Sam H. Webb Was **Buried** in Palestine

Sam H. Webb of Palestine, who is known to many local peop's and who has several relatives in Castro County, succumbed to typhus fever at Palestine September 9, 1941.

He was born in Arkansas, coming to Texas with his parents at an early age. Being the oldest son of a family of nire children, his D. Neumayer and Ernest Harman of Mr. James Bradford of Flagg. life was not an easy one. No matter how hard he tried, his family reports, disappointment and failure to accomplish his desires seemed to meet him on every hand. But he tok it with a smile and never complained, but seemed to

Sam H. Webb had many friends. His sense of humor was above the average. He never got so downhearted but that he met his friends with a cheerful greeting. He had within him a heart of gold. No one ever called on him for help but that he responded to the extent of his ability, even in the hours of midnight. His greatest joy was in singing gospel songs, having at one time been a member of the Stamps Quartet.

For a long time he was a Woodman organizer in New Mexico, his team winning first in state in 1936.

At the time of his death he was working at an oil mill in Palestine. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Sam H. Webb, and five children: Com. Kenneth M. Webb and Arthur H. Webb of the U. S. S. Saratoga, Mrs. A. H. Linne of San Angelo and Tommiee Webb of the Textie or Fine Arts Division Palestine.




