QUEST FOR GOLD.

Canada is beginning to feel prosperous again, what with the jump in wheat prices and the increase in gold production. The latter is of growing interest. Production has been stimulated by a government premium paid to Canadian gold miners. Present production is at the rate of about \$50,000,-000 a year and steadily rising. This is expected to be a large factor in restoring Canadian money to par with our own.

There is a longing in many American hearts for a new gold discovery in this country. Economists recall that more than once in our history, new gold in large quantity proved to be the talisman for restoring prosperity. The opening of the South African gold mines near the end of the last century did that for the world.

The Russian government, which is usually shrewder than it looks, has had this matter in mind for some time. Though it has always professed to scorn gold as capitalistic trash, it has conducted a systematic quest for mineral gold throughout its vast empire. Discoveries recently reported may have a pronounced effect, not in relieving any immediate distress in Russia but in financing future industrial programs and modifying Soviet ideas.

We may criticise gold as an unsatisfactory standard of value and the root of many economic evils, but as matters stand it's an extremely desirable thing to have, and the very countries that have demonetized gold would give their eyeteeth for a larger supply.

REVERSE RECLAMATION.

It is generally assumed that forestry projects in this country are for western states. There seems to be plenty of opportunity in the East and such effort. New York surprises many of her sister states by voting to spend \$19,000, 000 in reforesting abandoned lands in the vicinity of the Adirondacks.

This is the reverse of the usual American type of reclamation. In the past we have "reclaimed" lands from nature by clearing forests, draining swamps and watering deserts. We still drain swamps and irrigate dry lands, though with less enthusiasm than we did 20 or 30 years ago. We have actually begun replanting trees in a way that, in such cases as New York, suggests nature reclaiming her lands from

Many cleared lands were not worth clearing, except for the timber. But even in fertile areas, with our restricted immigration policy, diminished birth rate and more productime farming methods, our old "land hunger" is pretty well satisfied. So we plant trees where we formerly cut them, for the double purpose of providing a new timber supply and establishing public playgrounds. With the diminishing demand for lumber, the latter purpose is often the more important.

Not that anyone should be discouraged from buying bonds. There are no seunder investments than good bonds, whether public or private. The point is, to make sure that those you buy are good. And generally speaking, the safest way is to ask your banker.

It's as hard to reduce budgets as adipose tissue, but sometimes if the former is accomplished the latter takes care of itself.




