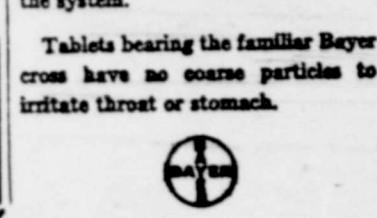

### ON TEXAS FARMS

Groceries and clothes for his family during the summer is the way Truman Harrell of Stephens county spent the money he made on an 8-acre 4-H club demonstration. At very little expense he took in \$80 from corn that made 40 bushels per acre, and \$25 from fresh corn sold.

He wouldn't take \$500 for his terraces, says Ben Boeker of Gay Hill in Washington county after gathering the biggest corn crop in his farming experience on his terraced field. The county agent is helping him to terrace the rest of the farm for Mr. Boeker says he is through building up the river bottoms.

The feeding of high protein mash and minerals to turkeys, as shown in turkey flock demonstrations by county agents in recent years, has resulted in the highest grade turkey crop in Blanco county in history. There are very few crooked breasts.

Five thousand bushels of cotton seed produced on the School-land Community one-variety cotton block in Gonzales county in cooperation with the U. S. Bureau of Plant Industry and the county agent have been distributed in other communities in the county which have standardized on one variety. The saving is rated at about \$5000.

Wiley Martindale of Campground Community in Jasper county says terracing increased his cotton yield from one bale to 15 acres, to one bale to 4 1-4 acres. No fertilizer was used, the county agent reports.

Buster Boland of Montague county 4-H club boy, has made about \$40 on two beef calves fed on home grown feed supplemented with cottonseed meal. They were sold late in October weighing 890 pounds and 740 pounds, for six cents and five cents per pound, respectively.

Farwell—One hundred and fifty heads of cabbage, 16 bushels of beets and some turnips have been stored in a long pit one foot deep, dug with a scraper by Mr. and Mrs. Roy Thornton of Farwell, Parmer county. The pit was lined with corn shucks and cabbage placed roots up, one layer deep.

Then the beets and turnips were placed one layer deep and the pit covered with shucks and dirt. The Thorntons have found this method satisfactory for several years, according to Miss Rozelle McKenney, home demonstration agent.

Grosbeck—For only the price of 1 dozen cans and 2 dozen fruit jars, Mrs. Travis Lattner of the Pleasant Grove Home Demonstration club in Limestone county has on her pantry shelves 1,015 containers of food representing 60 varieties of fruits, vegetables and meats. Most of her cans were secured by canning for other people.

An 8-by-8 foot room adjoining her kitchen was equipped with shelves on three sides to provide storage for her canned stuff. The shelves were painted, the cans labeled, and the pantry organized, and on October 14th the Pleasant Grove club held open house at the Lattner home so that visitors might view the results of her work.

Pearsall—A total of 350 number 3 containers of food for the Red Cross was filled by Josepha Trevino, wife of a Mexican butcher in Pearsall, after a

member of a Frio county home demonstration club has taught her to use a canner and sealer. She was assisted by Miguel Cantu and his wife, and together they filled over 800 cans with meats and vegetables. Mrs. Trevino had never seen anything canned before this summer.

Clarendon—From 2 to 3 gallons per week of fresh strawberries, preserves for her pantry, and a start for beds for 100 friends, have all come from 100 Everbearing Mastodon plants set out last year by Mrs. J. M. Accord. She has given more than 1000 plants to her friends, states Miss Martha Buttrill, home demonstration agent.
