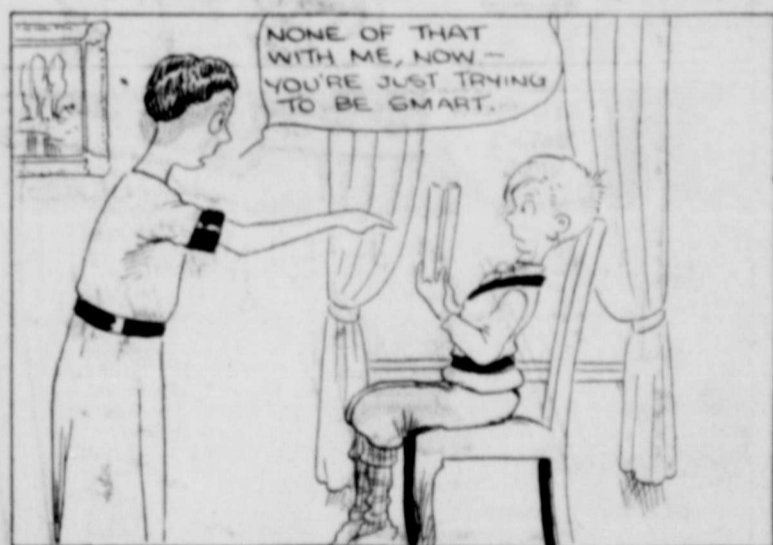
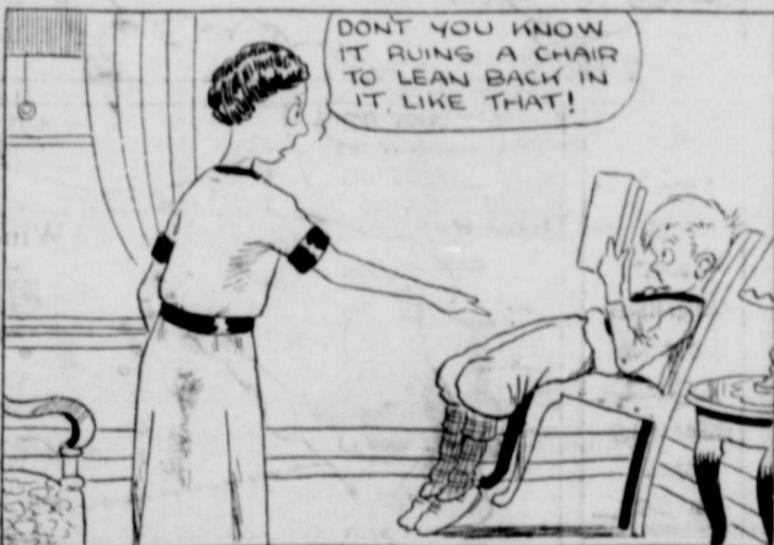

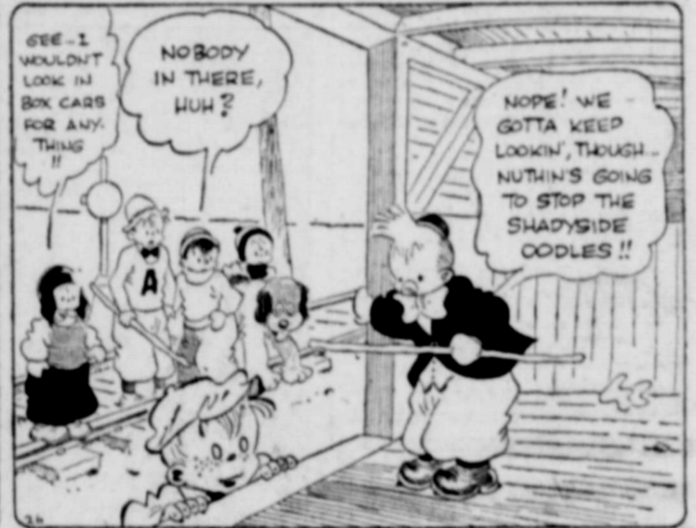

Grain Elevator Is Ready for Big Year

ALBANY, N. Y., Dec. 26.—The Port of Albany's new \$1,700,000 grain elevator, said to be the largest in the world, will be ready for spring trade, officials have announced. Work already has been started and will be continued through the winter.

The Cargill Elevator company, Indianapolis, which has leased 10,000,000 of the 13,000,000 bushel capacity space, intends to put 10,000,000 bushels of grain through the elevator the first year, officials said.

This will assure the port of being a clearing house for more than 300 shiploads of grain.
