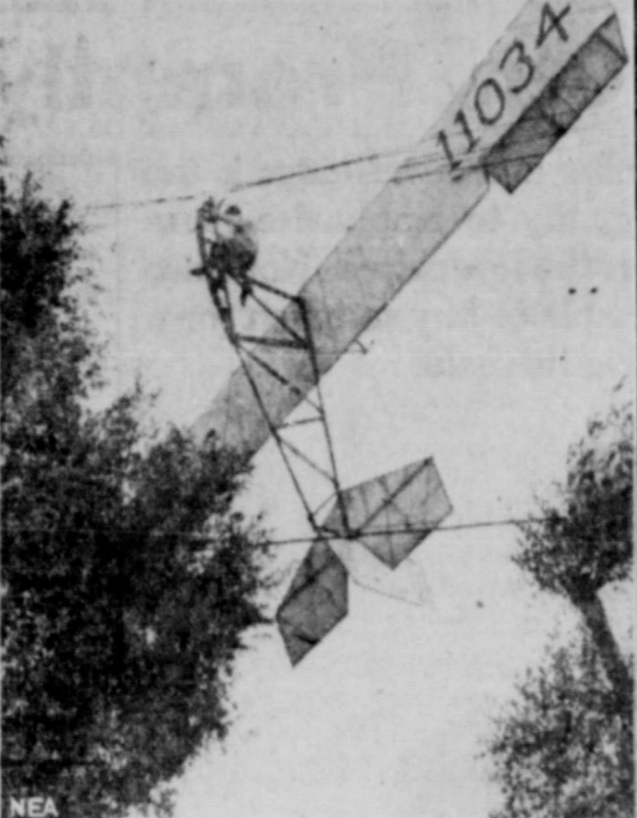
VISITOR TAKES UP HIS ABODE AT LUMBER YARD

RESOURCES ARE BRINGING FAME TO OHIO TOWN

WELLSVILLE, O. — Not far from the coal mines of the West, a town is beginning to gain a reputation for its divorce center. The situation hasn't quite reached the proportions of Reno's fame for its population of 10,000, nearly 1,000 couples are ending their marital state here.

Wellsville is a "part-time ways" center, well-situated, 30 miles up the Ohio river, the center of marriage for the two states. Wellsville has a population of 5,000 and 5,000 marriages last year.

"Extreme Cruelty" is stretched to the limit and three minutes in court is provided, of course, if the case is uncontested. Then it is all over in a day or two.

British Women Seeking Equal Rights For Sex

ISTANBUL, Turkey. — Turkish women are fighting for equal rights with men. The recent national election of the Liberal Party, in which the women of the Liberal Party, in many of the principal centers of their activity, have shown their loyalty to the party of which President Kemal is the chief.

The Union of Turkish Women, organized for the purpose of educating and enlightening the women of the country, has decided to conduct a wide campaign of education (other than propaganda). Ankara, Istanbul, Smyrna and other principal centers of their activity represent an increased number of women in the government service, occupying positions as post mistresses, stenographers, typists and bookkeepers. They also are employed in foreign service and as translators of foreign language publications and letters. There is one shop in Ankara with lady assistants and one Turkish woman who has a license as a chauffeur in Istanbul. In many of the principal centers of their activity, a number of women are attending the new Ismet High School, where women are taught English and French.

Women are particularly devoted to water sports and are becoming members of the Turkish National Assembly. This right, together with the right to vote in national elections, was promised them in the constitution. There is little doubt that they will show themselves loyal to the government which gave them their liberties. They will accomplish their desire in this respect, as President Kemal is known to be most favorable to women's rights.

Equal rights with men in the government service are still unable to secure as judges, although the Turkish bar has many women. There is also a special law that forbids both men and women to marry foreigners who remain in the service.

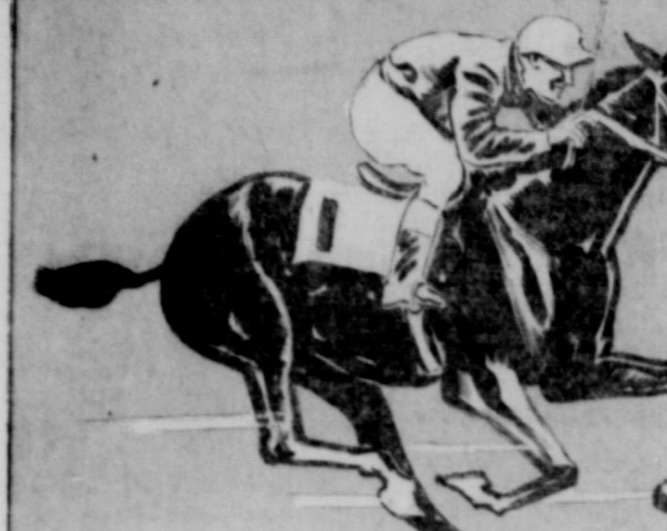

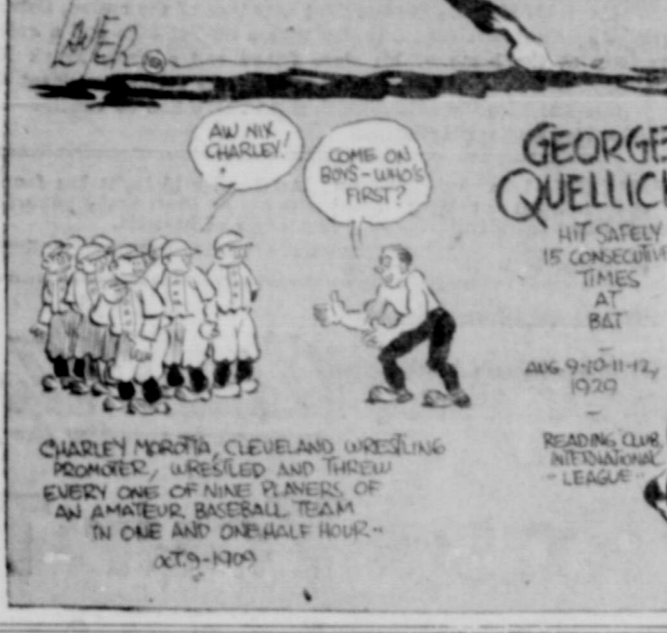

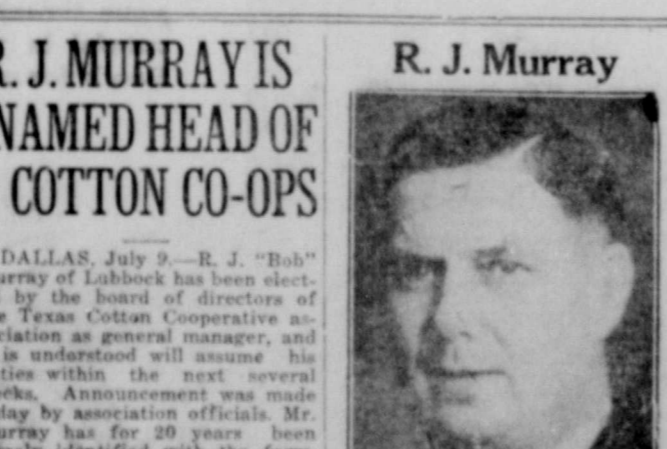

PICKING YOUR RIGHT JOB..... By COL. WM. A. STARRETT President, Starrett Corporation. As Told to J. V. Fitzgerald of the American School of the Air. The same qualities are needed for success in building that would be required in getting ahead in any other business—perseverance, moral character, leadership, ability to work hard, and ability to stand temporary disappointment. Boys who can use their hands deftly, who can build things, who have that perception for seeing the interrelation of unassembled parts of a constructed whole, would be more apt to succeed in the building business if they should direct those natural talents toward construction. A good engineering course is an excellent preparation for the building industry. Civil engineering more particularly addresses itself to foundations and structures, but any engineering course goes a long way toward preparing a young man for the building industry. A good engineering course does not necessarily mean one in one of the leading engineering schools or colleges. Already we are seeing the men of ability coming out of night classes, and indeed, from one of the best correspondence schools. Men of scholastic education generally enter through the administrative offices on the site that is, as timekeepers, clerks, checkers or accountants. However, the door of large opportunity is by no means closed to the mechanic or even the laborer, if he but have the prerequisite qualities. Building companies are generally divided into three principal functions—administration, accounting, and operations. Administration may be described as that general supervision which establishes the contacts with the public, supervises the obtaining of new business, gives voice to the financial and ethical policies and supports the operating department in the conduct of its work. The accounting department includes the services of expert accountants, who have knowledge of banking and financial relations. The operating department includes the actual supervision of the work, the supervision of estimating, the supervision of purchase and subcontracts, the coordinating of all these activities and their unified direction, to the end that the buildings will be built on time and within the financial requirements of the various operators in hand. By United Press. PITTSBURGH, Pa.—Three rare old newspapers, one telling of General Grant doing "a little firing Thursday afternoon," and relating his capture of Vicksburg two days later, are in possession of Mrs. Edna Foster, Coraopolis, Pa. One of the papers is The Daily Citizen of Vicksburg, Miss., of July 2, 1863, when Grant was preparing to capture Vicksburg. The edition is printed on wall paper, necessitated by the siege of northern troops and their blockade. "Grant did a little firing Thursday forenoon," the paper reported. "The Yanks outside our city are considerably on the sick list. The boys are deserting daily and are crossing the river in the region of Warrington, cussing Grant and abolitionists generally," the paper said. In the last lines of the last column was the following: "Note—July 4, 1863; two days bring about great changes. The banner of the Union floats over Vicksburg. General Grant has caught the rabbit. He has dined it Vicksburg and he did bring his dinner with him. "The Citizen lives to see it. For the last time it appears on wall paper. No more will it eulogize the luxury of mule meat and fringed chicken—urge southern warriors to such a diet never more. "This is the last wall paper edition and is, excepting this note, from the type as we found them. It will be valuable hereafter as a curiosity." Other papers owned by Mrs. Foster are The Orange County Gazette and Advertiser, Dec. 10, 1811, and the Goshen Independent Republican of Sept. 20, 1924, both published in New York. 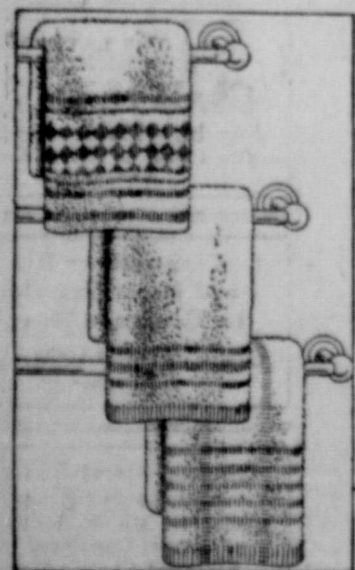

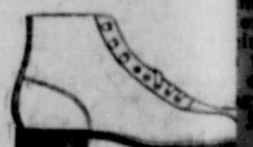

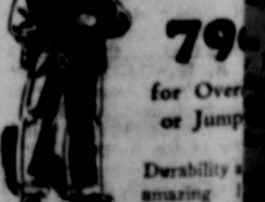
