Relief-hardly a problem at all

However, the state and federal come under periodic attack by condestroyed or drastically reduced. It is one of the favorite whipping posts of everyone trying to make a case against bureaucratic government operations.

The implications left are that people on welfare are professional leeches, lazy, chronic unemployed and criminals and that liberal democrats are responsible for all

that none of us-even the most taxhating conservative alive-wants anyone to starve to death in this land of plenty. If we are going to call ourselves a nation of enlightened people, we must set about to correct the abuses and not kill the program as so many people

We are in full realization that one woman in New Jersey was drawing relief for 14 illegitimate children by ten different fathers; that one family with 23 children, 15 illegitimate, was found to be drawing \$1,000 a month in relief; that one man refused to take a job because he was making more on relief than the salary would pay; that there is out-and-out fraud in hundreds of cases. This, however, does not cancel out the need for stified relief programs.

These programs and their adinistration are becoming a national problem, if not a real head-ache. When they were set up it was taken for granted the recipients would take the money only as a last resort because of the stigma attached to taking doles. Later de-lent children-legitimate or ilitimate-were added to welfare es, and then more and more cases of real need were pointed out and added.
