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AUSTIN REPORT

This week the House Revenue and Taxation Committee will begin to look seriously at Tax Bills. Among them are: H. R. 334 by Chairman Charles Ballman of Berger; this Bill would bring revision in the 1959 tax code to stop up revenue and close loopholes. H. R. 331 by Rep. Franklin Spears of San Antonio; this Bill would revise the present franchise tax and would add \$10,000,000 a year and would be enlarged to include some 7,000 interstate corporations. Also Rep. George Hinson's H. R. 339, which would provide for a one-year increase from 7 per cent to 10 per cent in production tax on natural gas.

One of the first Bills to reach the House floor and receive final passage was H. B. 53. This Bill has been called the "Cotton Trailer Bill." It raises the farm trailer exemption from 4,000 lbs. gross weight to 14,000 lbs. gross weight. H. B. 59 passed by a vote of 130 to 16. It goes now to the Senate; it's anybody's guess what the Senate will do with it. Legislation concerning water conservation is getting a lot of attention in this session. This seems to be one subject that everyone is interested in. We of the West Texas Delegation are all vitally interested. The Hubbard Creek Bills are due to get a hearing this week. I am pleased to be able to add my small part in urging their passage.

Courts and Judicial Districts seem to be getting a lot of attention this Session, also. Of interest to our area is a Bill that would remove Shackelford County from the 42nd District and place it in with Stephens and Young Counties. I joined in this move only after a large representative group from Shackelford County urged the action. This move will help to ease the crowded court situation of the 42nd District which still includes Taylor and Callahan Counties. Both Taylor and Callahan should get cases brought to trial prompter now. Hearings on these Bills should be set in the near future.

Our West Texas delegation meetings for last week was postponed due to the bad weather last weekend. Roads in West Texas were almost impassable. The meeting has been re-scheduled.

Veterans and Dependents Risk Losing Pensions

About 4,000 veterans, or their dependents or survivors, in North-central Texas are risking termination of their pensions because they have failed to return a 1960 income questionnaire, the Veterans Administration has warned.
Edward P. Onstot, manager of the Dallas VA Regional Office, said the questionnaires were mailed with December checks to approximately 28,000 payees and should have been returned to the Dallas office before the end of January.
Unless the questionnaires are returned immediately, properly filled out and signed, VA has no choice under the law other than to suspend the pension payments, Onstot said.
The questionnaires were sent only to veterans and widows and orphans of veterans who receive non-service-connected pension, and dependent parents of deceased veterans who are receiving dependency and indemnity compensation.
Veterans receiving service-connected compensation and widows and orphans of deceased veterans receiving death compensation or dependency and indemnity compensation are not required to file statements of annual income, Onstot said.
Also, he added, dependent parents of deceased veterans receiving death compensation are not required to file the annual income statements.

Demonstrations Prove Value of Soil Testing

A group of Cherokee county corn growers know that fertilizing according to soil test recommendations doesn't cost a lot but pays. The farmers, cooperating with county Agricultural Agent Steve Lilly, conducted demonstrations last year on their farms to compare yields from plots fertilized according to soil test recommendations and from others where usual rates of fertilizer were used.
In a summary report, from Lilly to W. F. Bennett, extension soil chemist, the value of soil testing for determining fertilizer needs was definitely proven. From the plots which were fertilized according to the farmer's choice, an average of 48.7 bushels of corn an acre was harvested at a cost of \$8.40 an acre for plant food. Corn fertilized according to soil test recommendations produced at the rate of 63.4 bushels and fertilizer costs averaged \$14.70 an acre.
By following the soil test recommendations, the demonstrators produced an extra 14.7 bushels of corn from the additional \$5.77 an acre spent for fertilizer above their usual rate of application.
With corn figured at \$1.25 a bushel, Bennett said the extra corn meant an additional \$18.38 an acre income. Since the soil test cost \$2.00 and the extra fertilizer \$5.77, they should be deducted, Bennett said. The result - a nice profit of \$12.61 an acre - in favor of the soil test.
On a 20-acre corn crop, the chemist pointed out, the use of soil test recommendations could mean an additional \$250 profit, a significant sum in these days of the ever-tightening cost-price squeeze.
