## If He Fails

Business is governed and controlled by credit and money. Credit is maintained solely by the ability of the people to eventually pay money. Wealth can only be created by mining, manufacturing, fishing, and agriculture. Business channels accumulate wealth but do not create it.

While the oil interests and other mining industries contribute to our wealth, and manufacturing and fishing will always be of importance, yet agriculture is, and will forever be, the main source of wealth in this State. It will be the only source through which will come the comforts and necessities of life. Agriculture will forever remain the chief factor in credit and money throughout this Nation.

Graph, showing the crop value per acre and the business failures over the period of years from 1866 to 1922, shows that the per cent of business failures rise and fall in direct ratio to the rise and fall of acre money returns from farm land.

The average net money returns per acre of land is in direct ratio to the acre yield. The farmer's ability to pay for land, and to live in comfort, and to prepare his children for the battles of life is in direct ratio to his labor income on the farm.

The business man's ability to succeed is dependent upon the farmer's ability to buy his goods.

The farmer's ability to pay sufficient revenue to keep his family in comfort is dependent upon soil fertility. Where there are fertile soils we find a contented and prosperous farm folk and prosperous business centers.

The first step in permanent fertility is conservation of soil. That must be done by terracing rolling lands and draining swampy lands. After land is terraced, or drained, the next step is to practice systematic crop rotation, and add barnyard manure and commercial fertilizer to improve the physical condition of the soil, and to add plant food.

The problem of soil conservation and soil fertility is a joint responsibility of the farmer and the business man. The welfare of both depend upon it. The individual farmer cannot escape his responsibility because his and his family's welfare depends upon the ability of his farm to produce abundantly. The business man cannot escape the responsibility because the success of his business depends upon the efficiency of the group of farmers comprising his trade territory.

The greater the bond of sympathy and cooperation that exists between the farmer and the business man, the greater is the success of both.

## South Plains Fair

LUBBOCK, Aug. (Special) Merchants all over the South Plains are cooperating in advertising the Panhandle South Plains Fair which will be held this year September 27, 28, 29, 30, and October 1.

While these merchants are boosting the exposition which has been known as the "Show Window of the Plains" on account of the completeness of exhibits each year, officials of the fair are busily engaged working out details for the fair.

The free attractions, carnival, fire works, and other attractions of this nature have been booked. Officials of the fair are busy at this time closing contracts with a number of high school football teams of this section which will make one of the greatest football cards that has ever been offered. The Texas Tech vs St. Edwards University of Austin will be the feature game of the fair while all the fast high school elevens will be seen in action.

Contracts have been signed with county agents, chamber of commerce secretaries and others for exhibit space in the agricultural building which indicate that the best display of farm products that have ever been assembled will be ready for the gaze of prospective settlers who will come here to see what the South Plains can produce.

The live stock show will have the largest variety of stock and the largest number of animals that has ever yet been gathered on the South Plains and many of the leading exhibitors of the Southwest will be here competing for honors with their top show stuff.

Superintendents of all departments are busy getting their work complete, in order that all details of the fair will be looked after before the gates are thrown open to the South Plains crowds September 27. Attendance records are expected to be broken this year. During the past few years, the attendance has surpassed all other regional fairs in this section of Texas and the South Plains exposition is expected to be far in the lead this year.

A. B. Davis, manager of the fair announces that the preliminary work of the fair is far ahead of schedule and that the fair has the biggest prospect for a good year in the history of the exposition.
