In a strong editorial in a recent issue the Saturday Evening Post, journalistic bulwark of American conservatism, presents a point-blank indictment of American national stamina as it appears to have been weakened-or, rather, a growing weakness revealed-under the conditions that are confronting the world today. The editorial delivers a blow to the so-called economic and political leaders who propose economic nostrums and cure-alls for the national ills, always wat the expense of the tax-payer.

The individual job is the unit of cure, the Post indicates. "No panacea, no magic formula can take the place of the integrity of the individual. Each person must do his job himwelf, and well.

'Real leadership is developing among employes, business men and farmers who are concentrating on the individual job, putting everything they have into it, stripping their problems down to fundamentals, free from any illusion that by some magic formula they can beat the economic law so as "to improve their condition," the Post continues.

The article goes on to point out that, just as in the case of rubber, coffee and other products, not to mention our own government experiments to lift the price of agricultural pro ducts by their boot straps," prices dropped steadily until the simple little economic law of supply and demand took a hand.

Huge steel "jumbos," or machines which will cost a half million doltars in the aggregate, must be built for pouring these diversion tunnel tubes.

The pouring of the lower portion of the tunnel crust is simple. Pouring of the side walls, of the round 50-foot bores, is not so difficult to conceive. But the pouring of the concrete for the top of the tunnels so that it will solidify overhead, has brought great difficulties to those designing the equipment for this portion of the work.

The jumbos will cost as much to build as did the entire 11-mile construction railroad. There will be 1,200 tons of steel used in the building of these machines.

There will be three jumbos for each tunnel. The first will lay the bottom section of the crust, the second to follow along for the pouring of the side wall segments, and the third, bringing up the rear, to do the most difficult part of the job—placing the concrete high over head in the arch segment.

The first of these machines will be ready about April 1. It will take 10 months to complete the four tubes through which the Colorado river will flow during construction of the dam. It is expected that the bores will be completed about January, 1933.

Concrete for the bores will be made and poured at the rate of 1,300 cubic yards a day, the total amount to be used for the entire job being a third of a million yards.

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




