City To Begin Enforcing Trash, Garbage Ordinance

Penalties To Be Assessed Violators

Dr. A. W. Brazda, city health officer, today called on the enforcement of one of the city's oldest ordinances and another passed in November, 1954 in eliminating what he called sanitation problems as well as fire hazards within the city boundaries.

Portions of the older ordinance of the two to be enforced explain specific nuisances. Passed in 1919 with the incorporation of the city, the first ordinance classifies unclean premises, rubbish in public places and weeds on lots as nuisances.

The second ordinance describes exact methods of trash and garbage disposal, to the extent that it prescribes the type and size containers to be used. With the tightening of the garbage and trash laws, city officials will enforce the ordinances after sufficient notice has been given property owners.

Dr. Brazda said that in the case of property owners who refuse to remove trash and weeds from vacant lots, city employees will be instructed to clean the property and the property owner will be billed for the services with the next year's taxes.

While putting teeth into the ordinances, the city has undertaken a project to spray ponds and pools of water with a larvacide and highly concentrated diesel oil to rid the water of mosquitoes. The

Mother of Ranger Man Dies Tuesday

Funeral services for Mrs. D. M. Jacobs, 87, pioneer resident of Rising Star who died there Tuesday following a long illness, were held Thursday morning at 10:30 in the Rising Star Methodist Church.

Mrs. Jacobs was born on November 28, 1868, in North Carolina. The family moved to Sipe Springs about 1872, where she was married to D. M. Jacobs, who was for many years a merchant in Sipe Springs. Jacobs of Artesia, N. M.; M. J. Jacobs of Los Angeles, Calif.; Frank Jacobs of Odessa; Wyatt Jacobs of Ranger; Truman Jacobs of Artesia, N. M.; El Jacobs of Big Spring and Paul Jacobs of Ozona.

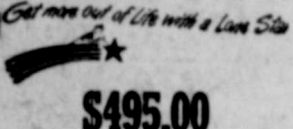

There's a New 'Art' to Patching Up Small Fry

MOTHERS who must stop daily in the midst of such "tiny" tasks as cleaning the entire house or doing the family laundry to patch up minor injuries suffered by the small fry know what it means to try to quiet a frightened child.

And even minor accidents frighten small children. But once the fear of pain and the slight sense of shock are gone, they love showing off. A bandage is a fine device for getting attention from other kids and the whole neighborhood. It's a conversation piece in the same sense as the latest charm on mother's bangle bracelet.

Knowing this, one manufacturer has produced colored adhesive first-aid bands illustrated with clowns, animals, toys and storybook characters. The bands are, of course, sterile, water-resistant and protective.

Aside from keeping a small wound clean, which any adhesive band will do, they are intended to quiet the child and divert his attention from a cut finger or bruised knee. And this, in turn, will take the weight from mother and allow her to get back to the vacuum cleaner or the family laundry hamper.

Civil Defense Role of Farmer Is Outlined in New C. D. Publication

The civil defense role of the farmer and his family is described in a new leaflet being distributed by the Federal Civil Defense Administration.

The publication — "RFD — Rural Family Defense" — is being distributed throughout the nation to point up the importance of rural residents in forging national preparedness.

A five-point rural civil defense program is outlined in the pamphlet:

1. Take Care of Your Family and Yourself — "A mass enemy attack on America will disrupt much of the transportation, communications, business and conveniences on which rural families depend. You and your neighbors will need to 'live off the land.'" There are two very real and direct dangers to rural areas. The first is fallout. A potato cellar, cyclone cellar or any storage cellar covered by earth is a good shelter (from radioactive fallout). The second danger is chemical and germ weapons. "You should know something of the effect of such weapons — the symptoms of the diseases or sickness they can cause in plants and animals. You should know what preliminary steps can be taken to counteract the effects of typical germ and chemical weapons."

2. Keep Your Farm in Production — Estimates show that a successful attack on all U.S. critical target cities would make survivors totally dependent on food stored in rural areas within two weeks.

3. Be Ready to Market Your Production — "You should know what plans have been made by your county for marketing farm products — most important, WHERE they will be needed. You must be ready to haul your products to these markets. You will need to know county plans for gasoline priorities, and have a good knowledge of the highway

system in your area."

4. Be Ready to Take In Evacuees — "You, your family and your neighbors should make plans now to shelter and feed evacuees if it becomes necessary. The Federal Civil Defense law provides that you will be paid for anything that is properly requisitioned."

5. Plan To Help Others — "Rural families may be asked to help the people in attacked areas. Your help will be most effective if you are trained to work on civil defense units such as rescue teams, first aid teams, wardens and auxiliary police. "If you are not in civil defense, ask your local or county civil defense agency how you may join a training class. If there is none in your area, help to get one started."

"The principles of civil defense are not new to rural people," the pamphlet emphasizes. "You have been taking care of your own, helping your neighbors, and ready to help others — in peacetime emergencies — for a

long time. But the problems and dangers posed by possible enemy attack can be met and answered only by organization. Civil defense is that organization."

In addition to the distribution being made by PCDA, copies of the leaflet are available at five cents each from the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington 25, D.C.

Section 3: Unclean Premises — All yards, lots, alleys, stables, pens, cellars, vaults, drains, pools, wells, cisterns, sewers, roads, premises or buildings of any character, which are not kept free of dead carcasses, decaying fish, fowl, fowls, vegetables, stagnant water or other stagnant liquids, slops, trash, rubbish or other deposits or substances of any and every character, which are likely to or do become unwholesome, filthy, offensive, unhealthful or likely to create or endanger disease.

Section 4: Rubbish, etc. in Public Place — Sweeping, throwing, or depositing into, on or upon or along any drain, gutter, alley, sidewalk, street, public place or thoroughfare, trash, rubbish of any character, slops, filth or stagnant water or other liquid, dead animals, fowls, birds or fragments thereof, or any other unwholesome, unhealthy, unsightly or offensive thing or substance.

Section 7: Weeds, etc. on Lots — Permitting or allowing weeds, filth or rubbish to grow, be or remain on any lots, grounds or premises, or permitting such weeds to extend from such premises into any street or alley adjacent to such lot, ground or premises.

Section 24: Any person who shall permit any stagnant, foul or offensive water to remain upon any lot or other premises or under the floor of any building owned or occupied by such person, shall, upon conviction, be fined any sum not less than \$10 and not to exceed \$100 for each and every offense, and each separate day during which such stagnant, foul or offensive water is permitted to remain upon the lot or lots or other premises or under the floor of any building owned or occupied by such person shall constitute a separate offense.

The ordinance specifies that persons violating the ordinance

shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction of any one of the sections shall be fined in any sum not less than \$10 and not to exceed \$100 and each day that the violation continues shall be deemed a separate and distinct offense and punishable as such.

Section 3 of the "trash ordinance" passed by the city commission in 1954 states, "It shall be the duty of every person, firm, or corporation, owning, managing, operating, leasing or renting any premises or any place where kitchen garbage accumulates, to provide a portable garbage can constructed of galvanized iron, tin or other suitable metal, with two handles and a tight fitting cover of a capacity not less than five gallons nor over 30 gallons; and the daily accumulation of kitchen garbage and dry kitchen refuse shall be placed in the garbage can. It shall also be the duty of every

person, firm or corporation to place all trash and rubbish from premises in boxes, sacks or barrels or other receptacles of reasonable size, provided that the gross weight does not exceed 100 pounds. The garbage cans and waste should be placed at the alley and where no alley is accessible, the trash and garbage should be placed inside curb line of street to be collected by garbage vehicle.

Crossley said that the ordinance would be enforced only in the business districts now.

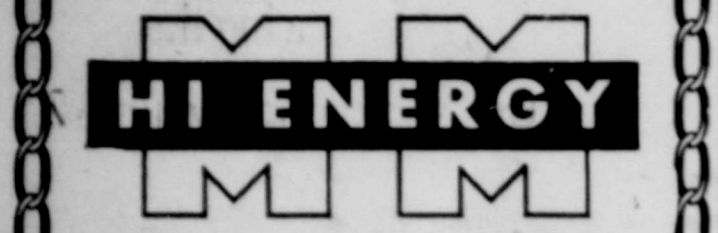

War on Garden Pests Is Aided by New Weapons

Gardeners this year have at their command a group of insect and fungus destroyers which are more effective against both these classes of garden pests, and safer for the gardener to use, than ever before.

Great progress has been made by scientists toward the ideal combination, which in one dust or spray will include killers for all insects, and curatives for all plant diseases.

No one has yet discovered anything, however, which will repair damage done to plants by these pests. You must protect your plants from injury by destroying the invaders as soon as they appear.

Since D.D.T. was made available to gardeners 10 years ago, prewar poisons have been almost entirely abandoned in favor of new chemicals. Now D.D.T. is being displaced by newer chemicals, not because of danger in its use, but because the newer materials do a better job.

Many of these have been developed, but experience and experiments have gradually centered attention upon a small group deemed most deadly for garden enemies, and safest for those who use them as pesticides and eat the fruit and vegetables they protect.

Outstanding for efficiency and safety are three—Methoxychlor, malathion and captan. Methoxychlor kills most of the leaf eating insects that D.D.T. kills and many which it fails to destroy. Malathion kills scale insects, mites, aphids and other hard to reach plant juice feeders, as well as many leaf chewers. Captan is a fungicide which controls black spot on roses and fungi which attack fruit trees, lawns and plants in general.

These three champions can be combined, either for a spray or dust, to take care of almost all insects and diseases which prey upon vegetables, fruits and flowers. Not only are they more effective, but far safer to use than were the trio that served home gardeners prior to World War II, which were arsenic, nicotine and bordeaux mixture.

For those with special problems in plant protection, there are other chemicals which may handle specific insects better than the all-around destroyers. For mites, of which red spider is most prevalent in gardens, aramite and karathane are excellent. Against fungi on roses and fruit trees, ferimate, also known as ferbam, is good. Lindane is an excellent insecticide for flowers. It kills both
