Shad Bad, Fishermen Mad, Solution Had

Are shad ruining fishing at Lake Leon? That's a question that is being tossed around a lot these days, and one which can get you an assortment of answers.

Some fishermen are claiming permission should be granted to some shad out of the lake. Others say no. Those who want to seine say the shad could be used as bait. They propose that only shad seined out of Lake Leon be used.

The State Game Commission says, "Gizzard shad are the principal item in the diet of gamefish, thus the overabundance of them in a lake makes it extremely easy for gamefish of desirable fishing size to satisfy their hunger. Since gamefish are seldom hungry, they are not readily caught with live or artificial baits. This accounts for the fact that few large gamefish are taken by fishermen."

Ranger Man on Board WTRA; Organization Has New Publication

CISCO — A new livestock publication, the West Texas Ranchman, will make its debut in the West Central Texas area on Saturday, Sept. 29.

The weekly stockmen's newspaper will be the official publication of the West Texas Ranchers association, an independent, non-profit organization which was formed in 1950 and now has a large membership in Eastland, Stephens, Palo Pinto, Callahan, Shackelford and adjoining counties.

In addition to publicizing affairs of the growing WTRA, The Ranchman will publish general news pertaining to the livestock industry and latest market reports including weekly sales transactions of auction rings operating in the area.

Field representatives for the publication will be Buddy Ross, a director of the association, and David Grissom. Tinto, Callahan, Shackelford and adjoining counties.

"We believe this new publication will be an important aid in the future growth and expansion of the association," Kimmell said, "and we feel it will fill a long felt need in supplying vital information of local interest to our members and also to non-member ranchmen in this area of Texas."

The six-year-old stockmen's organization is unique in that it has in its employ a full-time special ranger, A. C. Yeager of Eastland, veteran law enforcement officer, and also employs a private legal counsel, C. J. O'Connor of Breckenridge, who handles the legal problems of the WTRA and its individual members.

The efforts of Special Ranger Yeager, with the cooperation of county and state law enforcement officers, have paid off for the WTRA members with former prevalent area cattle thefts now a rarity. Protection of all property

of members, in addition to livestock, is the responsibility of the association's law enforcement officer.

In addition to Kimmell, other officers of the stockmen's group are R. D. Williams of Putnam, first vice president; T. C. Famro of Strawn, second vice president; Don Kincaid of Cisco, secretary; and L. A. Williams of Putnam, treasurer. Mrs. Peggy Gallagher is employed as secretary in the organization's central office which is located in Cisco.

Directors of the WTRA convene in Eastland on the first Thursday evening of each month, and the association's annual meeting is held in November.

The directors include R. W. Drake of Strawn, L. A. Williams of Putnam, B. E. Snyder of Moran, C. C. Cole of Strawn, Van Turner of Breckenridge, John Robertson of Ranger, Hugh Ross of Baird, W. G. Jones of Moran, Eddy Ross of Strawn, Sam Hall of Breckenridge, Roy Brickman of Eastland, N. M. George of Baird, Fred Wylie of Moran, C. B. Quant of Santo, and Buell Whiteside of Breckenridge.

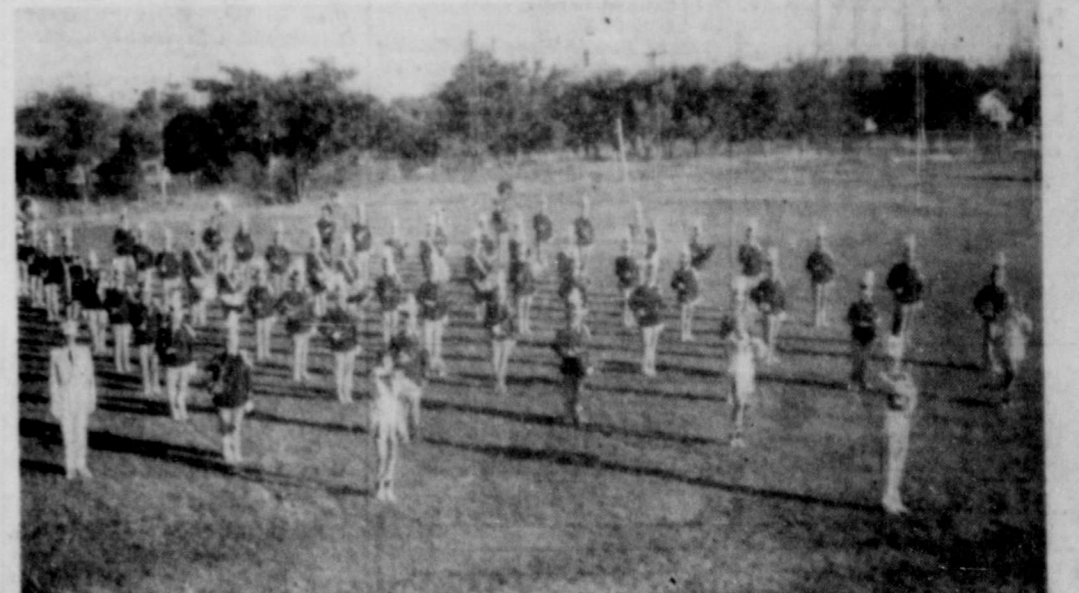
Grand Jury In Session; Heavy Work Outlined

but, as one fisherman said, "We want to keep it that way."

The Texas Game and Fish Commission has worked out one system.

Commission technicians have developed a formula whereby rough fish, such as gizzard shad, may be exterminated through use of rotenone in the water, with a minimum of harm to game species. Several huge areas have been successfully treated, the largest of them being Buffalo Lake in the Panhandle. After the shad were thinned down by treatment last spring, game fishing immediately improved and has been on the upgrade ever since, according to field reports.
