#### Raising Mirage Wheat In Southwest Kansas

Farmers of Southwest Kansas are raising "Mirage Wheat," which yielded, this dry year 45 bushels per acre where ordinary wheat made only 15 bushels. The wheat was sown on ordinary ground without fertilization, or any special preparation, September 12 and cut on the following June. The Mirage wheat should be sown about two weeks earlier than ordinary wheat, as it grows

The following is a brief history of Mirage Wheat and its 13665 discovery:

"In 1904, Mr. K. B. Stoner, a 10820 farmer, living near Fincastle, 10585 Va., found a freak stool of wheat 8805 bearing 142 heads, all having 5270 sprouted from one grain of seed. 2510 So phenomenal was the yield and quality that he christened his find "Miracle Wheat." This was 500 replanted, and the first year he 500 got 2,000 grains. By 1906 he had 500 increased his stock to sixteen bushels, which was multiplied to 800 bushels in 1907. An ordinary 1250 stalk of wheat covers about four 255 inches of space. The Miracle 125 wheat covers about twelve. A report stating that Miracle wheat grew as a result of prayer was generally circulated, but Mr. Stoner stoutly denies this story. He says that he "just found it." Mr. Stoner established and maintained the price of \$1.25 per pound for Miracle seed wheat until forced to reduce his price as a result of other growers offering Miracle seed for sale.

Proved so Satisfactory Last Year That Every Farmer Doubles Acreage.

Lubbock, Tex., Sept. 12. -Seeing several reports about Feter- ton at J. L. Orr's. ita and Soudan grass in The county. It proved to be so good crete blocks. that a large acreage was planted this year. Every farmer who has planted it is singing its praises. It is equal, they claim, to either kaffir or milo maize, it has a softer kernel, and seems to stand the drouth better. One farmer reports that he has cut two tons of heads per acre from a large field.

Six farmers have planted about five acres each of Soudan grass under the direction of Superintendent of the State Farm in Lubbock, and all report favorably as to its good qualities. It can be cut three times and averages about a ton and a half per cutting per acre. It makes a fine hay crop, and we predict that hundreds of acres will be planted next year.




