Bradshaw scored a 36 hole total of 156, followed by Burch's 157 and Beck's 159.



Rains Are Blessing to Eastland County Area

Recent rains were a great blessing to our land in replenishing soil moisture. Fortunately our immediate vicinity to date has escaped the torrential floods and hail so common to this country at this season.

In this area water is no less important than soil fertility for both forage and crop production. The amount of water we get into the soil during the month of May determines to a large extent the amount of forage we grow in our pastures each summer and has a big influence on the crop we harvest in the fall. May is also the month that nature exacts the greatest toll of our soil in payment for our misuse of the land.

The explosive energy of falling raindrops is the prime mover of soil and plant nutrients from our land. Any one wishing to observe this should put on their raincoat and take a walk during a heavy spring shower. They should first stoop down and watch the raindrops striking and churning bare ground, and then they should observe raindrops falling on a lush growth of green grass.

In an ordinary one-inch rain the energy expended on an acre of land is incredible. Actually the weight of the water alone is over one hundred tons. A single object of this weight falling out of the sky would rock the earth and blast out an enormous crater. In an ordinary rain each individual drop hitting the film of water on bare ground spurts up a small geyser one to three inches high. As the geyser settles back, concentric waves are set in motion, which break the detached soil particles in suspension. The detached particles are either carried off in runoff water or they form mud.

This muddy suspension seeps into the natural crevices and pores of the soil and seals the worm holes and root channels. Crusted and puddled soils so common in this vicinity are the product of this raindrop activity.

The only method of combating the destructive power of the raindrop is a soil cover for cushioning its impact. In a soil which is well covered with grass or any type plant residue raindrops are broken into a fine spray which settles harmlessly. The clear water trickles down the grass litter into the soil and the natural channels of percolation remain open for the free movement of both water and air.

All known soil and water conservation measures may be divided into two categories—those that cover the soil from the explosive rain drop and those earth moving and shaping practices for controlling the speed or detention of runoff water. Obviously earth moving practices, whether they be small terraces or enormous dams, must be supported by vegetative cover on the watershed above them. Any structure built by man is soon choked with silt unless the water shed where the rain falls is not covered with vegetation.

J. H. Ervin Retires From Lone Star Gas

J. H. Ervin of 704 Young Street was retired from Lone Star Gas Company April 30, after 17 years with the company.

Ervin celebrated his 65th birthday April 6. He began his oil field career in 1916 with the T&P Coal and Oil Company. He later worked for the Texas Oil Company and Warren City Tank and Boiler Builders.

Prior to his job with Lone Star he was an inspector for the Texas Highway Department, inspecting asphalt, steel and concrete for bridge and road construction.

On July 15, 1943 he went to work for Lone Star Gas Company, and worked for 15 years on the tank car loading rack. On September 27, 1950 he fell 15 feet from a tank car to the floor of the loading rack. He was off work for nine months and 11 days with a crushed leg. Doctors told him that it was possible that he would never walk or work again, but with sheer will power and determination he returned to the same work and reached retirement age. He is the only man ever to be retired from the tank car loading rack.

Ervin said that he had never worked for a company that treated their employees as well as Lone Star. He went on to say that he wished to thank all his fellow employees for the nice fishing tackle gift that they gave to him on his retirement.

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IT'S THE LAW
in Texas

"THE KING CAN DO NO WRONG"

How could anybody ever say: "The king can do no wrong" (When we know of kings who did wrong.)

The idea looks simple: As absolute law maker, the king could hold himself above any law. He was under no law and could therefore do no legal wrong.

Anyway, when King George lost the thirteen colonies, the American states took over the doctrine of Sovereign Immunity: Nobody

can sue a government agency without the state's permission, when the agency is doing government work. (Of course if the agency is doing "proprietary functions" like running street cars or making electricity, it may often be sued like any other business.)

Thus suppose for lack of due care a private bakery truck should harm your child who had done nothing to bring on the accident. Well then, most likely you could sue the bakery in the child's behalf and collect damages.

But not with government agencies unless the legislature gives you lawful permission.

Thus in the old days, if an army jeep harmed your child (you could collect only if Congress passed a special bill awarding damages.)

Recently this doctrine has been attacked: Why shouldn't the government pay like any other organization?

So during the last was the federal government in response to

public opinion passed a "tort liability" law. It gives the people much more power to sue than before the last war. And the courts much more often than Congress now set the damages in many kinds of cases.

In Texas, the Legislature by a proper action may permit certain general types of suits to be brought against the state, under various conditions and restrictions. Then, if a specific situation arises which is not covered by the general rules, the legislators are authorized to pass a special measure to permit suit to be brought.

Therefore, any person seeking to enforce a claim against the State of Texas through the courts must petition the Legislature for the necessary permission, unless his claim falls within some general category or type previously recognized by our lawmakers. During each session, the Legislature passes legislation allowing suits to be brought against the state in a variety of cases.

Sometimes, however, suits may be brought against individual's holding office under the State of Texas and acting as agents of the state, but where the state itself is not the principal party to the suit, without first gaining consent to sue. There are numerous situations in which an individual officer may be sued with regard to the duties and functions of his office, and in which the state is not directly or substantially a part in interest.

Suppose you do obtain legislative permission to sue the state. What happens then?

If suit is brought against the State of Texas, and the action is successfully prosecuted, you will be awarded a judgment against the state. Then, it's back to the Legislature for more legislation to appropriate the necessary money with which the state may pay off the judgment.
