ARGUMENT STARTING OVER CROPS HAS FATAL CLIMATE

Aged Motley Farmer Dead as Result of Affray Near Roaring Springs; One Held

Matador, June 28.—J. W. Battles, about sixty-five, is dead, and W. A. Neal, age about forty-five, is in the jail here, pending \$7,500 bond on a charge of murder as a result of alterations on the Battles' farm...

Neal is charged with murdering the older man by crushing in his skull with the butt of a gun, then shooting him. Neal was a sharecropper on the Battles' farm and the argument between the two is said to have started over the crop.

Sheriff Claude Warren declared tonight that Neal attacked the older man, hitting him several times with an automatic then shooting him through the forehead. Neal was arrested soon after the shooting and placed in jail. He had not made bond tonight.

Battles is survived by a wife and one child here, but has several children scattered over the country. He came to this section last winter from El Paso and bought 300 acres of land near Roaring Springs. The body was sent to Alpine, his former home, for burial. Neal came here this year and rented the Battles' place on the halves. He had made no statement concerning the shooting.

Everybody Closed July 4th. All business concerns in Lockney, except cafes, filling stations and garages, closed the entire day Wednesday, July 4th, in celebration of the holiday. The closing was said to be 100 per cent for the first time in many months.

D. B. BROWN ACCIDENTALLY KILLED FRIDAY NIGHT

Accidental Discharge of Shot Gun in Hands of Son Proves Fatal 12 Hours Later

Dennis Benjamin (Dens) Brown, age 51 years, 7 months and four days, died at the Plainview Sanitarium, Saturday morning at 7:30 o'clock, following the accidental discharge of a shot gun at the family home, 14 miles northeast of Lockney, at 9:30 o'clock Friday night.

The cause of the accident was occasioned by his son, Buster Brown, who had started out of the house, stumbling and dropping the loaded gun on the porch. Mr. Brown, who was sitting on the porch at the time, receiving the full charge from the gun in his back in the region of his kidneys. He was carried to the Plainview sanitarium where he died ten hours later.

Mr. Brown was born in Wise County, Texas, on Nov. 26th, 1876, moving to Floyd county from that place about 27 years ago, and has been a resident of this county continually since that time. He is survived by his mother, Mrs. Nannie Brown; wife, Mrs. Nora Brown; one son, Buster Brown; one daughter, Mrs. Mary Lee Dillard; two brothers, Syd and Roy Brown; two sisters, Mrs. Annie Smith and Mrs. Goldie Cypert. He was a member of the Baptist church.

Funeral services were conducted at the Lockney Cemetery Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Revs. G. I. Brittain of Plainview, and C. J. McCarty of Lockney, conducting the services, and interment was made under the direction of Grady R. Cragg, Funeral Director.

Mr. Brown was highly esteemed as a citizen of the Aleino community, and was noted for his honesty and brightness, and his loss is mourned by the entire community.

Louie Lynn McMurray, infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Louie McMurray of Amarillo, died at the Plainview Sanitarium Sunday morning at 3:35 o'clock, following an operation that night for lock bowels. The little fellow took sick Thursday night, and an operation was decided upon in an attempt to save its life. The child only lived three hours after the operation.

Funeral services were conducted at the Methodist church Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, Revs. J. B. McReynolds and C. J. McCarty officiating, and interment was in the Lockney cemetery.

The child was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. McMurray, Mrs. McMurray being Miss Zelma Fowler of Lockney before her marriage. Mrs. C. D. Fowler of Lockney was its grandmother.

TEXAS MAY GO REPUBLICAN CANT SWALLOW SMITH

Crops Backward in Central and South Texas—Plains Crops Equal All Parts of State

Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Adams, Douglas and Milton, and Miss Jessie Mellroy of Hale Center, returned last Thursday from a trip of two weeks spent in Central and South Texas, on a vacation.

While away the writer visited Fort Worth, Ranger, Sweetwater, Waco, Glen Rose, Houston, Galveston, Austin, San Antonio, and other points in those sections of the state, and due to the fact that the Democratic National Convention was at hand in Houston, the question of what the state was going to do if Al Smith was nominated was the topic on the lips of the voters in all the country visited, and if those who are not afraid to express themselves count anything, Al Smith will not get enough votes in West, Central and South Texas, to elect him to contable of a precinct. While in Ranger we were in conversation with a crowd of fifteen men, all strangers, except two, and on ascertaining how they stood, fourteen of the fifteen stated that they would not support Al Smith under any consideration; at a gathering in Fort Worth during the West Texas Chamber of Commerce where the writer was present and the political situation came up, out of sixty men, there were only three present that said they would support Smith, the other fifty-seven saying they would bolt the ticket and vote for Hoover if Smith was nominated. We found the opposition to Smith very pronounced over the entire trip, and we heard a very prominent man in Houston, two days before the convention, say that if Smith was nominated that West, Central and South Texas would give the Republican candidate a big majority in the fall election. In the San Antonio country the opposition to Smith is very pronounced and that section will vote almost solid for the republican nominee. The Democrats of Texas cannot and will not support a Catholic and anti-prohibitionist for the presidency of the United States. They owe the Pope of Rome, the Catholic church nor the Whiskey interests anything, and will not tolerate their steam-rollering Smith in as the nominee of the Democratic party. There is a good chance for Texas and many of the Southern states to break the Solid South idea this year, and the action of the Democratic party has not met with the approval of some of the strongest Democrats, and they will refuse to sanction any such politics, but will support the republican nominee instead.

The crops in Central and South Texas are very backward this year as far as cotton is concerned. In most places the cotton is no larger than the cotton here on the Plains. A fair corn crop is being made in certain parts of the state, and in some sections the cotton is about knee high, but in most parts of Central and South Texas the cotton is from 3 to 4 inches high, and the land is very low.

Preparation are now being made for the encampment of the various troops and dates have been announced from July 17 to Aug. 21. Each troop in the district will attend the camp as a unit and stay there for a period of three days.

The district was formed April 1 at which time there were three regular troops in existence, on July 1, that number had been increased to nine and the number of scouts had been increased in this time from 60 to 175.

Troops are starting at Hereford, Happy, Kress, Tulla, Lockney, and Matador at the present time.

3 COUNTY SEATS CON- NECTED BY ROAD

Crosbyton, June 30.—The new high way which has been under construction north and south through Crosbyton, the county seat of Crosby county, has been opened to traffic.

This road has been badly needed for many years, but owing to the difficulty of getting off the Cap Rock south of Crosbyton, its construction was delayed. A bond issue of \$80,000 was made to cut down the cap rock, and at present the road has a 1 per cent grade at the cap rock. This road give a direct connection between Post City, the county seat of Garza county, Crosbyton, the county seat of Crosby county, and Floydada, the county seat of Floyd county.

Attempts are to be made to have it designated as a State highway.

This road passes the Uncle Hank Smith Memorial Park, 10 miles north of Crosbyton, where the West Texas Old Settlers' Association will hold their reunion on Aug. 15 and 16.

WOMAN SEEKING GOVERNOR- SHIP AGAINST SMITH

Mrs. Edith E. Wilmans of Dallas Says She Cannot Support Democratic Nominee

Dallas, July 2.—Renewed signs of a split in Texas Democratic party tanks which might place this state in the doubtful column before November were seen here today.

Mrs. Edith E. Wilmans of Dallas, candidate for governor, in a statement declared she would not support Governor Alfred E. Smith. Thomas R. Love of Dallas, candidate for lieutenant governor, reiterated his intention of bolting the Democratic national ticket and Mayor R. E. Burt of Dallas repeated that he believed he would support Hoover but would not say definitely how he would vote.

Burt has been leaning toward Hoover for several weeks. On the eve of the Democratic national convention at Houston he jokingly told newspapermen that he was a "Hoover Democrat." I don't yet know what I am going to do," he said today.

Love declared he was going to vote against the Democratic National ticket for the second time in his life. "I hope never to have to vote against another after Smith," the senator added.

"My conscience would not let me vote to put a schemer Tammany Hall in the White House even if there was no liquor question involved in Smith's candidacy," Love asserted. "Who I shall cast my vote for I have not decided as I expect some developments before the time I must make up my mind."

"My party when it is right but some other party when mine is wrong," is the only slogan for red-blooded Americans, he continued.

I do not believe that the honest vote is bound by any pledge to support the Democratic nominee when the Democratic national convention has attempted to fill their contract with a people by delivering to us a rotten deal in place of the one we contracted for," was the asserted remark of Mrs. Wilmans, who is a primary opponent of Governor Dan Moody, one of the leaders in the fight for a dry plank and a dry nominee at the Houston convention.

"I feel that it would be better for the Democratic party to fall than succeed in forcing upon the good citizens of the United States a man who, by his acts as governor of New York, has nullified the prohibition amendment in the state of New York," she concluded.

Q. A. & P. SOON TO HAVE TRAINS RUNNING

Floydada, June 30.—Marking the beginning of service to the South Plains area by the Quannah, Acme & Pacific, subsidiary of the Frisco, local offices of the company will be opened here Monday in temporary quarters immediately south of the permanent station now under construction. Bob Medlin, who comes to Floydada from Matador, where he has been agent for the past two years, will have charge of the Floydada office and will assume his duties next week.

Possible slowness in receiving material for the construction of the new station may cause some delay in its completion, although it is planned to be finished by Aug. 1. The final run of ballasting material is being placed on the tracks in preparation for the opening of passenger services. Over-night services between Floydada and Oklahoma City, each way, with standard Pullman service and passenger service will be inaugurated with the beginning of service on the line.

Has Four Fine Jersey Bulls Now on Ranch Near Dougherty Just Shipped In

Dr. Freeman stated that he had just shipped in four fine Jersey bulls to his ranch near Dougherty, and stated that he expected to keep two of these animals on his ranch, but that he would be willing to let farmers in Floyd county have the other two bulls, and would sell 3-4 interest in the two bulls to them, then he would take the two bulls kept on the ranch and exchange them with the farmers in the circle when the time came to exchange the bulls from one herd to another. He stated that he had just as soon place the two bulls near Lockney as anywhere, and any one interested in forming a bull circle write or phone him about same. Dr. Freeman has a good herd of Jerseys on his ranch and is improving his herd all the time.

TEXAS BOLTERS MAY BE READ OUT OF PARTY

Those Who Decline to Support Al Smith, Are Republicans, Charge

Dallas, July 4.—Texas Democrats who have threatened to bolt the party in November rather than support Gov. Alfred E. Smith for the presidency, today were confronted with a movement to read them out of the state organization unless they remain "regular."

This movement got under way yesterday when National Committeeman Jed C. Adams of Dallas, announced that a meeting of the state executive committee had been called to perfect the party organization in Texas so that county and other officials would be in sympathy with the platform and the party nominees. He denounced those who "call themselves Hoover Democrats" and declared they "might as well call themselves Republicans."

Commenting on the threatened split which grew out of the demands of ultra-dry factions for a candidate to head a ticket on the platform for rigid enforcement of the prohibition

act and without an attempt at modification. Mr. Adams said those who declined to support Governor Smith would find themselves in the Republican camp.

In support of Mr. Adams, Judge Volney W. Taylor, at Brownsville, Cameron county Democratic chairman, declared he would not place names of any "party bolters" on the ballots for that county to be used in the state primary this month.

Previously Mrs. Edith Wilman and William E. Hawkins, candidates for governor, and Thomas B. Love, candidate for lieutenant-governor, and a former national committeeman, said they would not support Smith.

The regular organization is expected to have support from Governor Dan Moody, who has declared repeatedly he would support the party nominee and who recently said he would not attend a conference of dry leaders at Asheville, N. C., called to organize southern Democrats against a wet candidate.

Cone Johnson, chairman of the state highway commission and for years a leader of Texas prohibitionists, also has announced that he would not vote for Governor Smith. Mr. Johnson declared that Gov. Smith's telegram to the national convention after he had been nominated was a "clear bolt from the Democratic platform."

WORK ON HALE COUNTY PAVING STARTS IN JULY

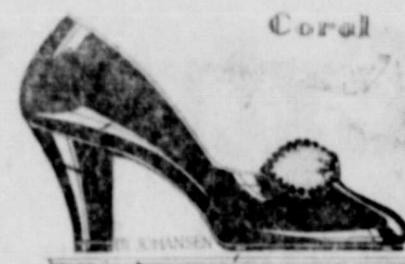
Highway Number 9 Contract to Be Let At Next Meeting of Commission
