Fire Chief Warns Of Fire Hazards

Fire Chief Charlie Isabell announced today that the coldest winter weather is in front of us, and as the cold increases, so does the number of fires, fire deaths and injuries from fire. "It is each individual's responsibility to help keep the fires in Ranger to a minimum," the Chief went on to say.

Isabell said that a recent report from the State Board of Insurance on fire death and injury, prompted him to make the above statement. The report stated that approximately 510 deaths in Texas occurred from fire during 1959.

A classification of the deaths by ages shows that they fall into the following age groups: children 14 years of age and under 150; aged people 60 years and older, 170; and people between the age of 15 and 60 years, 190.

Approximately 30 percent of the children who die from fire were three years of age or under. Also, approximately 95 percent of the fire deaths occurred in the home. Fire death reports indicate that an estimated 65 percent of the fire deaths resulted from being trapped in the home. It appears that the number one cause of fire deaths was matches—smoking, smoking in bed and children playing with matches. The number two cause of fire deaths was from electrical fires, such as improper fusing, overloaded electrical circuits and defective wiring and appliances. The number three cause of fire deaths was unprotected open heating units (young and old backing into unprotected heating units), defective stoves and gasoline in starting or quickening fires, the misuse of gasoline as a cleaning fluid in the home and otherwise. It was estimated that 85 percent or more of the fire deaths in 1959 from the four fire causes listed, occurred in the home.

The State Board of Insurance offered two plans, or methods, of how fire deaths may be reduced.

The first step in bringing about a reduction of death toll from fire on the local level is to prevent fires from starting. Nine out of ten home fires could be prevented if home owners would:

- Keep matches away from small children and encourage adults to smoke safely—never in bed.
- Stop misuse of electricity by improper fusing, overloaded circuits and defective wiring and appliances.

Chief Isabell asks that everyone take the above mentioned items seriously and put them into practice to help make Ranger safer from fire. He also stated that everyone should place the Fire alarm number close to their telephone for emergency use. The fire alarm number is MI 7-1122.

Adopt a plan of escape from the upper floor of the home.

Pick an outside assembly point where the family will meet, and be sure everyone understands the rule—"once out—stay out."

Cheek all ash trays, heating stoves, furnaces, and other possible places where fire might start before retiring in the evening.

Make sure that all members of the family know how to properly turn in a fire alarm to conserve time and confusion.

Ross Wilson of Gorman, manager of Southwestern Peanut Growers Association, will attend the big conference of agricultural leaders from all over the nation, to be held in Washington Jan. 26.

His attendance results from an invitation recently received from Secretary of Agriculture, Designate, Orville L. Freeman. The conference is being called to consider policies and programs for American agriculture.

Recommendations are scheduled to be presented by the presidents of the five general agricultural organizations having broader membership, as planned at the recent exploratory conference held on Jan. 5 in New York at the invitation of President-Elect Kennedy.

The Southwestern Peanut Growers Association is invited to submit in writing any formal recommendations it wishes to make.

The conference will be a day long session, out of which it is hoped will develop a sound and broad base of consultation, discussion and cooperation among leaders of farm organizations and from which there may emerge a general agreement on the goals we seek for American agriculture and a broad consensus with regard to programs essential to achieve these goals," Wilson said.

Closely Follow Instructions, Says IRS Director

Here's how you can get better service from your District Internal Revenue Service office, according to Ellis Campbell Jr., Dallas District Director.

"Closely follow the instructions accompanying each return, bill or notice."

"Be certain you enclose with your remittance the properly completed form, or the Director's copy of the bill or notice as indicated. It's a good idea to paper clip—not staple—these to your check or money order."

"When your account number is stated, enter it on your check."

"Type or print your name and address wherever required."

"Mail your remittance and papers to the proper Internal Revenue office—and don't forget that the final date for filing that return for 1960 is April 17."

"Typing or printing your name and address on your 1960 tax return could mean the difference in receiving an eligible refund," Fogle said.

The IRS representative said his district office still has many refund checks from other years which can't be delivered due to illegible writing on the taxpayer's part.

College Survey Reveals Students Unacquainted With Top Personalities

According to a recent survey taken at Ranger College, the average college student is not very well informed about people.

A personality quiz containing names of fifty persons prominent in athletics, drama, politics, religion, or history was given. Also included on the list were local personalities and college personnel. Other names which might not fit into these categories may be classified as outstanding personalities who frequently make the headlines of all major newspapers. But in spite of the apparent familiarity of the names only two students, Mary Beth Cameron of Rochester and Betty Pirkle of Ranger, recognized forty out of fifty people listed. Several identified from twenty-five to thirty, but the average record was ten or fifteen correctly identified.

A common mistake was confusion of surnames. For instance Jim Wright, Fort Worth Congressman who is running for Johnson's vacated Senate seat was confused with both the Wright brothers, inventors of the airplane, and No-man Wright, former editor of the Ranger Times. Frances Perkins, first woman Cabinet member, was identified as pastor of the First Baptist Church, as the pastor's wife, and as the daughter. Other mixups included Betty Hutton, Robert Horne, Johnny Horton, Bob Dylans on Floyd, Patte and Delbert, and U. C. and Henry Jacks and Nicholas Jackson.

Not more than one or two recognized Nancy Anne Fleming, current Miss America. Some identified her as an actress; others as a Cabinet wife. T. V. was identified, thinking of Rhonda Fleming and Mrs. Arthur Fleming. Very few recognized Margaret Truman by her married name, Mrs. Clifford Daniel. The last name on the list was that of three-year old daughter of President-elect John F. Kennedy. In spite of the fact that both Caroline and her mother, Jacqueline, are frequent

No New Chart On Employees Tax Increase

The Internal Revenue Service has received hundreds of letters and calls requesting a booklet to take care of the security increase from 8 percent to 3.1 per cent. There is no booklet. There has been no increase. What happened? Internal Revenue included a little yellow booklet, Document 5295, with the Employer's Quarterly Tax Report 941 mailed in December. The yellow slip told employees four or more that there had been an increase in the federal employment tax from 3 per cent to 3.1 per cent for the year 1961.

It also told the employers of changes in social security taxes. A whole lot of taxpayers thought the social security tax had been changed so they added to the Internal Revenue for a new Circular E. Circular E is the Employer's Tax Guide which contains the giving social security and holding tax rates. Of course, there is no new Circular E.

Small Business Adm. Announces New Loan Program

C. W. Ferguson, Regional Director of the Dallas Small Business Administration, announced today a new type of loan by his Agency in which banks may participate for as little as two years, while SBA continues its part of the credit a longer period of time. Ferguson said he believed that banks who are accustomed to lending for short periods will be encouraged to participate with the Small Business Administration. The new type loan would assist them in financing small firms by advancing part of the funds for a short period while SBA funds would be on long terms. The plan does not provide the

private participating institutions any preference in the collateral for the loans. Banks participating in the new type loans will be permitted to receive all payments of principal made within 60 days of due date. Interest will be apportioned between the bank and SBA according to their respective unpaid balances. In the case of default the respective rights of the Small Business Administration and the bank will be fixed in recoveries out of liquidation of collateral in proportion to their respective unpaid balances as of the date of delinquency. The bank will have the option to renew its participation or to purchase the entire balance of the loan when the loan is satisfactorily functioning during the early years. Ralph Yarborough Report

Dear Fellow Texans: The new Cold War Veterans GI Bill to extend educational and on-the-job training opportunities to 4 1-4 million Americans who helped keep the Free World's guard high in this Cold war has gone to the Senate Labor and Public Welfare Committee for study. Thirty-one Senators joined me in sponsorship of this proposal which shows that there is national recognition of the program's value.

Some 200,000 Texans would be eligible for schooling or specialized training under the bill. It passed the Senate 57 to 31 last session but died in the House Veterans Committee.

Today, time and events dictate even more strongly the passage of this program for these reasons: (1) It is a matter of individual justice, because only about 46 percent of our young men serve under current draft procedures; leaving the 54 percent who do not serve with a head start in the economic struggle unless these veterans are furnished some educational training.

(2) It is a matter of national economic benefit, for it assures that some 4 1-4 million men will have a chance for professional or technical training that will increase productivity and minimize serious, heavy unemployment among those who are untrained.

(3) It is a matter of national security, for it will greatly improve the attitude and morale of men called to service. In the years immediately ahead, this nation must move forward on all educational fronts. We cannot afford to overlook the value of established programs that have proved out well, from the standpoint both of the individuals concerned and of society as a whole. And that is the kind of program we have in the Cold War GI Bill.

... for here we can point to positive accomplishments and results from our past dealings with the veterans of this nation.

In enacting the two previous GI bills, for veterans of World War II and the Korean Conflict, the Congress wisely provided two of the most farsighted, beneficial programs ever known to any society or government. In education alone the two previous GI bills gave the nation 450,000 engineers and 180,000 doctors and nurses. It provided training for more than 150,000 physicians, chemists and other scientists. About 230,000 teachers -- our most sorely needed trained human resource -- are now available because of these bills.

But the college trained professionals constitute only a part of the national dividends that will accrue from this measure. Equally important are the technicians and skilled workers who will be produced by the training in schools below college level -- on-the-job and on-the-farm training. These types of training, which will be

As a result of present day food buying and eating habits, many experts on dietetics are convinced that this nation's livestock and the family pets have a better chance of getting a balanced diet than do many children.

This analysis was discussed recently by Agriculture Commissioner John C. White before a woman's club in San Antonio.

"We recoil in horror over the fact that millions of people in the Far East and Latin America are underfed," said Commissioner White. "But there are 25 million people in this country who are just as bad off from a health standpoint."

"America is well off so far as an abundance of food is concerned, but we are not properly selecting and using our foods to their best advantage. Instead, our food products are becoming victims of a fast-paced civilization.

"We have become a nation of the skipped breakfast, the quick lunch and the pre-cooked supper. The food industry has kept up with this demand. Their production methods are geared to this harassing cry for quick and easy meals. These timesavers often prove to be great robbers of nutrition from our meals — and they help deflate our pocket books as well."

In the highly competitive race for the housewife's shopping dollar, White pointed out, food industry advertising concentrates on "easy preparation" and attractive packaging of food.

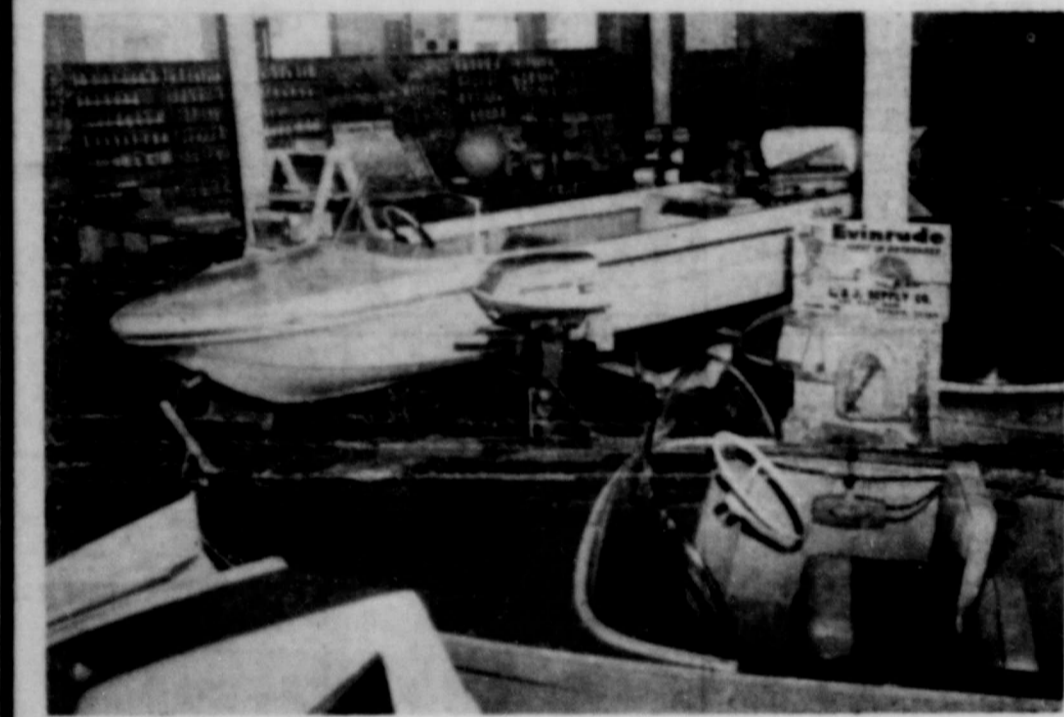


