Nazareth Swifts Halt Hart

Nazareth Swifts kept their winning record intact Friday night as they defeated the Hart Longhorns, 24-0 in the first district game for both teams. The Swifts made some historical firsts Friday night as they played their first game on their new football field, won the first game played on the new field and was victorious in their first 11-man district game.

The Swifts' Marvin Hoelting gathered in the opening kickoff and ran it back 15 yards before being stopped by a Hart Longhorn. The Swifts made a first down on the first play from scrimmage and started a march to Hart's 8 yard line on the first long drive of the game. The Longhorns held the threatening Swifts and took over on their own 8 yard line on downs.

The Longhorns fumbled the ball while trying to move it away from the 8 yard line and Nazareth recovered. Marvin Hoelting ran 16 yards for paydirt on a quarterback keeper. Try for extra point failed.

Nazareth Swifts made a threatening penetration early in the second quarter but the Longhorn defense held and Hart took over on downs. The Longhorns took to the air and Marvin Hoelting of the Swifts intercepted a pass. Three plays later the Swifts scored their second touchdown when Gerald Brockman passed to Jimmy Hoelting who was waiting in the end zone. Try for extra points failed.

Longhorns took the kickoff and started a long drive downfield. The Swifts stopped Hart on fourth down play but a penalty was called against Nazareth which moved the ball to the Swifts' five yard line and gave the Longhorns a first down. With the clock running out, Hart elected to pass but a Nazareth defender knocked the ball down to end the half. Score was 12-0.

Hart received the second half kickoff but failed to make a first down against the tough Nazareth line and were forced to punt. Arthur Brockman broke through to block the punt on fourth down and a 15 yard penalty for unnecessary roughness on the same play put the Swifts on the offense at the Hart 24 yard line. They rumbled it to the ten yard line but there the Longhorns pushed the Swifts back to the 21 in four plays and took over.

Practically the entire third period was played in the Hart end of the field but Nazareth failed to score until early in the fourth period when Nazareth intercepted a Longhorn pass on their own 40 yard line. From there they drove to their third touchdown of the night with Marvin Hoelting running and passing the Swifts to the Hart three yard line. From the three yard line Larry Ringwald smashed through the center of the line for the touchdown. Marvin Hoelting tried to run over the extra points but was stopped short of the goal line. This made the score 18-0.

Nazareth's last touchdown was also set up on a pass interception, this time by Jimmy Hoelting on their own 23 yard line. From there Marvin Hoelting ran or passed the ball every play except one to put the ball on the Hart 21 yard line from where he carried it around the left side of the line for the touchdown. Hoelting also tried to kick the points but it was blocked by Hart's Larry McKay. This made the final score 24-0 for Nazareth and an important district contest under their belt.

Outstanding on the offense were Marvin Hoelting and Larry Ringwald for Nazareth and Gary Heller and Danny Rodriguez for the Longhorns. On defense it was Hart Harvey Sullivan and Joe Bob Sanders and Nazareth's Bernard Braddock, Nazareth made 20 first downs to 9 for Hart.

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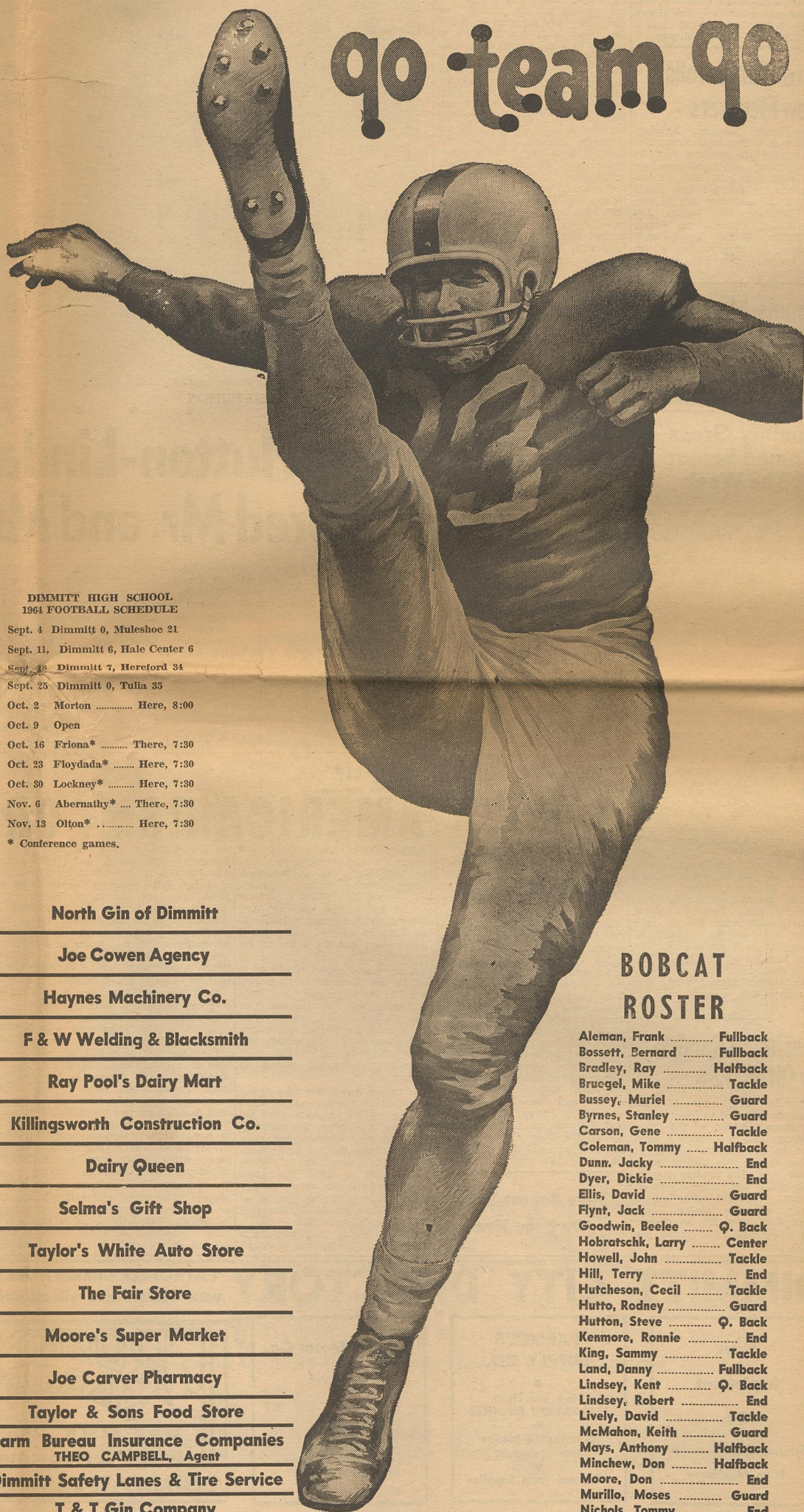

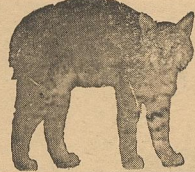

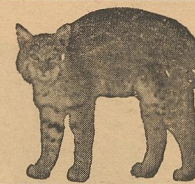

Good Luck Tommy, in all that may be in the years to come for you.

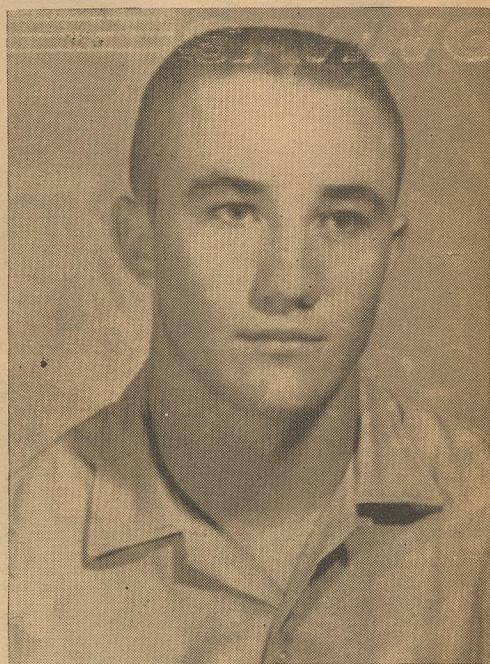
Freshman Ramble By Olton, 12-6

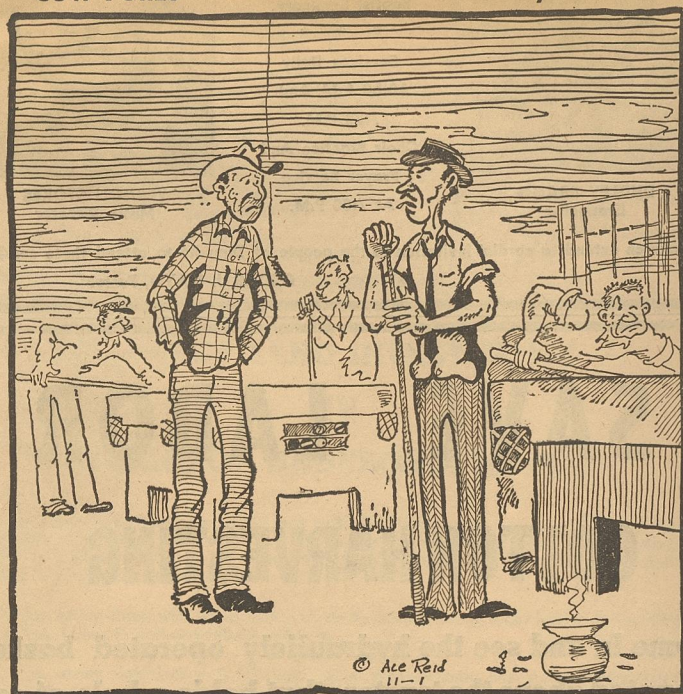

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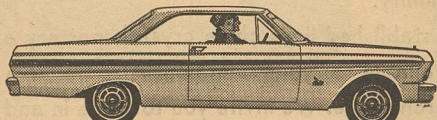
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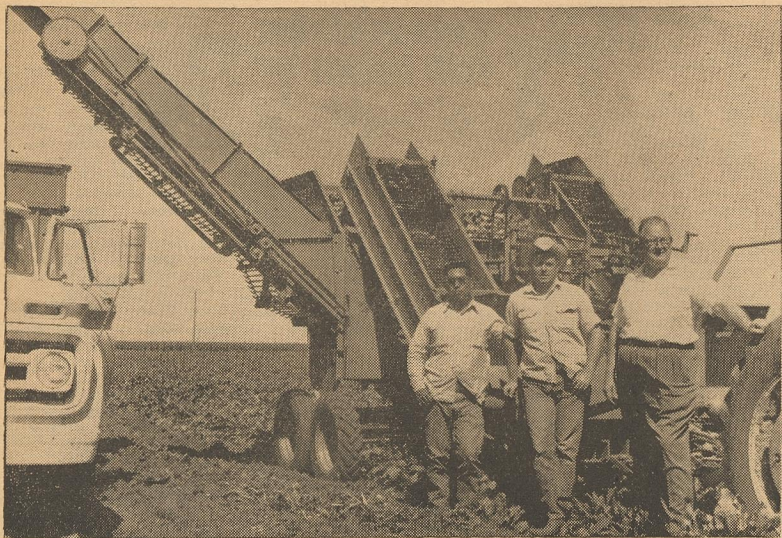

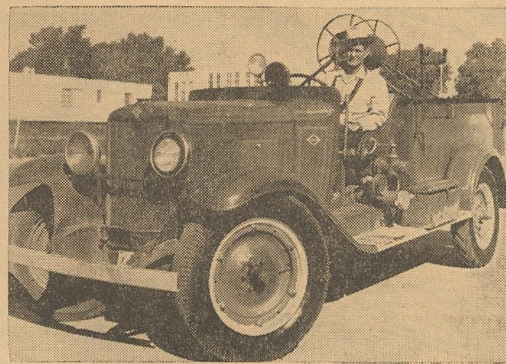

J. B. Blackwell Retires From Active Fire Fighting Service

J. B. Blackwell, volunteer fireman here since 1938, has just retired from the active firefighting force according to an announcement made by Guy Waldrop, city fire marshal.

Blackwell has been an active firefighter for 26 years in Dimmitt. Records were kept starting in 1940 of volunteer fire service. Blackwell's official record starts February 1, 1940.

The fireman was born September 27, 1909 at Tipton, Oklahoma. Blackwell and his wife, Sara have two sons, Elmo and Jerry Don and one daughter, Doris Elene. Mrs. Blackwell is in charge of the Dimmitt school cafeterias.

Blackwell has lived in Dimmitt since 1933. When he started as a fireman, the city was using the 1929 model fire truck. The fire station was located on Bedford and 3rd in the early days of Blackwell's firefighting.

Blackwell says, "When I first started as volunteer fireman there were just three or four of us."

The Dimmitt fireman received his service certificate for 20 years or more of service as an active fireman September 23, 1963. He was notified last week that he

will receive Firemen's Pension starting this month.

One of the most outstanding fires that Blackwell remembers is the Hays Implement fire in the 50's. A fire containing some humorous memories for Blackwell was at the Brashears Hotel. According to Blackwell, he and J. B. Moore had fought their way through suffocating smoke to check in the room for people. The smoke was so thick that Blackwell was on his hands and knees crawling with his face near the floor where the smoke was thinner. Moore not being able to see Blackwell moved the hotel bed in order to check and see if someone had rolled under the bed. When Moore moved the bed, he pulled it over Blackwell who was crawling on the floor. There was some excitement for a short time while Blackwell floundered in several inches of water under the bed. The two firemen found the room's occupant over against a wall in a bundle of blankets and bedding.

Blackwell says, "We've had some rough times and we've had some good times."

Blackwell has served his community and county well by attend-

ing fires and helping to quench destroying flames. He has fought fires to aid his fellow neighbor and often taken great risks without a selfish thought. Blackwell said, "All we use to know was water we started squirting water at the front door and went all the way back." "Now, firemen are learning, it does not take much water to put out a fire if you know the proper way," declares the retiring fireman.

Shirley Barlow was awarded a blue ribbon in Horticulture on his dahlia. Mary Cluck won blue ribbon on dahlias also.

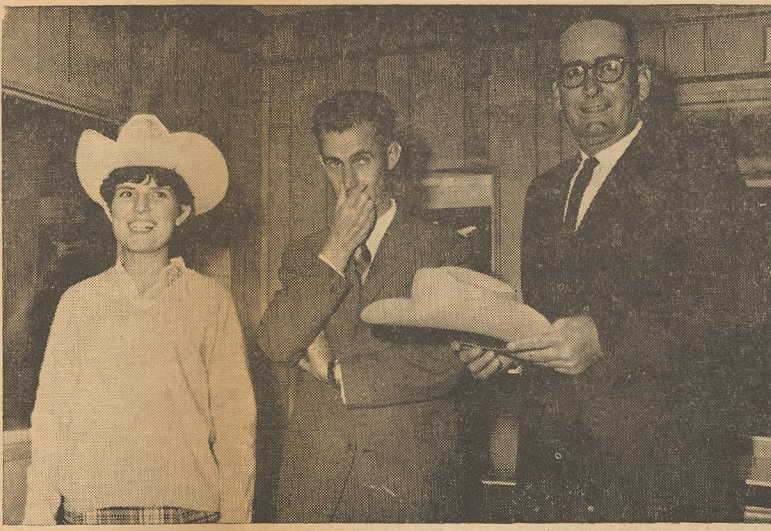

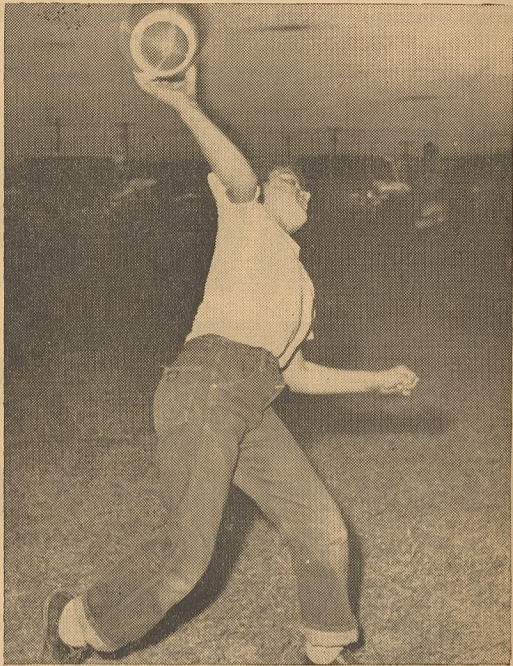

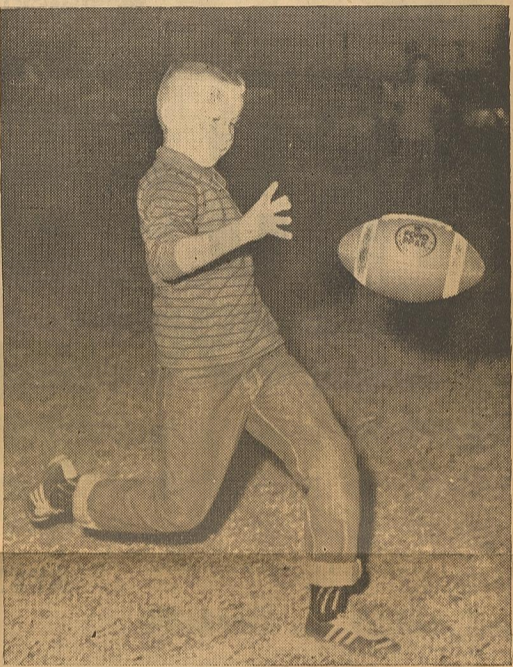

The members had refreshments and played Bunko. It was announced that at the next meeting the members would play cards.

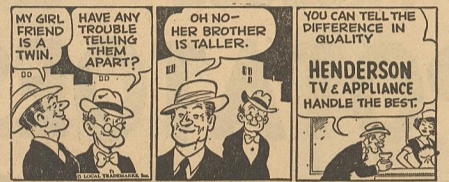
