



The Company, therefore, is classified as a National Defense Utility, and its property is protected by an Act of the Congress of the United States (Chapter 926-3D, Session 76 Congress) approved April 20, 1918; and Texas Labor-Violence Law (H. B. 800) passed by the Legislature on April 4, 1941.

## Section 5 of the Federal Law reads as follows:

"That whoever, with intent to injure, interfere with, or obstruct the national defense of the United States, shall wilfully injure or destroy, or shall attempt to so injure or destroy, any national-defense material, national-defense premises, or national-defense utilities, as herein defined, shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment not more than ten years, or both."

## Section 1 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person by the use of force or violence, or threat of the use of force or violence, to prevent or to attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation within this state. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year nor more than two (2) years."

#### Section 2 of Texas H. B. No. 800 reads as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person acting in concert with one or more other persons to assemble at or near any place where a 'labor dispute' exists and by force or violence prevent or attempt to prevent any person from engaging in any lawful vocation, or for any person, acting either by himself or as a member of any group or organization, or acting in concert with one or more other persons, to promote, encourage, or aid any such unlawful assemblage. Any person guilty of violating this Section shall be deemed guilty of a felony, and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by confinement in the State Penitentiary for not less than one (1) year, nor more than (2) years."

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



Defense Guard Requested School Holidays

The mass meeting last night unanimously voted her into the honorary position of Defense Guard nurse if the application for a unit here is approved.

J. P. Oliver, a veteran of the Spanish-American war, said he was outside the Guard age limits of 18-64, but on petition was unanimously adopted as a mascot.

The application, which points out the many important installations in and near Dalhart, has been signed by the commanders of the Legion, VFW, the mayor, presidents of the chamber of commerce, Lions, Rotary, and Ambassador clubs.

The vital installations include the Denver and Rock Island junction in Dalhart; the Rock Island shops; junction of transcontinental highways; the Canadian River Gas Co. booster station on the 22-inch main that supplies gas for the R. The least that the rest of us can do is to volunteer our dollars in defense bonds and stamps; and in all the other patriotic and defense programs that may from time to time be laid before us.

Treasury Secretary Henry Morgenthau. Jr. urged an American response to the defense securities program that "will demonstrate to our enemies that America to a man is behind our greatest national test".

Morgenthau urges every community to push payro'l allotment. bank draft, stamp banks, school program and any other plans looking to increased and consistent support of defense securities. This money he said, will arm America and help to repel the enslaving forces that now threaten it.

Frank Scofield, Texas Defense Savings Staff administrator at Austin, said today that "nothing is more important now than that you and I work with all haste to supply our boys in this war with the necessary guns, tanks, planes, ships and equipment of war to meet our enemies.

"It behooves us, who are holding the home front to think of 'our way of life' and preserve it for our children".
