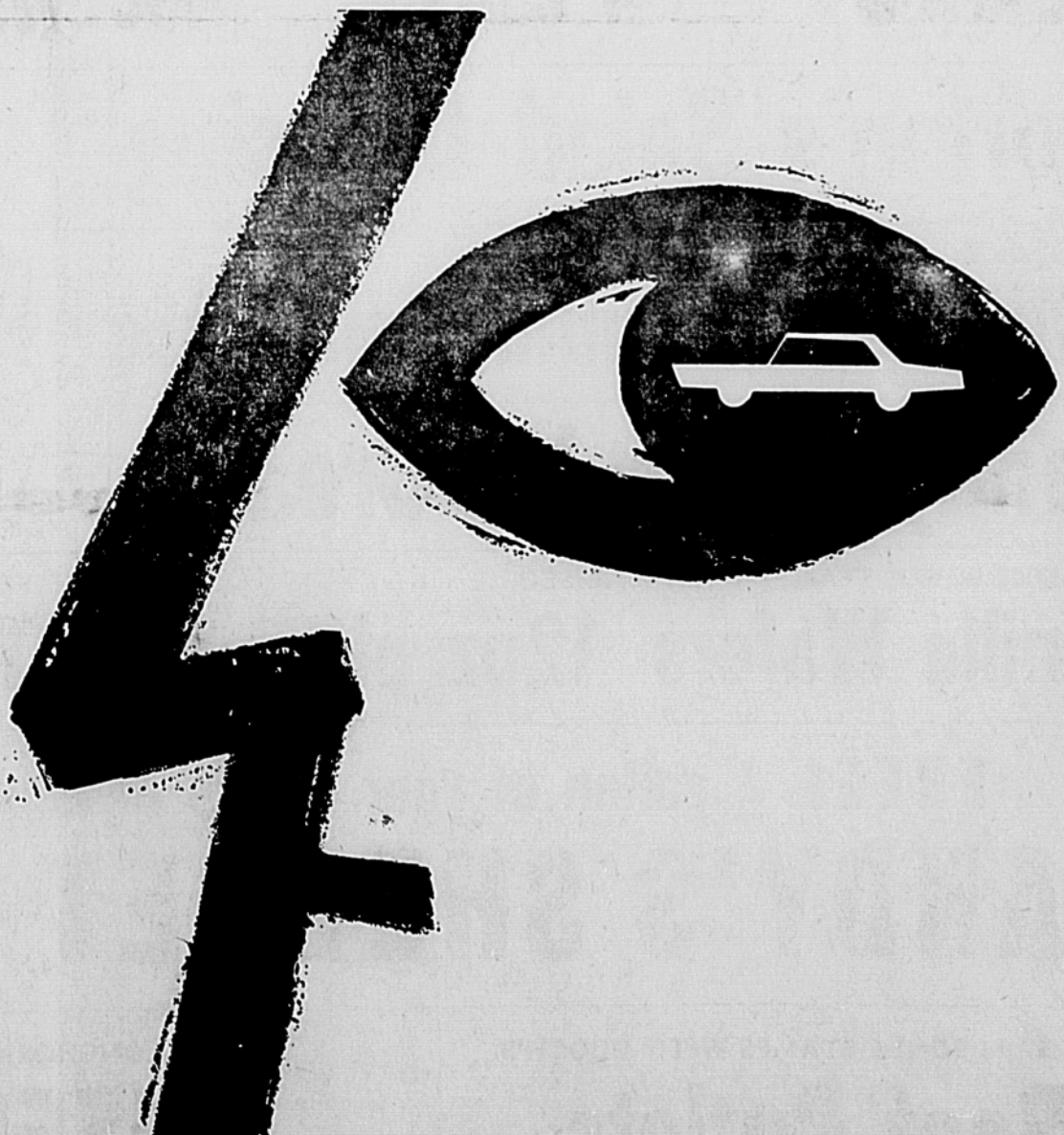
