

Let's Look At Ranger

No organization is stronger than its membership—either in number or initiative.

In some organizations a small number of members are all that is necessary. They can, although small in number, meet and cope with all the problems that arise for the organization.

Other organizations need larger membership to meet and cope with all its problems.

But any organization, to be a success at what it is organized for, needs the participation of all its members to make it a success.

An organization needs its officers and directors. An executive unit to guide and direct its organizing and planning—a body of responsible people to make decisions for the organization. Any membership organization cannot function properly without officers and directors.

And, on the other hand, any membership organization cannot function properly without the members being allowed to take active participation in the operations of the organization.

We, as members of the Ranger Chamber of Commerce, think that a general membership meeting of the Chamber of Commerce should be held at least once a month.

An informal luncheon or supper meeting, where the entire membership of the Chamber could get together and talk over current activities, progress on projects and thoughts for future planning. The luncheon or supper could be a pay as you go affair. Of course it doesn't have to be all right. A monthly progress report could be given at the membership meeting—telling what is being accomplished on all projects. A discussion period could be held and ideas submitted for study by a recommendations committee. This committee could screen the ideas and suggestions and submit the most logical ones to the board of directors for action.

By the adoption of this plan the Chamber of Commerce could benefit by getting more support from its members. The members would feel that they were a part of the organization. They would see what progress is being made on any project. By the monthly reports, the Chamber would be getting the benefit of more active committees. Committees would work harder to show a positive report if the report was to be given before the entire membership each month. The Chamber would be benefiting from the thinking of the entire membership—and not of just a few. The old saying of "two heads are better than one" has always held true, and will continue to hold true.

It's a proven fact that the best stimulant for business is competition. This will hold true in almost anything. A ballplayer will play harder if he has competition. An actor will play a better part if someone is trying to beat him out of his part. Even a horse will run harder if he is being run against. Then— isn't it logical that a committee will work harder if another committee is showing a good progress report. No one wants to be a lagard in the eyes of others. A report of committee progress each month could serve as an incentive for all committees to work harder.

It's an established fact that a lot of hard work is going to be necessary for Ranger to get on the road to recovery. This work is not going to be accomplished by a few people. It's going to take the entire town—and what better way is there of getting it done than through the Chamber of Commerce. It is going to have to be done by a Chamber of Commerce that has the support and participation of its entire membership.

Let's establish a monthly Chamber of Commerce membership meeting. Get the support and participation of all its members.

It might be surprising at the good that could be accomplished.

Import Duty On Foreign Oil Demanded by Bailey

Rep. Scott Bailey this week introduced a resolution in the Texas House of Representatives calling on Sen. Ralph Yarborough to introduce and sponsor legislation to impose an import duty of \$1.50 per barrel on the foreign oil imports that "are creating grave financial evils."

Bailey, who represents Eastland, Callahan and Shackelford counties, said such an import duty is needed since there are hundreds of wells throughout Texas without pipeline connections and, whereas, small farmers, land owners and royalty owners in the state are being deprived of much needed bonus and rental monies.

Rep. Bailey told The Times that little has been done so far in the House other than organization.

"About the only business transacted each day is a roll call and then the offering of resolutions general pertaining to memorials and congratulations," he declared.

He said Speaker James Turman has been interviewing members as to their preference of committee assignments and called the task a tremendous one. Bailey expects committee assignments to be made about Monday or Tuesday. He was a Turman supporter and thus is in line for some favorable committee assignments.

Voters May Get Chance To Vote on Taxation Bill

A bill has been introduced in the Texas legislature that would give the people an opportunity to express their preference of the type of state tax that the lawmakers should adopt.

The author of the legislation is Representative Wesley Roberts of Seminole who said the people would vote on the type of tax desired on April 4 if his bill is approved. On the same day, voters will cast ballots in a special election to fill the U. S. Senate post that has been vacated by Vice-President Lyndon Johnson.

Under terms of the Roberts proposal, three types of broad-based taxes would be presented to the voters:

1. A payroll tax
2. An income tax
3. A sales tax

"I think nearly everyone agrees that we must have some sort of broad-based tax if we are ever to solve the state's financial problems," Roberts said.

Beginning this week, Blue Cross of Texas is mailing to members and member families a letter containing a Blue Cross scotchite rear bumper sticker for their cars.

More than 500,000 of these will be mailed out in the belief that their use will help to reduce accidents on Texas streets and highways.

Scotchite reflective material on the rear bumper of a car is visible in the headlights of a car for a great distance, even when the tail light is not burning. Any reduction in rear end collisions which will save lives and help prevent injury.

W. R. McBoe, Executive Director of the organization, stated that the project was developed in order to add to the protection of Blue Cross members and as a contribution on the part of Blue Cross to statewide safety activities.

Questionnaires Must Be Filed By Pensioners

Widows of deceased war veterans who get monthly pension payments from the Veterans Administration were reminded today to return questionnaires from the VA concerning their anticipated income for calendar 1961.

Edward P. Onstot, manager of the VA Regional Office in Dallas said VA is required to remove from the pension rolls those who do not return the cards to VA within 30 days after receipt.

Death pension is payable to widows of war-time veterans who die of causes not connected with military service. It differs from death, or dependency and indemnity, compensation, paid to widows of veterans who die while in service, or following discharge, as a result of a service-connected disability.

Questionnaires were not sent to widows drawing service-connected death benefits, nor to widows of veterans of the Spanish-American War.

Widows of World War I, World War II and Korean Conflict veterans are not eligible for pension if their annual income exceeds certain limitations. For this reason, Mr. Onstot said, information concerning the widows income, also the status of her dependents, if any, must be reviewed at the beginning of each year.

In cases where widows themselves are ineligible or have died but minor children remain who are receiving pension, the guardian or custodian of the child should complete the questionnaire as to the child's income and return it promptly.

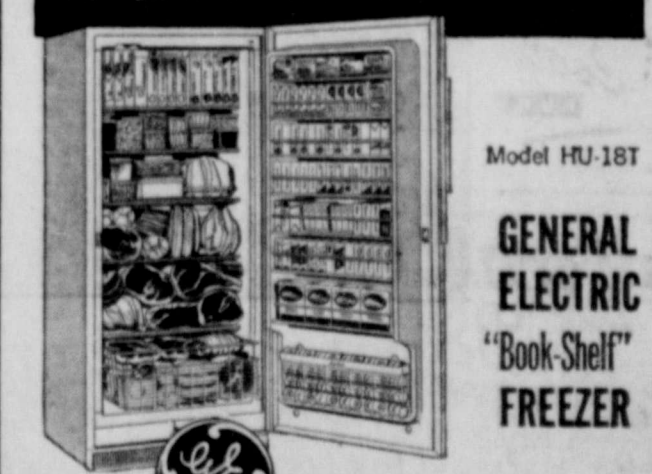

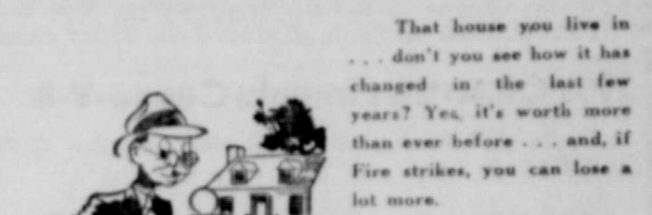

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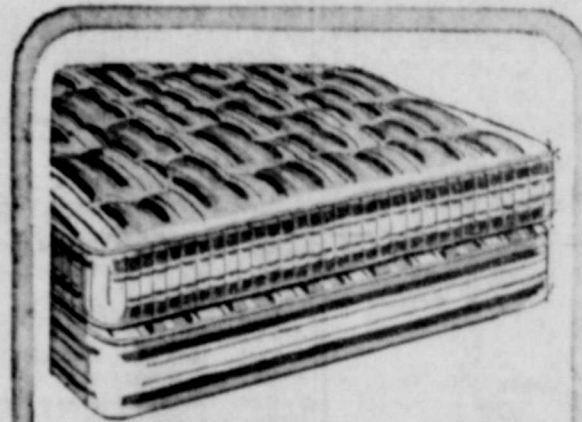
