Rain of Shotgun Pellets Followed Explosion in Georgia Capitol Rotunda

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 16. — Five minutes after Gov. Arnall left his portable rotunda office in the capitol today, a loud explosion echoed through the rotunda at 4:30 p. m.

A wisp of smoke floated down from the second floor of the capitol building and some shotgun pellets sprinkled down from the capitol dome.

It appeared some kind of shell without a gun may have been set off in some manner in one alcove which opens down into the rotunda, one floor above and 75 feet away from where Arnall had been sitting.

Talmadge Takes Over.

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 16. — State police went over to Gov. Herman Talmadge today and as a result, the "carbon copy of old Gene" seized the governor's office in the state capitol and the executive mansion.

But "Governor" Ellis Arnall still was in there fighting. He warned all state officers appointed by his rival that they were going to be challenged in their every official action by court suits.

The second day of Georgia's dual-governor was one of feverish excitement immeasurably heightened at one point when an unidentified hot-head exploded a tear gas bomb in the executive offices.

More than 36 hours after the legislature elected young Talmadge to Georgia's highest office, which Arnall refused to surrender, the deadlock seemed nowhere near solution. The war and justice departments were conferring in Washington on what federal steps should be taken in case violence developed.

Physically, the 33-year-old Talmadge, son of white-supremacy advocate and Governor-elect Eugene Talmadge, who died before he could take office, has climbed boldly into the driver's seat — thanks to state police and his strategic seizure of Arnall's offices and a large part of the state administrative setup.

But Arnall, who asserted that "storm troopers" had taken control, still had the loyalty of the state legal department.

Through it, he had already filed suit to test Talmadge's claims for the governorship and he said he would sue any state finance officers who "defied the law" and disbursed money on Talmadge orders.

Arnall went to his home in Newnan, Ga., last night.

Returning to the capitol this morning, he found Talmadge and his aides in full possession of his executive offices and state police officers stationed at the door to keep him out.

He managed to shoulder his way partly through the main door, but was told politely but firmly by Talmadge's secretary, Benton Odum, that he would have to wait his turn to see the "governor," meaning Talmadge.

CIO Praises Ford Price Cut, But Wants Wage Hike

DETROIT, Jan. 16. (U.P.) — The Ford department of the CIO Auto Workers Union today praised the Ford Motor company decision to cut prices, but made it plain that the reduction would not affect the union's demands for a 23½ cent hourly wage boost.

Richard T. Leonard, director of the UAW-Ford department, said the union "greeted this as a step in the right direction even though it leaves Ford prices 51 per cent above 1941."

REAL LEADERSHIP.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. (U.P.) — Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, chairman of President Truman's council of economic advisers, said today that the Ford Motor company's action in cutting prices "is real business leadership."

Michigan Gop asks Marshall to Oust Clayton of Texas

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. (U.P.) — Rep. Paul Shafer, R. Mich., today urged incoming Secretary of State George C. Marshall to fire Undersecretary William L. Clayton, of Texas. Shafer said Clayton "made all his millions by misusing American tax money."

In a House speech Shafer asked other members to join him "in calling on Marshall to get rid of Mr. Clayton and others who have been posing as pious, public-spirited servants of the people while making exorbitant profits by reason of their high places."

Myers Says Pumping Gas Into Pa. Might Ruin Many

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. (U.P.) — Sen. Francis J. Myers, D. Pa., today asked Congress to bar sale of the Big-Inch pipelines for transmission of natural gas long enough to give the hard coal industry "a fair chance to defend its life."

He said "some articulate groups in this country" want the lines used for gas to "punish John L. Lewis and his United Mine Workers." Such action, he said, would "disrupt and perhaps ruin a Pennsylvania industry providing the livelihood of nearly 2,000,000 Pennsylvanians" and would have "little if any sizeable effect on the rest of the mining industry or the Lewis union."

Many Good Scores at Cisco Bowling Alleys Last Night

Legislative Po-Jester Inauguration Afraid Tuesday Be to Obey the Law Colorful Affair

AUSTIN, Jan. 16. (U.P.) — The Texas legislature adjourned today until Monday after getting emergency topics from Gov. Coke R. Stevenson and witnessing a demonstration against present distribution of memberships in the house of representatives.

Redistricting, which the legislatures have ignored since 1920, was one of the topics submitted for emergency action. The House demonstration was a demand for a seat for a second member from Nueces county.

The Senate had before it two redistricting proposals. One is a bill equalizing the districts of the 31 senators. The other proposal, offered today, would amend the state constitution and give the governor, attorney general and chief justice of the supreme court power to redistrict if a legislature failed to do so after each federal census.

A joint session of House and Senate was planned for next Monday to canvass the vote for governor and lieutenant governor. They will be inaugurated Tuesday.

NINETY YEARS OLD.

WEATHERFORD, Jan. 16. — Mrs. Nancy Yenny, who came with her family to Parker county in two ox wagons in 1872, today observed her 90th birthday at Aledo.

AUSTIN, Jan. 16. — Governors of four Mexican states adjoining Texas and a ninety-eight-piece military band from Mexico City will be present Tuesday for the inauguration of Gov. Beauford H. Jester and Lt. Gov. Allan Shivers, according to information received here.

Meanwhile the Texas adjutant general's department announced participants for the inaugural parade.

It will include the governor's party, 250-piece A. & M. Band, the Will Rogers Range Riders of Amarillo, Fourth Army troops, Corsicans State Guard troops, an honor guard from Jester's old 90th Division and several flights of planes from the Tenth Air Force.

The governor's party will include the Jester and Stevenson families, the Shivers and John Lee Smith families, the inaugural committee and representatives of military forces in Texas.

One hundred mounted members of the Range Riders will escort flags of the United Nations, the six flags of Texas and the flags presented to the new Governor by the governors of Oklahoma, New Mexico, Wyoming and Colorado.

Fifty planes piloted by members of the Air Reserve will fly over the city while the parade is in progress.

Schools to Blame Ed Townsend of For Some of the Nimrod Visited Many Delinquents Daily Press Today

DALLAS, Jan. 16. — The Dallas Board of Education heard charges that considerable deadwood existed among the city's 1,850 teachers, and that teachers as individuals and as a class are afraid to voice a public opinion.

A housewife, Mrs. J. L. Ockels, 1400 Stemmons, made the assertions, and declared that the community is failing in its duty to children.

She told the board that boosting teachers' salaries would not remove the incompetents: "How are you going to get rid of the deadwood after you raise the salary scale?"

The housewife said for months she had been making a careful study of the schools and their teachers. She declared she had discussed the educational setup with conservative, average and radical teachers, and that all who spoke freely ended by warning: "Don't quote me!"

Juvenile delinquency cannot be attributed entirely to the homes, she claimed, since many of today's delinquent children come from the average or better-than-average homes.

Schools have failed to establish a feeling of security in the young child, she charged. More emphasis should be placed on the primary grades — the adjustment years — she said.

She asked the board to consider these steps toward bettering the Dallas school system:

Establish a forum where teachers may speak freely and privately, unfettered by fear of public reaction.

SHOULD BE EXTENDED.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16. (U.P.) — Rep. Robert A. Grant, R. Ind., today introduced Republican-backed legislation to extend indefinitely the wartime excise taxes. Under present law the high wartime taxes on furs, jewelry, liquor and 20 other items expire June 30. President Truman asked for a one-year extension. But Grant's proposal would make the extension indefinite. Chairman Harold Knutson, R. Minn., of the House Ways and Means Committee, has scheduled a meeting of his group for tomorrow morning. Grant's bill may be considered then.
