NOTICE TO SUDAN SCHOOL DISTRICT TAX PAYERS

The Sudan Indipendent School District will allow a 5 per cent reduction on all School Taxes paid by November 15th.

WEST TEXAS FEEDER BREEDER EXCHANGE

(D. A. Adam, County Agent)

Those desiring to feed out cattle, or lambs should get in touch with the county agent, as there has been received by him a plan by which cattle can probably be put into the feed lot on a cooperative basis with the ranchers desire to market their cattle in this manner. There are several plans by which this can be done.

Briefly: Agreement 1. The rancher agrees to put cattle into the feed lot in sound condition; Will pay one-half freight and handling charges from owners shipping point to final market; Reserve right to designate final market point, sales agency, and time for marketing of cat-Agrees that when cattle are finished and sold, owner will have as his part of the pro-ceeds of the sale the sum obtained by multiplying the original weight of the cattle by the sale price less 1.5 cent per lb.
If cattle are mortgaged, agrees
o secure written consent of mortagee on this agreement. Agrees to having payment made on cattle by marketing agency handling sale of cattle at ter-minal market. Will assume all loss from blackleg, Hemorragh-ic Septicimas, or other diseases which are preventable by vaccination.

The Feeder or Party of the second part agrees: to take possession of cattle at his shipping point; Will unload and allow the cattle to take on a fill of lead and will be seen as the seen feed and water for hours preceding the actual weighing. The weight of cattle at such time and place of weighing shall be considered as original weights; Agrees to furnish er, suitable feed yards and feeding troughs for cattle and feed of such k;nd and amounts nec-essary to finish cattle; Agrees to pay one-half the freight from point of origin to final market; Will stand expenses for feed, water, labor and veterinary services for said cattle during feeding period; Agrees to supervis-ion of feeding; Agree to set-tie with owner on the basis as set forth above; If feed is mortgaged agrees to secure written consent of mortgagee to this agreement; Will unload cattle on his farm. that point; Will not allow other cattle to be fed in the same

YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT
TOPIC-Winning through Love. I. Paul Preaching In Thessalon Ica (17:1-10).

1. His method (vv. 1, 2). He ob served the divine order, to the Jew first, and was exceedingly anxious for his kinsmen in the flesh, but when they proved themselves unworthy he turned to the Gentiles He went out on the Sabbath day so as to find them assembled to gether.

2. His message (v. 3). It was that Jesus is the Christ. In order to prove that Jesus is the Christ, he expounded unto them the Scriptures. Concerning Christ he set forth three propositions:

a. That Christ must needs have suffered (v 3). The suffering Christ was not welcomed by the Jews They were looking for a Messiah of a different type. . This is common today in our churches and Sunday schools. The cross is an offense.

b. "Risen again from the dead" (v. 3). This he also proved by the Scriptures. "That this Jesus whom 1 preached unto you is Christ (v. 3). whom he had proclaimed had suf-

fered and risen from the dead.

3. The attitude of the Jews toward his preaching (vv. 4-10). While some Jews believed and many Greeks, the envy of certain Jews was so aroused at Paul's success that they gathered together the worth ess fellows of the town and set on foot a rlot. They said. "These have turned the world upside down." It is true that the gospel is revolutionary, but not trea son to right government. They turned the preaching of Paul into a specious lie. He preached the kingship of Jesus (v. 7). Jesus is most assuredly coming to reign on

this earth. II. The Character of Paul's Min. Istry at Thessalonica (I Thess. 2:

In this section we have exhibited the temper of the apostolic minis try. It becomes an ideal for such as would follow in his wake. 1. It was courageous (vv. 1, 2)

In spite of shameful persecution Paul persisted in his ministry, der onstrating his devotion to the Lord. 2. Honest and guileless (vv. 3. 4). He had no ulterior motive. A one sent of God he faithfully min istered unto them, not giving con

sideration to man's favor. 3. Without flattering words (v. Regardless of the difficulty of his position, the prominence of the persons faced he never resorted to

4. Without a cloak of covetousness (v. 5). The impelling force of his life was devoted to God and interest in lost men. Opportunity for personal gain he waved aside.

5. He did not seek glory from man (v. 6), his supreme alm being to honor God. 6. He was gentle and affectionate (vv 7, 8). So vitally did he enter into the lives of the people

that he displayed gentleness, ever as a nursing mother with her chil 7. Unselfish (v. 9). In order that his motive be not questioned he

labored night and day for his sup-8. Irreproachable and blameless

(v. 10). He did not claim to be faultless, but he boldly challenged them as to his blamelessness. 9. His lofty aim (vv. 11, 12). It

was that they would walk worthy of God in keeping with their high calling. III. Paul Preaching In Berea

(Acts 17:10-15) 1. His method (v. 10). He entered the Jewish synagogue and preached Christ unto them.

2. The reception of the gospel by the Bereans (vv. 11, 12). It was with gladness of heart. The message was just as new to these Jews and just as counter to their way of thinking as it was to the Thessalonian Jews, but they had a more noble disposition. Two things are said of them:

a. They received the message gladly.

b. They searched the Scriptures daily for the truthfulness of the message which they had heard. For this worthy act Paul said that they were more noble than those at Thessalonica.

3. The wicked action of the Jews (vv. 13-15). Wicked Jews from Thessalonica followed the missionaries and stirred up the people against them, making it necessary for them to flee.
