## City Installing New Water Mains Around Fire Zone

Laying of approximately 2200 feet of new 8-inch water mains was begun last week by the City of Baird. When completed it will encircle almost the entire business district of a five block area north and south and two blocks east and west.

Work is being done by the City, using their own crew and equipment. Mayor Ault said the city decided to do the work rather than contract it, because it can be done more economically.

The City will add seven new fire plugs in addition to what they now have, which will give more protection in case of fire and will definitely have a great bearing in getting insurance rates lowered.

Besides providing a better and more efficient water system for the city, the main purpose in installing the new lines is to kill out the old 8-inch mains, originally laid some 40 years ago, down the length of Market Street. Numerous tests have proved that the old lines have almost rusted out and will not stand up to the normal pressure that is needed.

Cost of the new pipe will be \$2.35 per foot. The City estimates that the cost, after installation, will be around \$3.85 per foot. Workmen are now in the process of laying the new mains on First Street directly north of the T&P Depot.

To provide a graphic description as to where the new lines will be laid, the following route will be followed by the City crew:

## Agronomist Urges Fall Fertilizing

COLLEGE STATION — "Farmers should consider applying fertilizer in the fall, especially on ground to be used for grain sorghum in the spring," says Dr. Elton Cook, agronomist at Texas A&M Blackland Experiment Station, Temple.

In a test conducted at the Blackland Station, fertilizer was applied in each of the months of October, November, December and January, last fall and winter. The fertilizer was applied at two rates, 30-30-0 and 60-30-0.

Grain sorghum was planted on each of the fields this spring. Recent harvest of the crop revealed no significant difference in yield from any of the fields. The month in which fertilizer was applied did not affect the yield.

The ground fertilized in October yielded 2,764 pounds per acre. That fertilized in November yielded 2,716 pounds. The December fertilized ground yielded 2,826 pounds, and the ground fertilized in January produced 2,879 pounds of grain per acre. The largest differences was only 163 pounds, between November fertilized ground and January fertilized ground. This may have been caused by a number of other factors, pointed out Dr. Cook.

Farmers have been hesitant about fertilizing in the fall for fear of the fertilizer leaching out over the winter, or bacterial action destroying the fertilizer before spring. Dr. Cook said there was plenty of rain last fall and winter so conditions should have been right for leaching and bacterial action. "Since there was only slight differences in the yields, we can assume the fertilizer stayed in the ground even though it was put on as early as October," he said.

Dr. Cook said many farmers fall plow their land. This makes it even simpler to apply the fertilizer. Sometimes heavy spring rains make it difficult to fertilize, too.

Charles Euell Fogle, 69, of Clyde, died at 7:30 p. m. Tuesday at St. Ann Hospital in Abilene following a short illness.

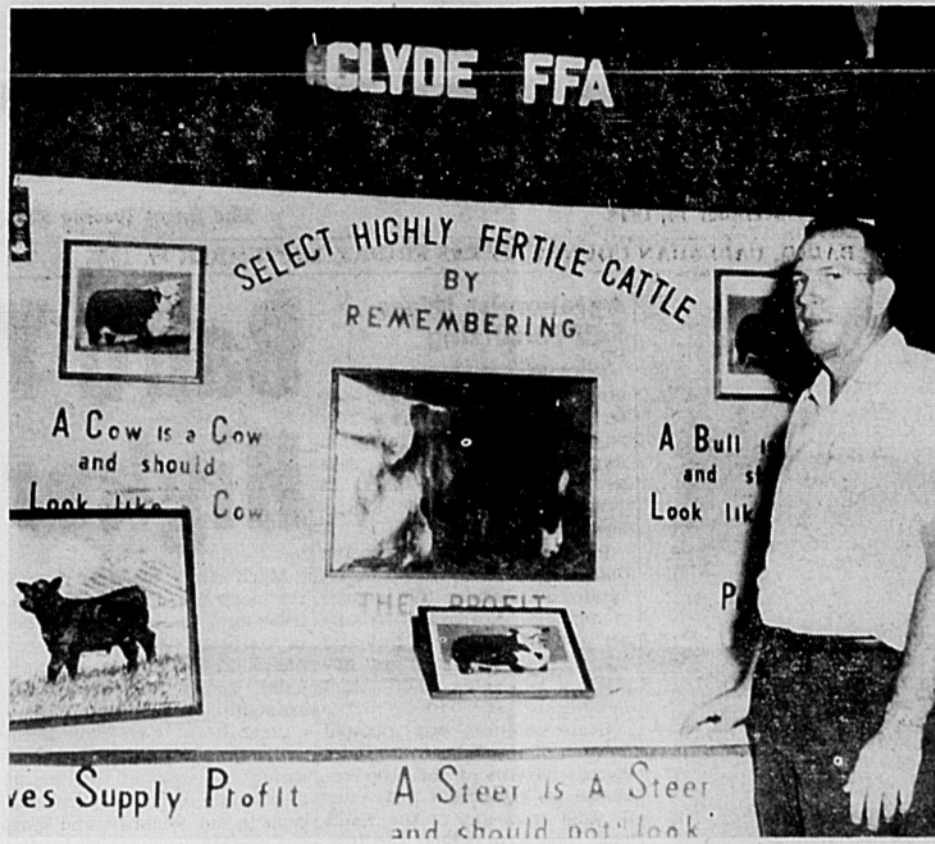

## Clyde FFA Educational Booth Wins Second Place at Fair Monday

Cross Plains FFA Chapter, under the supervision of O. B. Edmondson, vocational agriculture teacher, and Clyde FFA Chapter, under the supervision of James Trammell, VA teacher, gave Callahan County top honors in the educational booths competition Monday at the West Texas Fair, in Abilene.

The Cross Plains Chapter, featuring "clean water," took first place and the \$100 prize for FFA and 4-H exhibits.

The Clyde FFA Chapter, with a theme of selecting high fertility in dam and sire in cattle breeding, captured second place and \$75 in cash.

Fourth place and \$50 cash went to the Merkel 4-H Club, which emphasized the steps to take in pesticide safety; fifth place and \$40 in cash went to Mulberry Canyon 4-H Club, which pointed up the importance of salt and lots of

clean, fresh water available to livestock at all times.

Sixth place and \$35 went to the Spur FFA Chapter, seventh and \$25 went to Elmdale FFA.

In eighth place was Eula FFA; ninth was Potosi 4-H, and tenth was Wylie 4-H, and each received 15 in cash.

The exhibits were judged by L. M. Hargrave of the agricultural education department of Texas Tech, Lubbock.

"America's Goal — Clean Water," was the theme of the first place winning booth of Cross Plains FFA. It emphasized that clean water is a must for production of food and fiber, personal use, recreation and industry.

## Highlights and Sidelights . . .

**AUSTIN** — Texas voters, by decisively defeating a proposed constitutional amendment, to increase the number of State Senate seats from 31 to 39, removed one possible reason for a special legislative session this year.

Federal courts control two other legal issues which could require lawmakers to come back to the capitol for another 1965 powwow.

Since no senatorial districting act had been passed at the regular session, adoption of the amendment would have meant a virtually automatic session call to decide how the eight additional Senate districts were to be divided.

Proponents of the defeated proposal promptly tagged its rejection a loss for rural areas.

Eight metropolitan counties accounted for enough votes to block it in the light turnout, Sept. 7, election. But some rural areas voted against it, too.

Thirteen incumbent Senators will be jammed together into six districts under court-ordered senatorial redistricting.

The amendment, if adopted, would have given all incumbents a chance to retain their jobs. Now, at least seven Senate veterans are certain to be eliminated at the polls next year.

Suits challenging Congressional and House of Representatives redistricting by the 59th Legislature and attacking constitutionality of the poll tax still could require a special session.

Congressional redistricting



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case was heard by a special three-judge federal court at Houston last Thursday. Same court also conducted a pre-trial hearing on the legislative reapportionment suit. A ruling that either act is unconstitutional conceivably could carry with it a mandate that lawmakers redo their work before the filing deadline for the 1966 election.

If the poll tax is outlawed, Texas will be left without a voter registration act.

## Accent on Health

Headaches may well be humanity's number one malady.

It masquerades under many names -- sick headaches, coffee headaches, hunger headache, allergy headache, fever headache and Sunday headache -- to name a few.

But what really happens when your head hurts? A common misconception is that the brain hurts when you have a headache. But the brain itself -- while marvelously sensitive in some ways -- is an unfeeling mass of gray tissue. You can probe, cut, burn, or smash this tissue without its hurting.

Other structures of the head, however, are extremely sensitive to pain, including the scalp, blood vessels and some of the brain coverings.

ing headache include: swelling of arteries within the head; a pulling, inflammation or irritation of the head's pain-sensitive structures; prolonged contraction of neck muscles, a pain spreading from another source such as an inflamed eye; or an emotional disorder.

Headaches can be important since they may be the warning sign of a serious condition, which possibly could be controlled if detected early. They can indicate glaucoma, fever, high blood pressure, anemia, central nervous system injury or infection, epilepsy and tumors of the brain and head.

They can also warn of intoxication by such poisons as carbon monoxide gas. Or, a headache can indicate sensitivity to certain solvents, the elements in some liquors, to antihistamines or to noise.

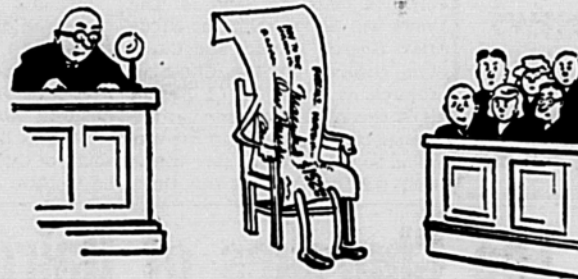

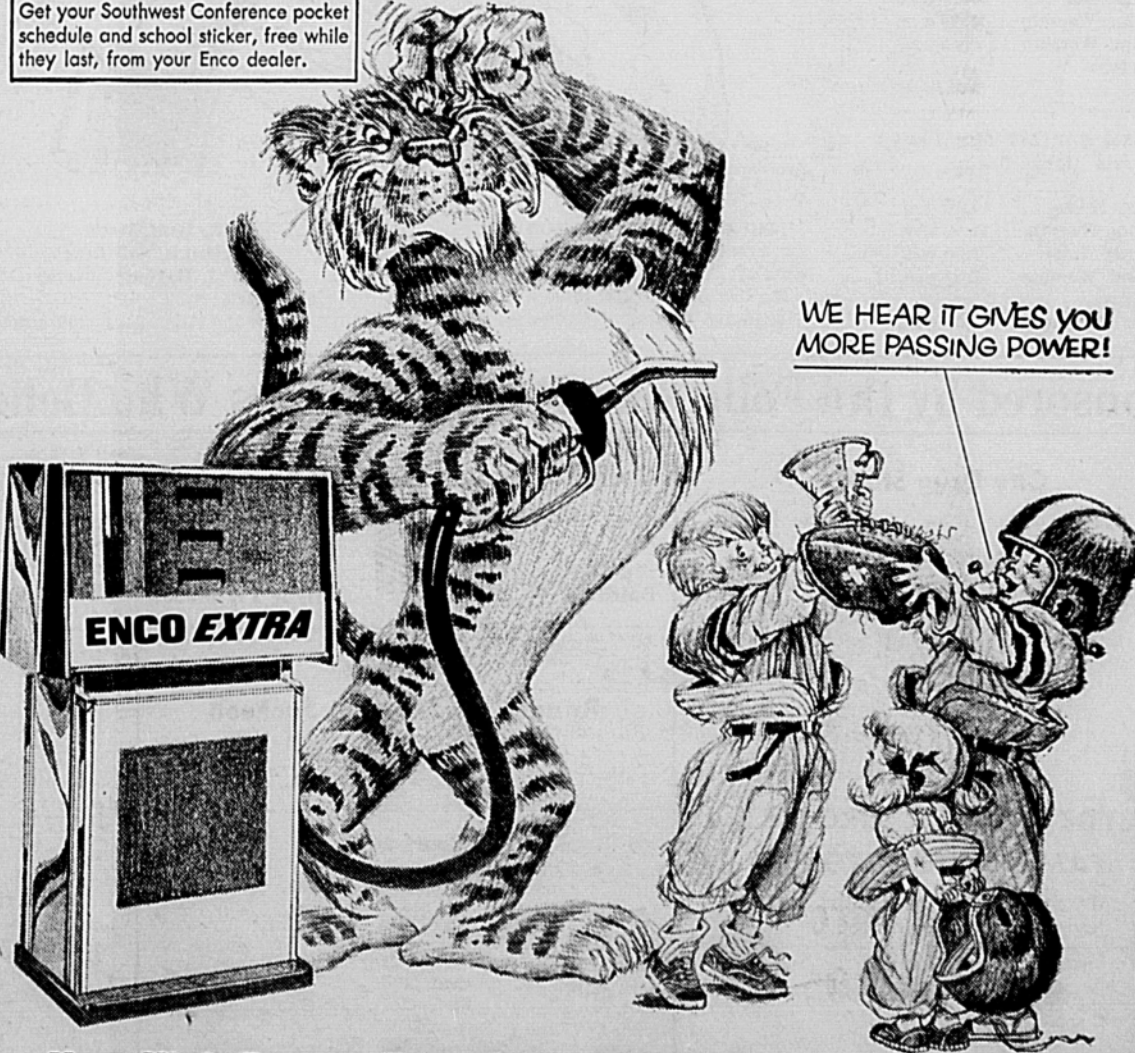

# Texas F.H.A. Registers All Time High For Fiscal 1965

Over 39,766 families of farmers, ranchers and rural residents in Texas benefited from Farmers Home Administration loan services during 1965. This is an all-time high according to L. J. Cappelman, State Director for the agency.

Loans made or insured by the Farmers Home Administration in Texas during the fiscal year ended June 30 totaled a record of \$88,289,230.

State Director Cappelman said that the Farmers Home Administration preserved its long-standard record for keeping its various lending programs in a sound position during fiscal 1965. Repayments of principal and interest by borrowers totaled the largest volume collected in the agency's 30-year history.

"This good credit record signifies the initiative and integrity displayed by the people of rural Texas in their vast self-help effort which these loans represent," Cappelman stated.

Included in the number of Texas rural people benefitting from these programs are the members of 28,245 families forming rural groups that use Farmers Home Administration credit. Most of these groups borrowed funds to develop rural community water systems.

State Director Cappelman emphasized that loans to strengthen family farms and build new rural homes continued as the agency's largest program in fiscal 1965.

John H. Curry, County Supervisor of the Coleman office, stated that in the three counties served by his unit, namely: Callahan, Coleman and Runnels, for the 1965 fiscal year, a total of 29 operating type loans were made in the amount of 159,380 seven rural housing loans in the amount of \$84,360, and two farm ownership loans for \$18,850. A rural community water system loan in the amount of \$73,000 has been approved for the town of Burkett and it is anticipated that loan will be closed this month.

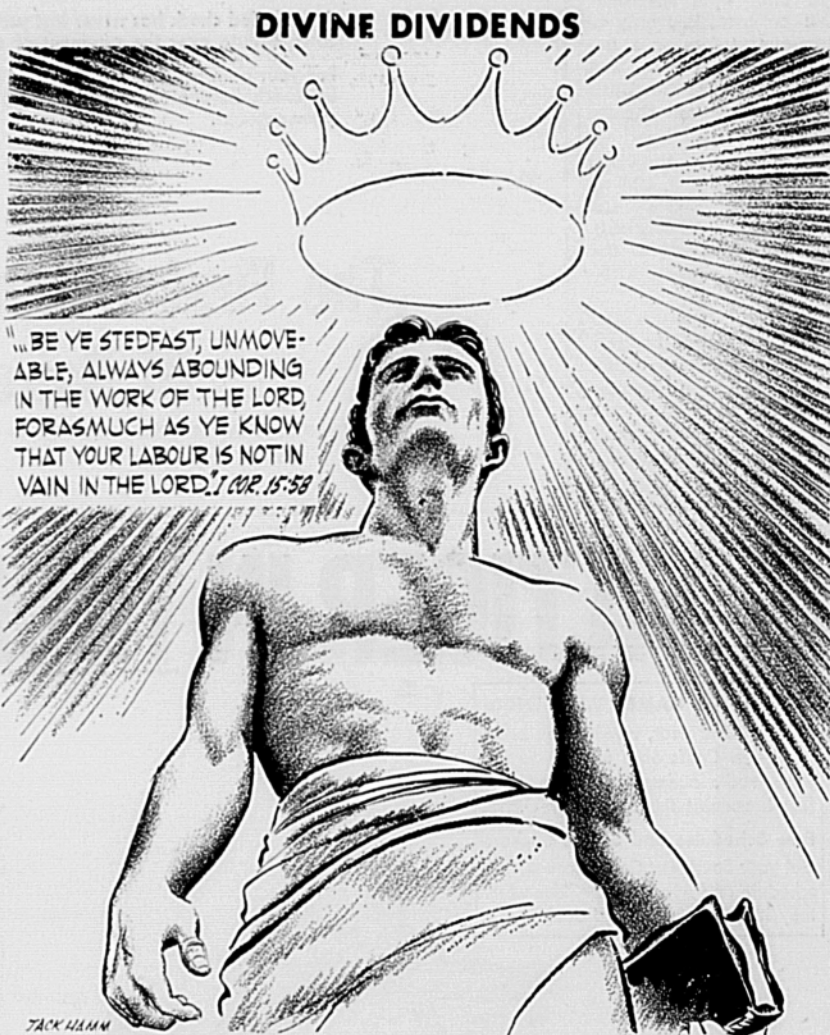

## AS IT LOOKS FROM HERE

WASHINGTON — Hindsight is usually 20-20. The Monday morning quarterback has more answers than a computer. About the next intolerable is the "I told you so" foresighter.

Both are now being applied to the Indian-Pakistani conflict over the border area of Kashmir. From the beginning of independence from Great Britain, both these nations have been on a collision course.

Assuming that the conflict can be contained short of a major war, possibly the consequence of what is now taking place may prove something of benefit.

Certain constructive fallout from the shooting between these people of the subcontinent of Asia could result.

For one, it should prove the absurdity of attempts of any major power to maintain a totally "neutral" free riding stance in a world of reality.

India has been a practitioner of double-dealing neutrality since her existence as an independent country. She has tried to secure peace for herself on the backs of others through rhetoric of nonalignment. She has done so in the United Nations and now must face the hollow truth since she has drawn the sword. India has scorned our own warnings that Nehru's pacifism could not be a safe and lasting policy. This practice now lies dead in the very home of its originator.

Pakistan, who became an ally of the West and the recipient of billions of dollars in foreign aid, turns a smiling face to Communist China the moment we put limitations on our gifts. When she learned that a United State which had given her so much vital aid could not be blackmailed, she no longer remembered any obligation.

Because of our warning that in excess of a billion and a half dollars worth of military equipment should not be used other than for her own internal defense, she chose her friends elsewhere. In other words, Pakistan sought to dictate our own foreign policy and force us to end all relationship with an India, which however irritating, is a fact to be recognized.

Red China, in her immediate and open support of Pakistan, is at last unmasked to those free nations who still pay tolerance to her, as not only the sponsor of aggression in South Viet Nam but as an advocate of chaos in all the Orient.

If all of these can be rationalized as a possible benefit there still remains a possibility of greater good.

By reason of the selfishness which afflicts men and nations, North Viet Nam and Communist China continue to receive benefits from trade from several nations with which we are allied.

All of this should profoundly show the delusions affecting the cold war, as well as the hot. The delusion that we can do business with the Communists and defeat the international Communist conspiracy; the delusion of neutrality and the delusion

that "negotiations" can avoid the bleak duty to fight for vital interests; the delusion that a nation's foreign policy need be only sufficient sloganistic for everything to be all right -- these all should be casualties of the action in Kashmir.

The light of this action should burn away the fog over an India had made self-righteousness a public policy, for a Pakistan which thought she could turn from civilized persuasion to crude threats and become powerful at our expense.

Not least of the melting delusions should be the idea of our own semi-pacifists here at home who nurse the fragile myth that if we dissolve our military might and submit ourselves in the peace, we will live in Utopia.

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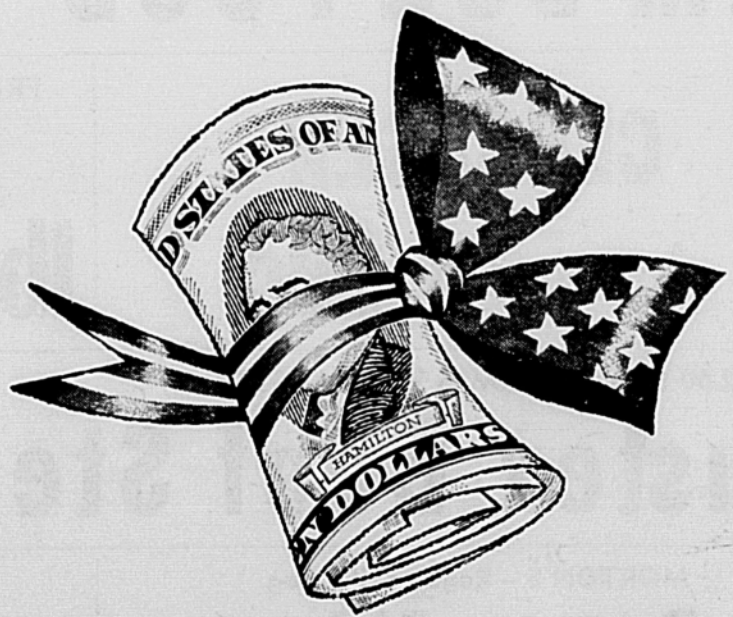

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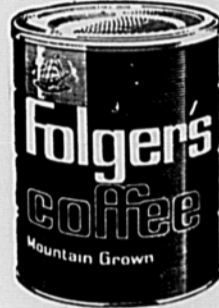
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
