OIL AND REDISTRICTING.

It was inevitable that Governor Sterling should have to call a special session of the legislature to consider the problems growing out of unrestricted oil production in East Texas. In announcing his determination to issue the call. Governor Sterling made two significant statements.

First, he said that matters of revenue and taxation would not be submitted. Therein the governor pursues a very wise course. There is little reason to agitate the state with another of the hectic revenue sessions. From February to June, we kept the business and industry of the state in a furore of excitement and uneasiness. They are entitled to a month or 'wo of peace.

In announcing that he would submit the matter of congressional redistricting, the governor is both wise and fair. West Texas will appreciate this instance of fairness, for the reason that it is shown so few courtesies of the kind. If the legislature will bear two things in mind, redistricting should define the lines of the new congressional districts; and, second, the districts now served by Congressmen Mansfield of Columbus and Briggs of Galveston should not be disturbed.

In the above connection, it should be recalled that Representative Penrose Metcalfe recently flung an interesting challenge at the legislature. It was his proposition that East Texas solons redistrict East Texas to provide for the one new congessman to which East Texas is entitled under the new census; and that West Texas solons redistrict West Texas to provide for the two new congressmen to which their section of the state is entitled under the same census figures.

Unhappily, the Metcalf challenge is founded in the assumption that the legislature evidences no disposition to be fair in the matter of congressional redistricting. If that be true, then the Metcalf proposal is a proper expedient. The legislature should be able to do their job with fairness and equity to all, however; and no achievement would go so far to restore confidence in that body's impartiality as a fair job of redistricting
