However, the supply of sugar is still very short and is expected to continue short through 1946 according to Department of Agriculture reports. For this reason you are asked to refrain from using your canning sugar stamps until you plan to can.

CASTRO COUNTY DAIRY SHOW TO BE HELD APRIL 12

All is in readiness for the first Castro County Dairy Show to be held in Dimmitt, Friday, April 12, starting at 10 a. m. The show will be sponsored by the Dimmitt Lions Club and business men and will include the showing of Jersey, Guernsey, and Milking Shorthorn cattle by both adults and club boys.

The Castro County Dairy Show will be held in the Higginbotham-Bartlett Lumber Company yard and will feature registered animals that will be shown from Castro county at the Plainview Dairy Show, starting Saturday, April 13. A special event of the Dairy Show will be a show for 4-H Club and F. F. A. boys.

The show will be judged by G. G. Gibson, Extension Dairyman and J. W. Davis, Assistant Extension Dairyman, from College Station.

Classes for the show will be as follows:

Jersey Division:

- Class 1—Bulls 2 years old and over
- Class 2—Bulls under 2 years
- Class 3—Cows 3 years old and over
- Class 4—Cows 2 years old and under 3
- Class 5—Heifers 1 year and under 2
- Class 6—Heifers 6 months and under 1 year

MILKING SHORTHORN DIV.

- Class 7—Bulls 2 years old and over
- Class 8—Bulls under 2 years
- Class 9—Cows 3 years old and over
- Class 10—Cows 2 years old and under 3

Junior Division—To show in this class the animal must be owned by a 4-H Club or F. F. A. member.

- Class 13—Cows over 2 years of age all breeds.
- Class 14—Heifers 6 months and under 2 years all breeds.
