

about dimmitt and castro county

There are indications that Castro County is at last on the eve of taking its place among the more prosperous and progressive counties of the High Plains. A number of recent developments presents a most encouraging overall picture for the immediate future of Castro County. For any area to be prosperous there are a few prerequisites that are necessary to eventual development, regardless of the natural resources that may abound in any given area. Although some of the finest cattle in the world are produced in Castro County, and regardless of the fact that the soil of this section is second to none in productivity and with an abundance of water just under the earth's surface, maximum development can be expected only, and not until, a number of requirements are met that will allow our section of the Panhandle to fall in stride with other parts of the Plains that have made phenomenal headway in developing their natural resources.

CASTRO COUNTY NEEDS PEOPLE

Before we can expect any great influx of population, which is necessary to exploit our natural resources to the fullest, certain inducements must first be offered to those who are looking for locations for permanent homes. This writer believes that a number of steps have been, and are being taken in the right direction to accomplish that purpose.

First an elaborate system of highways have been set up for Castro County, with prospects for at least one other highway to traverse the county, that as yet has not been designated. Certainly until our highways are a reality, with all weather surfacing, we cannot expect our county to compete with more fortunate areas that are well equipped with roads that places the rural population within a few minutes of its trading center. We are certain that the five designated highways leading into Dimmitt will be paved as soon as equipment and materials are available. Good roads will attract population.

Second. The educational facilities of the county have been greatly enhanced by a recent centralizing program that places practically every section of the county within the boundaries of an affiliated and approved public school system. Desirable citizens will first investigate our school systems before locating in our county. We can now stand that investigation. Our schools will attract population.

Third. An adequate health center is necessary to care for and to induce people to locate in our county. This need is certain to be met by a community hospital operated in a manner that will be adequate to care for the health of the citizens of this area regardless of the increase in numbers. An organization has already been completed and plans have been made for incorporation, pending the receipt of a charter, of a health center to be known as the Plains Memorial Hospital. The type of hospital planned will grow with the community, affording the most modern medical service available. Adequate medical service will attract population.

Fourth. Irrigation of the fertile land in Castro County will require additional labor. Wells are being drilled in the shallow water area—which comprises about three-fourths of the county—as fast as equipment can be secured. Irrigation will result in the growing of potatoes and other produce. This locality is practically assured of a potato processing plant by the time another crop is produced. Irrigation will attract population.

Another inducement for an increase in population in Castro County is its fine and elaborate elevators, equipped for the care of grain and other farm products; its machine shops that render an unexcelled service; its implement houses that supply the leading makes of farm machinery; and other types of service and supplies that makes this a well rounded

Outlook Good For Large Potato Industry Here

Investigation into the possibility of a potato processing plant for Dimmitt next year has been under way by a number of local business men and farmers for the past several weeks, and as a result prospects are good for the development of the potato industry in this section. A number of proprietors of plants have been investigating the need of a processing plant in Dimmitt, and have manifested much interest in the future development of the industry in this locality.

Mr. E. L. Adams, potato grower who moved from Idaho to Castro County last year, and who produced a large potato crop on the Jack Miller farm north of Dimmitt, was a guest at the regular meeting of the Dimmitt Lions Club Tuesday, declared that Castro County had a bright future in the production of potatoes and other produce, and that it was his belief that conditions were ideal all over the shallow-water area of the county for produce production. Mr. Adams also stated that he was considering the installation of a potato processing plant in Dimmitt, and that he would make an extensive investigation of the potential possibilities of potato production.

Social Security Payments Sure

There is no possibility of loss of benefits under the old-age and survivors insurance program, said James L. Farmer, manager of the Amarillo, Texas office of the Social Security Board, if the wage earner in covered employment will report to the Social Security Board field office immediately after he attains the age of 65. This, he emphasized, is of great importance to the wage earner because he needs to know the requirements necessary in filing a claim for insurance payments. This applies to the widow of a deceased wage earner; she, too, is requested to contact the nearest Social Security Board field office and ask for the manager or some member of the staff to give her information regarding the filing of claims.

It was pointed out that the Board is anxious to cooperate with claimants in every way possible to expedite the filing of claims. The claimant should notify the office as soon as possible after reaching age 65.

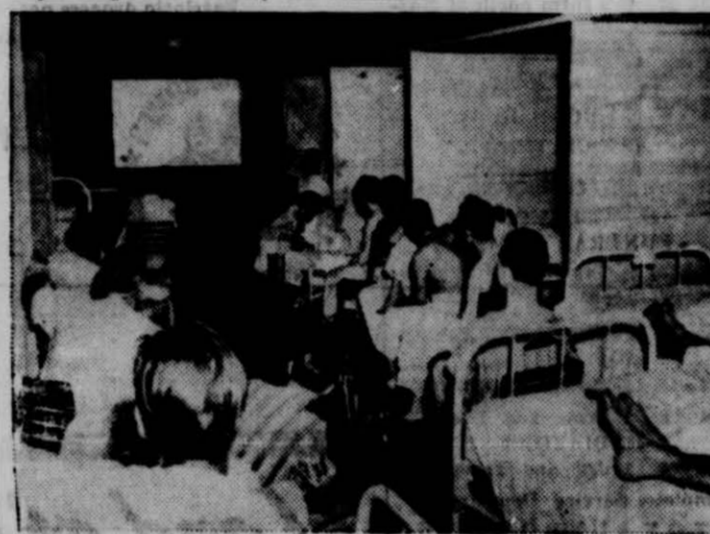

Wheat Goals Recommended For Next Year

A Texas Wheat goal of 5,200,000 acres seeded for harvest in 1946 has been announced by Mr. B. F. Vance. This provides for continued full production in line with the 1945 seeded acreage of 5,028,000 acres.

The goal represents Texas' share of estimated requirements during 1946-47 for food, industrial and other non-food uses, and reserves. Although a record national wheat crop of 1,085 million bushels is to be indicated for this year, the carry-over July 1, 1946, is not expected to be excessive because of heavy requirements for wheat during the months ahead, particularly for re-feeding. Estimated requirements for wheat may be somewhat smaller by the time 1946 wheat crop moves to market, but are expected to equal production at average yields from an acreage as large as this year's.

MEATS AND FATS: Book IV, red stamps Q2 through E1 are good for 10 points each. F1, G1, H1, J1 and K1 become valid August 1. Q2 through U2 expire August 31.

PROCESSED FOODS: Book IV, blue stamps Y2 through N1 are good for 10 points each. P1 through T1 become valid August 1. Y2 through C-1 expire August 31.

SHOES: Book III, stamps one, two and three and four with airplane pictures, each good for one pair of shoes indefinitely. No. 4 was validated August 1.

GASOLINE: (Coupons must be endorsed on front) A coupons, 6 gallons each with No. 16 expiring September 21. B-7, B-8, B-9, C-7 and C-8 rations have a value of 5 gal. each. R-2, R-3 and R-4, 5 gal.
