**Air School To Be Opened At Ranger Airport**

Montie Lane and L. H. Delavan of San Angelo are now at Ranger, where they will open a flying school at Haugland airport. They have a Curtiss Pusher in which they will give flying instructions. This new type of plane has been built to greatly reduce the cost of flying. Students will be given instructions at a nominal cost, lessons to be paid for as they are taken.

Delavan was an instructor at the Mansey School of Aviation and is a transport pilot. The plane is licensed by the department of commerce.
