A STATE HIGHWAY AND ITS ROUTING.
Governor Sterling made short work of house bill 415, which would have required permission of the county commissioners court for the state highway commission to reroute a highway from a town of over 200 population. He vetoed the measure and he gave his reasons why. A similar bill regarding rerouting of highways was vetoed two years ago by former Governor Moody.

All the buyers of gasoline for travel purposes in Texas contribute to the cost of highway construction and road maintenance. All the highways are for all the people who are willing to use them. In his veto message the governor said:
"Should this bill become a law it would create untold confusion and difficulties for the commission in its highway program. So far as I know the present commission of Texas has not changed an existing state highway running through the city or town to another route which would not run through some portion or part of said village or town." This was the clincher of the veto message: "The federal bureau of roads has indicated that it looks with disfavor upon such a law and unquestionably its adoption would materially affect our state's present relation with the federal bureau and undoubtedly would cause confusion in the allotment of federal aid in the cases which would come under the provisions of this measure."

ROOSEVELT AND THE FRENCH FARM POLICY.
Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt returned from France full of praise for France's approach to the problem of balancing agriculture and industry—including the French protective tariff on farm products. He said one of the things for which France has been working is a good balanced agriculture and industry—"not too much industry and not too much agriculture." He admitted that this is probably one of the factors which makes the economic depression not so serious in France as in more industrial nations. This excerpt from the Roosevelt interview should appeal to Progressive Texans, Incorporated, and those who are in sympathy with the building aims of the organization:
"That's what we are working for in this country. France produces just about enough agricultural products for her own needs. Generally speaking, she neither imports nor exports any. Therefore, the French tariff comes into play and helps stabilize agriculture. This has proved very valuable."
French farmers feed the tables of France. French manufacturers produce the manufacturers that are in demand in France as well as a small surplus for foreign buyers. There has been no bread line in France since the depression came.

BUSINESS CONDITIONS IN TEXAS.
Governor Lynn P. Talley of the Federal Reserve Bank, in addressing 200 Texas and New Mexico bankers at Dallas, asserted that conditions in the district "were good compared with those in other sections of the United States." His address from foreword to conclusion carried the spirit of optimism and was most encouraging to the bankers present from all sections of Texas and the commonwealth of New Mexico.
As a matter of fact as well as a matter of memory the drought of last summer was the blow that knocked prosperity sky high in the affected districts of the southwest. It robbed thousands of their foodstuffs and feedstuffs. Later along in the season it was proclaimed by a high chieftain of the republican party that it was within constitutional lines for the congress to appropriate money to purchase feed for hungry hogs and all types of livestock but it was against sound business principles and American precedent for the congress to appropriate money to feed the hungry children of the aforesaid owner of hungry hogs. We live and learn in this great republic of the West.

Roper Decries Laws Barring Recreation
PHILADELPHIA.—The best way to promote communism is to take away recreational privileges from the ordinary man in the opinion of Councilman William W. Roper, former Princeton football coach.
Roper's statement was made in answer to a charge read by the Rev. B. Smith Stull before the Methodist Episcopal Preachers' meeting attacking the councilman for his opposition to the Pennsylvania blue law.
The former Princeton coach said that he had violated the Sunday law by buying gasoline, riding a horse and attending a club dinner and insisted that it was better to allow men reasonable activities on Sunday than to force them to break the laws to enjoy their day of rest.

Reservoir For New York May Wipe Out Towns
BINGHAMTON, N. Y.—Five thriving Delaware county villages will be wiped out to give New Yorkers an extra supply of drinking water.
If condemnation proceedings are successful, Shaverton, Arena, Peapack, Union Grove, and Runnover, containing nearly 800 persons, will be replaced by a 22-mile lake.
The Delaware river will be dammed near East Branch to build a lake of 370,000 gallons, according to construction plans. A farm has been located with bed rock 90 feet below the surface, offering a satisfactory dam foundation.
The valley low be flooded contains the little Delaware and Northway railroad. It was purchased several years ago by Samuel Rosoff of New York for \$470,000.

Plane Construction In United States Shows An Increase

WASHINGTON.—During the first three months of this year 672 airplanes were manufactured in the United States, according to an announcement of the aeronautics branch of the department of commerce. This figure is an increase of 87 over the preceding census for the last three months of 1935. Of the total number built for domestic civil use, 236 were monoplanes, 85 biplanes, nine autogiros, one helicopter and one seaplane.
Planes constructed for the United States army in the three-month period ended April 1 totaled 302, which compares favorably with the figure of 280 planes constructed for military use in the last three months of 1935. But the exports of American airplanes have dropped in the three-month period from 52 to 28, almost a 50 per cent decrease.

CRACKS IN THE DOME

AUSTIN, June 11.—Left to almost any one of the 100-odd employees of the house and senate, a special session would be started within an hour.
The regular session is still grinding on for a few of the officers and employees of the two houses. They were kept on pay for varying numbers of days to wind up unfinished business. Most of them were through Saturday with a few others finishing up Wednesday.
Read Cranberry, house parliamentarian will have more days' work and pay ahead than anyone else. He was allowed approximately 40 days in which to compile the new legislative manual and book of rules.
But for the rest of them adjournment meant the end of the job.
And they would heartily welcome the calling of a 30-day special session. Joe White, house sergeant-at-arms, lives in Austin. Bob Barker, veteran senate secretary, who calls the rolls on uncontested bills so fast no senator gets a chance to answer, is moving out on a farm for a pleasurable vacation. Mrs. Louise Snow, Phinney, house chief clerk, and her husband, Carl Phinney, former holder of the same office, will be located in Dallas. Wendell O'Neal, senate journal clerk, returns to his own business office in Austin. Miss Gladys Nichols, house calendar clerk, goes back to a regular position in Austin. Stenographers, typists, clerks, pages, from many towns and cities, dribbled away to their old homes as soon as the session was over, a few waiting to see if the new session was to be called at once.
A special session disposes of the choice of officers and employees much more quickly than the regular sessions, when a newly elected legislature is organized. Senator Archie Parr, senior senator, presides at a caucus when the members of the upper body make up the slate of officers. Each senator appoints a secretary. Chairmen of committees name their personnel.
The speaker of the house, assisted by a committee of selection of the workers for that branch of the legislature. This year for the first time Speaker Fred Minor resorted to drastic examinations to weed down the extensive lists of applicants.

Immigrants Are Lured To Paraguay By Its Agriculture

GENEVA.—Paraguay is fast becoming an attractive emigration center according to the International Labor bureau here.
The possibilities there for cotton and tobacco cultivation constitute one of the principal drawing cards both for individual emigrants and for foreign companies who are looking for investments on an extensive scale.
Following the large emigration of Mennonites from Canada to Paraguay, an even larger movement is soon to take place from Austria and especially the Austrian Tyrol. This will be backed by a joint stock company with sufficient capital to insure the success of the colonies established.
The first group of Austrian emigrants, according to the International Labor bureau, will be composed only of 30 agriculturists especially selected from the Austrian Tyrol.
Later these will be followed by 150 more and in the end it is expected that a movement of at least 30,000 emigrants will take place from Austria to Paraguay.
While these will be primarily chosen for the development of cotton and tobacco plantations, financed by Austrian capital, it is also expected to include amongst them a reasonable number of industrial workers, craftsmen, doctors, engineers and experts.

Special Correspondent. DENVER, Colo., June 11.—Presidents of four great national organizations will open the general program of the World Federation of Education Associations which meets in Denver, July 27 to Aug. 1.

They are: Angus Roberts, M. C., London, president of the National Union of Teachers of England and Wales; Count Hirota Hayashi, Tokyo, Japan, president of the Imperial Japanese Education Association; and Dr. Willis A. Sutton, Atlanta, Georgia, president of the National Education Association of the United States.

Members of the local executive committee in charge of arrangements for the convention are: A. L. Threlkeld, superintendent of Denver schools, chairman; Frederick M. Hunter, chancellor of the University of Denver; W. B. Mooney, executive secretary, Colorado Education Association; Inez Johnson Lewis, state superintendent of public instruction; and Mary C. C. Bradford, former state superintendent of public instruction.

The World Federation of Education Associations came into existence in San Francisco in 1923 at the time of the summer convention of the National Education Association at Oakland.

Out of this beginning grew the first biennial convention at Edinburgh in 1925. Three thousand educators were in attendance. The second convention was held in Toronto in 1927 with an attendance of five thousand.

Toward these ends committees are at work throughout the world at all levels of public and private school organizations. This committee work was organized on the plan of Dr. Davis Starr Jordan, who, at the 1925 convention, was awarded the Heron prize of \$25,000 for the best plan "calculated to produce world understanding and cooperation through understanding."
