THE CHRISTMAS SEASON.

The Christmas season is almost upon us. One more week and the turkey, the roast, the beans or whatever we are fortunate enough to have for the physical emptiness within us, will have been stowed away and Thanksgiving 1931 will have passed into the limbo of bygone days. From that moment until December 24, 1931, we will be thinking in terms of Christmas. No other holiday of the year is preceded with such a long period of anticipation. No matter how old we have grown, how weary we are, the spell of that magic word brightens us, invigorates the dead spirit, refreshes the mind that through the long year has been weighted and sometimes embittered with care and disappointment. Christmas is a season of hope-not of receiving but of giving. Christmas is a time of giving. And it is a curious and beautiful fact that of all those institutions which we have, this season of giving is the most spiritually refreshing. America needs today, more than anything else a spiritual rebirth. We need to be revitalized with courage, faith and hope if we are to meet the challenge of what next year has to offer after the disillusionments of the past. Without that "philosopher's stone" of the soul we cannot transmute from the material those golden elixirs that make life worth living, that inspire and give courage and zest to our existence.

Those of us who have grown worldly-wise and skeptical should read and re-read the editorial reply of Frank Church in the New York Sun of 1897 to little Virginia O'Hanlon who had written the Sun the question: "Is there a Santa Claus?"

Said Editor Church:

"Santa Claus exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! How dreary would be the world if there were no Santa Claus! It would be as dreary as if there were no Virginias. There would be no childlike faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment except in sense and sight. The Eternal Light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

"No Santa Claus! Thank God! He lives, and he lives forever. A thousand years from now, Virginia, nay, ten times ten thousand years from now, he will continue to make glad the heart of childhood.'

How badly right now do we need to return to the spirit of Mr. Church's assurance to little Virginia. Let us declare moratorium on the blues this Christmas, fill up our Santa Claus bag with liberal quantities of that "love, generosity and devotion." We may be sure that our gifts will return to us ten-fold in blessings, in inspiration and courage.
