IMPROVED HIGHWAYS PAY DIVIDENDS

It is expected that 1928 road building activities will exceed all records. Twenty thousand miles of surfaced roads are to be built, and about 8,000 miles graded and drained.

A high degree of road service is assured, by the fact that about 240,000 miles of the total 288,000 in state highway systems are this year to be maintained under state highway departments.

Early estimates give amount available for road expenditures as being much greater than last year. From the various sources, it is expected that highway funds will be upwards of \$1,300,000,000.

These highway facts should please everyone. There is no such thing as road building expense, unless it be shortsightedness that constructs poor or inadequate roads. Every dollar put into a modern highway for building or widening is an economy and a dividend-paying investment.

The United States highway system is the best in the world.

PURE CARELESSNESS CAUSES MOST ACCIDENTS

Ninety per cent. of all industrial

home, street and highway accidents are caused by carelessness.

"Major violations of the law and spectacular acts of criminal negligence produce but a small fraction of the total number of deaths and injuries that occur annually," declares Marcus A. Dow, eminent safety engineer.

In private homes, more people are killed and seriously hurt by falling down stairs than are killed and injured in fires.

"The majority of street accidents are caused by little acts of thoughtlessness rather than by drunkenness or other violations of the law in driving automobiles."

A careful analysis of street and highway accidents shows that about 15 per cent are caused by backing up carelessly to get out of parking spaces. Failure to get under proper control when approaching street intersections causes another 15 per cent. Following too close behind a vehicle to allow proper braking distance accounts for 12 per cent of accidents.

MAKING IT UNPLEASANT FOR CRIMINALS

New York State leads the way in taking definite action to reduce crime. Instead of passing new laws and regulations to encroach upon the rights and privileges of law-abiding citizens, it passed the Baumes law in 1926, which automatically sentences a man convicted for the fourth time of committing a felony, to life imprisonment.

Naturally, there have been objections to this law because it has "teeth" in it, but if crime is to be reduced the number of criminals and potential criminals must also be reduced. There is no excuse for a man committing four crimes of a character to involve a penitentiary sentence. Why should the public be subjected to the danger of meeting habitual criminals?

New York has taken a step in the

right direction. It should be upheld in its program to catch the crook, keep him caught, hand him a fitting sentence, and see that he serves it.

Sentimental individuals claim that severe punishment does not deter the criminal, but makes him hate society. This apparently has not been the case in New York. The certainty of life imprisonment for a fourth felony has stayed the hand of the hardened criminal. He thinks twice before sentencing himself under such a law.

What New York has done the rest of the country must do if it actually desires to overcome the criminal elements: make crime not only unprofitable but highly inconvenient and dangerous for the perpetrator.

LET US HAVE "REAL" TAX REDUCTION

If we are to enjoy "real" tax reduction, it is not necessary to cut out progress and needed improvements, but it is necessary to cut out non-essentials, experiments and political hobbies which add to the overhead of government without giving added advantages comparable with their cost.

WHAT'S DOING IN WEST TEXAS

Fort Worth—More than one hundred airplanes are expected here June 18, 19, and 20, for an Airplane Review in connection with the Tenth Annual Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in Fort Worth. B. B. Buckenridge, Industrial Commissioner of the Fort Worth Association of Commerce, is in charge of plans for this event.

The program is incomplete but will include a grand parade at 10 o'clock each morning. The planes will take off at 10-10 each day and will fly over the city. In the afternoon there will be stunt flying, parachute jumping and other features.

One of the oldest planes in use will be here, as will the very latest models. It promises to be one of the biggest air plane reviews ever staged in the United States. Still another feature will be a barbecue for the aviators. Already returns indicate at least one hundred planes.

Turkey—A mammoth rail celebration is planned for opening of the South Plains railway extension.

Midland—A beautiful site for Midland's new grade school building has been donated as a memorial to the late John M. Cowden.

RENDITIONS OF PUBLIC SERVICE COMPANIES MADE

Renditions of the various public service companies serving Floyd county people and having holdings in this county, along with the renditions of other property holders of the county, have been under consideration of the Commissioners' Court last week, sitting as a board of equalization.

Renditions of several of these companies are made this year to Tax Assessor C. M. Meredith for the first time, among the new names appearing on the rendition sheets being those of the Fort Worth & Denver South Plains Railway Company, the Quanah, Acme & Pacific Railway Co., The South Plains Pipe Line Co., and the West Texas Gas Co. The last named two companies are under the same ownership but operates as separate and distinct corporations, the West Texas Gas Co. holding the property within the city limits of Floydada and Lockney and the South Plains Pipe Line Company the carrier lines for gas in the county and outside the city limits.

Lockney Cotton Oil Mill, whose new mill was built in Lockney last year, is rendering its property in this county for the first time this year. Figures for this concern are included in the total made up below.

Rendition of the eight companies operating in this county are as follows:
