Rio Theatre To Participate In Polio Fund Drive

City Manager H. H. Carlisle of the Rio Theatre today announces his theatre will participate in the Texas Theatres Polio Fund with audience collections on August 13, 14, and 15.

Under the slogan "Texas Takes Care of Its Own," the drive was planned to meet the emergency when Texas Polio cases totaled one-fourth of all cases in the United States. The state has had 1,123 new cases through July 23 this year.

L. M. Rice, Dallas Attorney, heads the campaign committee. Other members are: R. J. O'Donnell and John Q. Adams, Interstate Circuit Theatres; R. I. Payne, Theatre Enterprises Inc.; S. L. Oakley, Jefferson Amusement Co.; F. W. Allen, National Screen Service, Johnny Long of Bay Town, Texas, Long Theatres, and Don C. Douglas, Robb and Rowley United.

Money collected in Theatres will be used only to treat Texans suffering from polio. While several polio reception centers have been set up at strategic points to handle the acute or isolation period, the facilities for post-acute treatment to restore use of limbs are limited, Mr. Rice said.

Among the polio alleviation agencies to benefit is the Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation near Austin.

Boy Scouts to Attend Camp

The local Boy Scouts will attend a four-day encampment beginning on Wednesday, August 24th and continuing until Sunday afternoon, August 28th. The place where these Scouts will spend their encampment is located near Silvertown, Texas, and is called Camp Mamie Haynes in honor of the late Maymie Haynes who deeded around eighty acres to the Boy Scouts for their enjoyment. It is located around a canyon, has a dam and small lake for boating and fishing, and a swimming pool which is fed by a continual spring. Since this camp has very few facilities or improvements, the Scouts will have to "rough" it in the outdoors. Since the canyon is inaccessible to ordinary automobiles, they will have to pack all equipment in and out of the canyon on foot.

All Scouts who are interested in attending this camp will attend Scout meeting on Wednesday night at 8:00 p. m., August 17th, at the home of the local Scoutmaster, J. L. Ellison. Final details will be worked out at this meeting as to the equipment and supplies which each Scout will need to bring. A "weenie" roast is planned for this August 17th meeting.

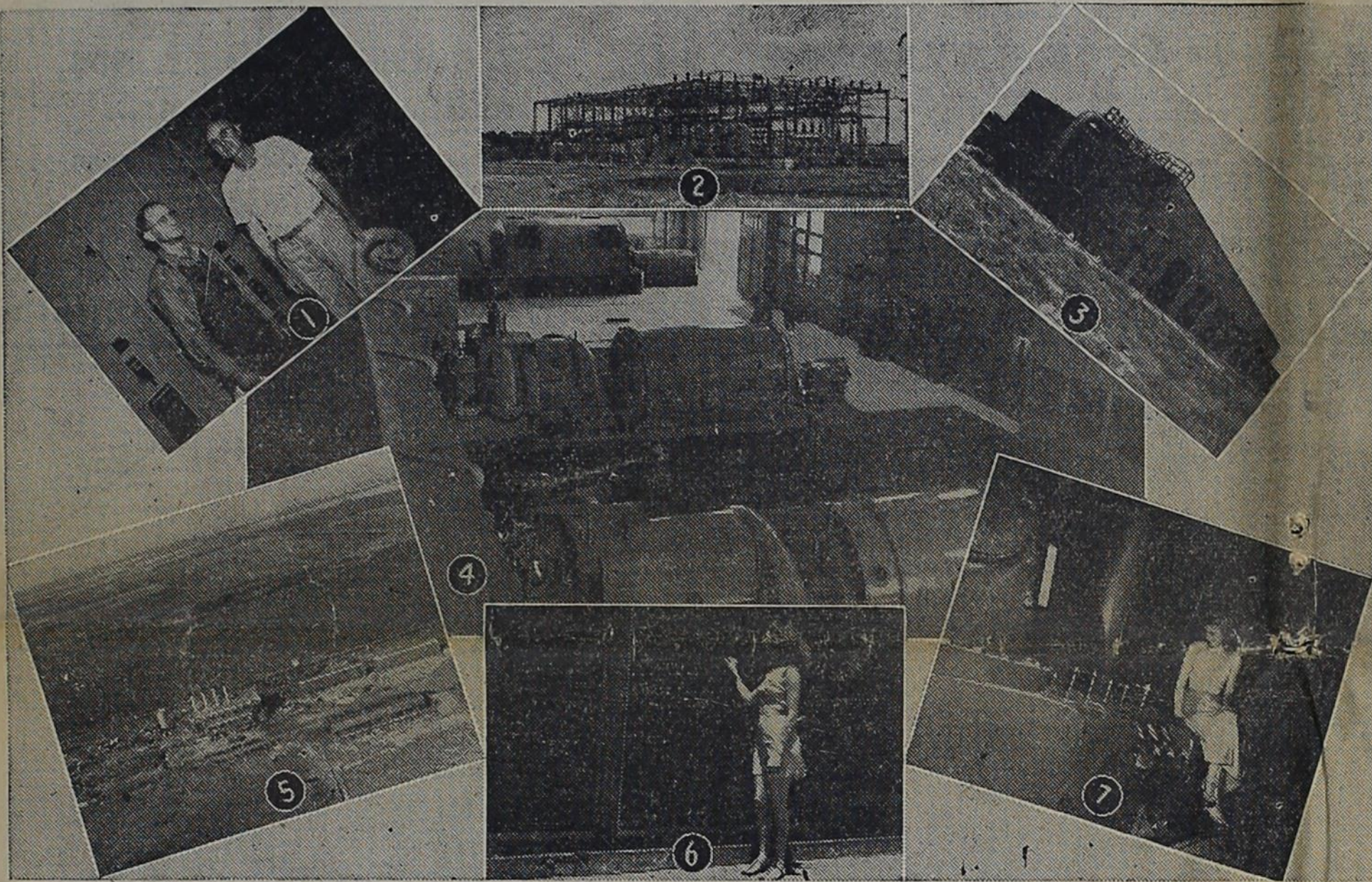

Southwestern Public Service Company Has Expansion Program at Tuco

As you drive through the rich agricultural country between Plainview and Lubbock, nature's handiwork suddenly gives place to man's as you come upon Tuco, power supply of the plains, just north of Abernathy.

"What a place to put a power plant" is a normal reaction the first time you see Tuco, for the plant looks as out of place as a city boy on a Texas farm, sitting as it does, in the heart of a rich agricultural area. But a little research discloses that this main source of power supply for the Plains Division of the Southwestern Public Service Company is ideally located.

Tuco has loomed on the landscape for 19 years. The plant went into operation in 1930, and externally looks little different than it did in those days. Inside, however, Tuco has the "new look" and where once was heard only the hum of a single 7500 kilowatt generator can now be heard the roar of three turbines putting out 40,000 kilowatts of electric power.

Horses are easier to picture than kilowatts, so, the moment, let's make horses out of our kilowatts. In terms of horsepower, those 40,000 kilowatts of electric energy producing capacity are the equivalent of 53,640 horses pulling to produce electric power for you and your neighbors. That's a lot of horses and a lot of power.

Tuco is a well-planned power plant in many respects. That accounts for the fact that externally it looks little different than it did nearly two decades ago, while actually it can now produce more than five times as much electric energy than it could when it went into operation. When it was built, room was left for the installation of additional generators. Two have been added. A second 7500 kilowatt unit went "on the line" in 1938 and a new 25,000 kilowatt General Electric steam turbine generator had just gone into operation.

So well was Tuco planned when it was first constructed that even now Southwestern Public Service

engineers - looking into the future and visualizing increased needs - are working their slide rules and measuring sticks and wondering if a fourth unit can't be placed in the building without an addition being made to it. There's room left, the only question being, is there enough.

For the record - and power plants like presidential speeches - have to "go on record", Tuco's new 25,000 kilowatt unit - that alone is equal to 33,525 horsepower - went "on the line" July 9th, 1949 at 10:30 p. m., CST. The new unit has operated for short periods at full capacity, but the power dispatchers of Southwestern Public Service have not as yet asked Tuco to provide a new maximum output over a sustained period. You have to work the "bugs" out of new turbines and that's what they're doing now at Tuco. The new unit came "on the line" smooth. The engineers say there are few "bugs" to be worked out before Tuco will be able to produce its new capacity, 40,000 kilowatts, on a full time basis.

Tuco's location in the midst of a rich agricultural area is important to the farmers of that area. This is irrigation country and that means water is important to the farmer. It's also a little hard to get along without if you plan to use steam to generate electric energy. You can't use up water your customers need for their farming - and still have customers. That accounts for the location of the plant. Tuco's water supply comes from a lower water level than does that of the farms in the surrounding area. As water is needed by city folks too, Tuco was located outside of a populated area.

Tuco serves an area that covers more than 3000 square miles, extending from Dimmitt and Silvertown on the north to Levelland and Crosbyton on the south. Most of the communities in this area, especially those in the northern half, receive a major portion of their power from Tuco. Southwestern Public Service Company's Denver City plant helps carry the load in the southern

end of the region. Geographically, Tuco is located close to the center of this area; another reason why it was a good place to put a power plant.

Tuco's location is important - and good - as far as the tying together of Southwestern Public Service Company's power producing facilities are concerned. There the ten steam turbine generating plants in the system, spaced from 75 to 100 miles apart. Tied together by high tension transmission lines, they are able to help each other carry the load if one has to be "down" for any reason. For example, power generated at Tuco would be transmitted to Clovis if the New Mexico plant needed additional energy, or Tuco and Denver City or some other plant could combine to help another area. A network of 2561 miles of transmission line - with the main arteries in the system extending from Borger to Carlsbad, New Mexico and from Amarillo to Portales, New Mexico - make it possible for the ten plants to share the load.

A power plant is an around the clock operation - 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. Thirty two men are needed in direct operations at Tuco. Once a power plant gets going, operation is almost automatic because of the many instruments that control the varicose machines generating the electricity. That accounts for the relatively small number - 32 - men needed to keep Tuco's 53,640 horses at work. Each of the 32 is a technician, specializing in one particular field of the operation, but knowing enough about the over-all running of the plant that he could fill the breach at any job.

Tuco's "dollar and cents" contribution to the area it serves is a very important one. The monthly payroll at the plant averages around \$10,000 and has been as high as \$14,000. Many articles of supply and equipment are purchased locally and aid the community economy. For example, the new cooling tower which was installed for the 25,000 kilowatt generator was fabricated by a Plainview firm, Lillie-Hoffman

Cooling Towers, Inc. Tuco's tax bill, and that of other Southwestern Public Service Company installations in the area helps pay the cost of providing good local government.

Housing facilities for families of 12 of the 32 employees are provided at the plant and the remainder of the staff make their homes in Abernathy and the surrounding area.

Tuco is probably the safest place in the area to work despite the usual belief that power plants are hazardous places to make a living. There hasn't been a time-lost accident at the plant in 5 1/2 years. One reason for the record is that everyone at Tuco believes in the philosophy that accidents don't happen, they are caused. Another contributing factor is that families of the employees as well as the men themselves get in on the safety tests that are given. Recently, 17 year old Jerry Dyer, daughter of plant manager Bob Dyer, led the entire plant in an examination. Mrs. Dyer was also high on the list. Nobody fails the examinations and high grades are the rule, not the exception.

Two of Tuco's employees have seen each of the three units now in operation go "on the line" for they have worked at the plant since the day it went into service. The two are M. C. Davidson, maintenance foreman, and Frank D. Bishop, shift foreman, who have worked side by side for 18 years without a time-lost accident.

Tuco's "up in the air" these days too, and picture post cards of the plant are given to passengers flying above the plant aboard the equipment of Pioneer Air Lines.

Tuco has been carrying its share of the electric power load for nearly two decades. Its share has grown bigger - as has the area it serves - but sound planning and good operation have kept the plant ahead of the power needs of the region. It doesn't look like it belonged where it is, but it's in the best possible place to do the job that has to be done - provide electric power for you.

In 1949 the Farm People of America suffered around 859,000 accidents. From these accidents farm owners lost approximately 17,000,000 days and \$26,000,000, not counting deaths and permanent disability due to these accidents. Castro County farmers lately have had more of these accidents than they should have. Mr. Farmer, be careful!

Last Wednesday a trucker had two flat tires on the highway just south of town. He came to town, secured help and went back to change the tires. Heat generated in the low tires caused them to catch fire while he was gone. When the trucker returned he found his whole truck and a full load of gas blazing away. We are of the opinion that if a man ever had the right to cuss, this man did. When you get to the point where things like this happen, we wonder if it is worth it all. Fate sure can kick a man sometimes.

Dimmitt is growing up. Every day someone comes into the NEWS office looking for a place to stay. Of course, some are road workers and other workers on jobs that will hold them only for a short time, but many are permanent residents. If you have a room, apartment, or house to rent, please let us know and we will send you a customer.

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
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LEGAL NOTICE

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5

proposing an Amendment to Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution relating to sessions of the Legislature and what may be considered thereat and an Amendment to Section 24 of Article III relating to compensation of Members of the Legislature; specifying the time when the Amendment shall take effect if ratified; and providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 24 of Article III of the State Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 24. Members of the State Senate and House of Representatives shall receive from the State Treasury an annual salary of Three Thousand Six Hundred Dollars (\$3600), to be paid in monthly installments on the first of each month.

"They shall also be entitled to mileage in going to the seat of government for each session of the Legislature and returning therefrom, which mileage shall not exceed Two Dollars and Fifty cents (\$2.50), for every twenty-five (25) miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel from a table of distances to each county seat prepared by the State Comptroller.

"Sec. 2. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution be amended to read as follows:

"Sec. 5. Two (2) regular sessions of each Legislature shall be held; and until otherwise provided by law, the time of the convening of the first regular session shall be at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each odd-numbered year, and of the second regular session, at noon on the second Tuesday in January of each even-numbered year.

"At other times, when called by the Governor, the Legislature shall convene in special session. "Appropriations for monthly recurring expenses and salaries paid by the State shall be made for a period of not more than twelve (12) months.

"At the second regular session of each Legislature, only proposals to amend the Constitution and to make appropriations to pay monthly recurring expenses and salaries and such other measures only as four-fifths (4/5) of the Membership of each House may determine shall be considered."

"Sec. 3. The Amendments proposed herein, if ratified by the people, shall become effective January first, A.D. 1950.

"Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of this State at a General Election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, same being November 8, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments relative to sessions of the Legislature and to compensation of its members."

Each voter shall express his vote on the proposed Amendment in the manner provided by law.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; and providing the time, means and manner thereof, and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified

electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1

Proposing an amendment to Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution, repealing the provision making the payment of poll tax a qualification of an elector; requiring the Legislature to pass a general registration law for voters; providing for the necessary election, proclamation and publication by the Governor, and making an appropriation.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. Section 2, Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is amended hereby so as to read hereafter as follows:

"Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications, who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years, and who shall be a citizen of the United States, and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that before offering to vote at any election a voter shall have registered as an elector before the first day of February next preceding such election. This provision shall be self-enacting. The Legislature shall pass a general registration law requiring registration of voters at a time not later than the first day of February for that calendar year, and the Legislature shall have power to prescribe a registration fee. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the 8th day of November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas eliminating the provisions in said Constitution making the payment of poll tax a requirement for voting, and providing for a general registration law."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts;" and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for the creation and establishment of rural fire prevention districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment; and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and the laws of this

state. Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the state not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 19

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office heretofore provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

"Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to Article V, Section 7 of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide that the Judge of the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law; providing for election proclamation and submission to qualified electors of the State.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 7 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Sec. 7. The State shall be divided into as many judicial districts as may now or hereafter be provided by law, which may be increased or diminished by law. For each district there shall be elected by the qualified voters thereof, at a General Election, a Judge, who shall be a citizen of the United States and of this State, who shall be licensed to practice law in this State and shall have been a practicing lawyer or a Judge of a Court in this State, or both combined, for four (4) years next preceding his election, who shall have resided in the district in which he was elected for two (2) years next preceding his election, who shall reside in his district during his term of office, who shall hold his office for the period of four (4) years, and shall receive for his services an annual salary to be fixed by the Legislature. The Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law. He shall hold the regular terms of his Court at the County Seat of each County in his district at least twice in each year in such manner as may be prescribed by law. The Legislature shall have power by General or Special Laws to make such provisions concerning the terms or sessions of each Court as it may deem necessary.

"The Legislature shall also provide for the holding of District Court when the Judge thereof is absent, or is from any cause disabled or disqualified from presiding.

"The District Judges who may be in office when this Amendment takes effect shall hold their offices until their respective terms shall expire under their present election or appointment."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines, the said machines shall provide) the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law"; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional

Amendment providing that the District Court shall conduct its proceedings at the county seat of the county in which the case is pending, except as otherwise provided by law."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment. In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32

proposing an Amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding thereto another Section following Section 15, providing that the Legislature may provide for trials in lunacy cases without a jury; further providing for the submission of this Amendment to the voters of this State; prescribing the form of ballot; providing for the proclamation and publication thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another Section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15-a, to read as follows:

"Section 15-a. The Legislature shall have the authority to enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for waiver of trial by jury in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury."

Section 2. That the foregoing Constitutional Amendment be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, A. D., 1949, at which election all ballots shall be printed thereon:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases;" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that the Legislature may provide for trials without a jury in lunacy cases." Each voter shall scratch out one (1) of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one (1) expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment.

In counties or other subdivisions using voting machines, the above provision for voting for and against this Constitutional Amendment shall be placed on said machine in such a manner that each voter shall vote on such machine for or against the Constitutional Amendment.

Section 3. That the Governor of the State of Texas issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 36

proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts; providing for the Governor's proclamation and submission to the electorate.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section to be designated as Section 60, reading as follows:

"Section 60. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide by law for the establishment and creation of hospital districts in the counties of this State, under such conditions as the Legislature may fix by law, and to provide for the support of said districts by a tax on the ad valorem properties situated in said counties; providing, however, that before any such district shall be created it shall be approved by a vote of the people in said district."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts;" and

"AGAINST the Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment and creation of hospital districts."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of

Texas. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 38

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63 and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county, and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and shall first be authorized by vote of the qualified voters of such county. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors for members of the Legislature at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949; and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and "AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees." Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Section 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes cast are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," the foregoing proposed amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof.

Section 5. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State of Texas not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expenses of such proclamation, notice and election.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new Section to be known as Section 48-b, authorizing the Legislature to provide for the establishment of health units, and authorizing a tax in support thereof.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended, by adding a new Section to Article III of said Constitution to be designated Section 48-b, reading as follows:

"Section 48-b. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for the organization of county-city health units and the operation thereof and to authorize counties and cities to provide a tax of not to exceed twenty cents (20c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation of taxable property in counties and cities for the purpose of financing the said county-city health units; provided that no such tax shall be authorized except by a vote of the people residing in the city or county in which said tax shall apply. The foregoing tax shall be levied only on county valuations."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have written or printed thereon:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof;" and

"Against the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to pass laws for the creation and operation of city-county health units and to authorize cities and counties to vote a tax in support thereof."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of

vote on the proposed amendment. Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution for Amendments thereto.



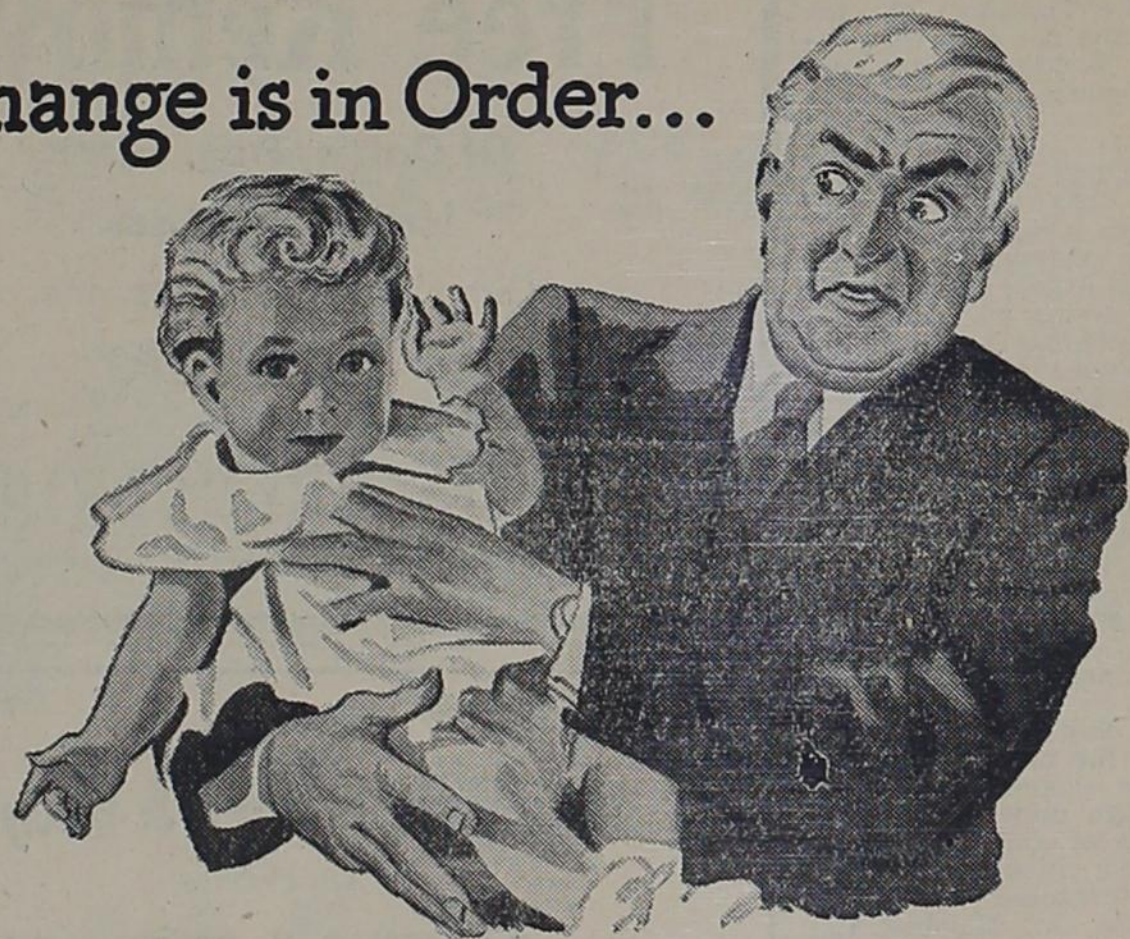



New Communication System is set up For West Texas Gas Company; Radio

West Texas Gas Company announced today that it has recently completed the installation of nine fixed short wave radio stations along its more than 800 miles of transmission lines.

The company has also equipped 30 trucks and automobiles with two-way radios.

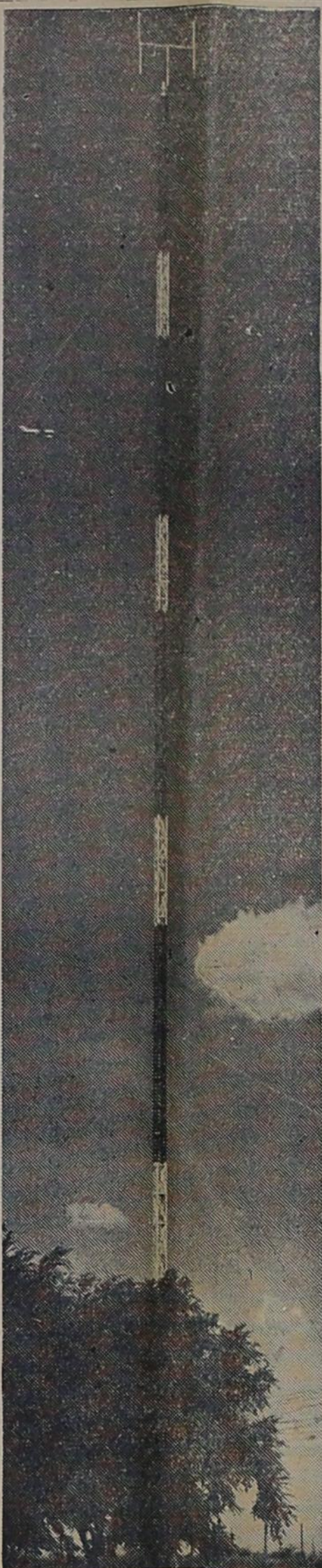
This radio net work, the first in this area to use frequency modulation equipment, together with more than 300 miles of company-owned telephone lines and long distance commercial lines provides as good a com-

munication system as is available.

R. F. Henchey, president of West Texas Gas Company, explained, "Communication between all points of West Texas Gas Company's transmission lines is very essential and must be maintained at all times in order that it may render good natural gas service to the thousands of homes and businesses in the 23 counties the company serves. As additional insurance for proper communication, West Texas Gas Company has installed its own short wave radio network."

The installation of the short wave system enables the company to call together emergency crews as a moments notice. Licensed radio operators are on duty at all nine fixed radio stations twenty-four hours a day, every day of the year. They will keep in contact with maintenance men making repairs along the transmission lines, and also dispatch pressure readings via radio when other communication systems are busy or out of order.

The nine fixed stations are located at Lubbock, Plainview and Midland, which are division nerve centers; at Odessa, which is near two sources of natural gas supply; at Turkey Creek Compressor Station in the Panhandle Gas Field and at compressor stations

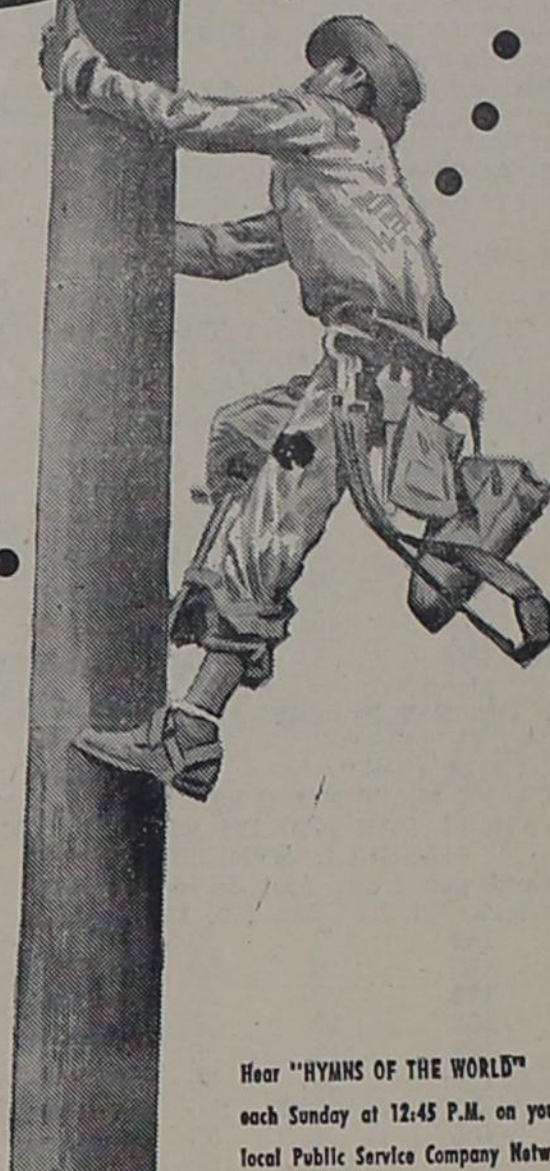

Health Officer Urges Caution Tuberculosis

There is no emphatic proof of the power of ignorance and carelessness to spread disease than is shown by the continued ravages of tuberculosis, which is responsible for more deaths between the ages of fifteen and forty-five than any other disease.

Despite the knowledge of its cause, spread, and curative procedures, tuberculosis continues to be a grave public health problem, and today it holds fifth place among the killing diseases in this state. The fact exists even though the majority of tuberculosis patients could have their condition arrested, if it was recognized early and proper treatment applied.

These facts were disclosed by Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, who says "treatment of the early recognized case is essential to recovery. It is of equal importance, from a public health viewpoint, that the spread of this devastating infection be prevented. A more widespread appreciation of this fact would result in the saving of thousands of lives."

The State Health Officer added: "When a diagnosis of active tuberculosis has been made, examination of all other members of the family should follow as a matter of course. Tuberculosis runs in families, not because of any special susceptibility, but because it is communicable and easily transmitted from one member of the family to others."

To reduce the number of deaths caused by tuberculosis, Dr. Cox urges periodic examinations of all adults, including chest X-rays; frequent check ups by physicians where active cases and their contacts are known; isolation or hospitalization of active tuberculosis cases, and a more intelligent application of hygienic living principles.

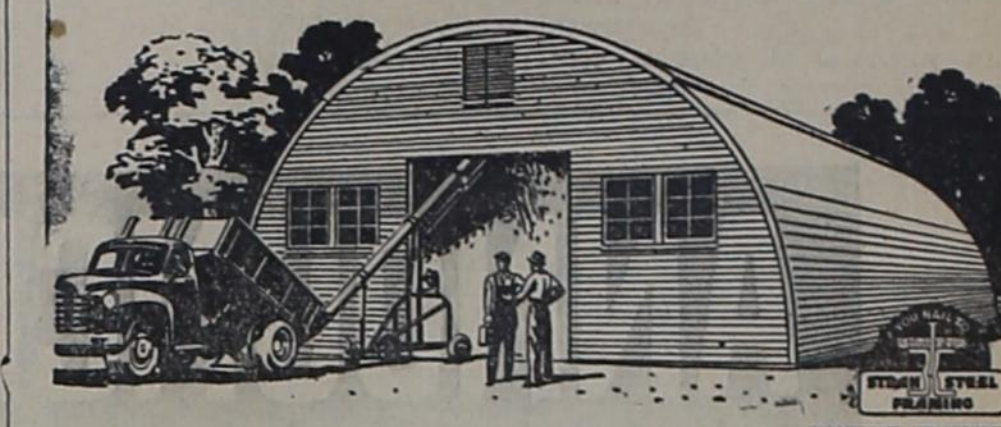

SUPPORT PRICE IS URGED FOR COTTONSEED

J. Walter Hammond, president of the Texas Farm Bureau Federation, who last month was the sparkplug in the fight which led to Secretary of Agriculture Brannan's announcement of the three-point grain storage program which saved producers of Texas \$45,000,000, today dispatched a wire to Congressman Bob Poage, chairman of the Texas delegation in Washington, urging that he rally the support of the hard-hitting Texas members of Congress

behind a concerted effort to get the Secretary to provide a support price for cottonseed, a program that will save Texas cotton farmers twenty million dollars. "Seed are selling for \$34 as compared to \$90 last season," Hammond told Poage. "There is a support price on soy beans," he declared, "and cotton farmers cannot understand why the Secretary does not support the price of cottonseed when the same act of Congress provides a support price for both of these competitive commodities, which in the case of cottonseed would be \$55

Hammond foresaw developments in the present cottonseed crisis and started contacting Washington officials on the problem several weeks ago. Today he renewed his efforts as cotton harvest reached full blast in South Texas and producers pressed the Federation president for help. Hammond told Poage that by organized effort and immediate action the Texas delegation could save the cotton farmers of Texas alone 20 million dollars.

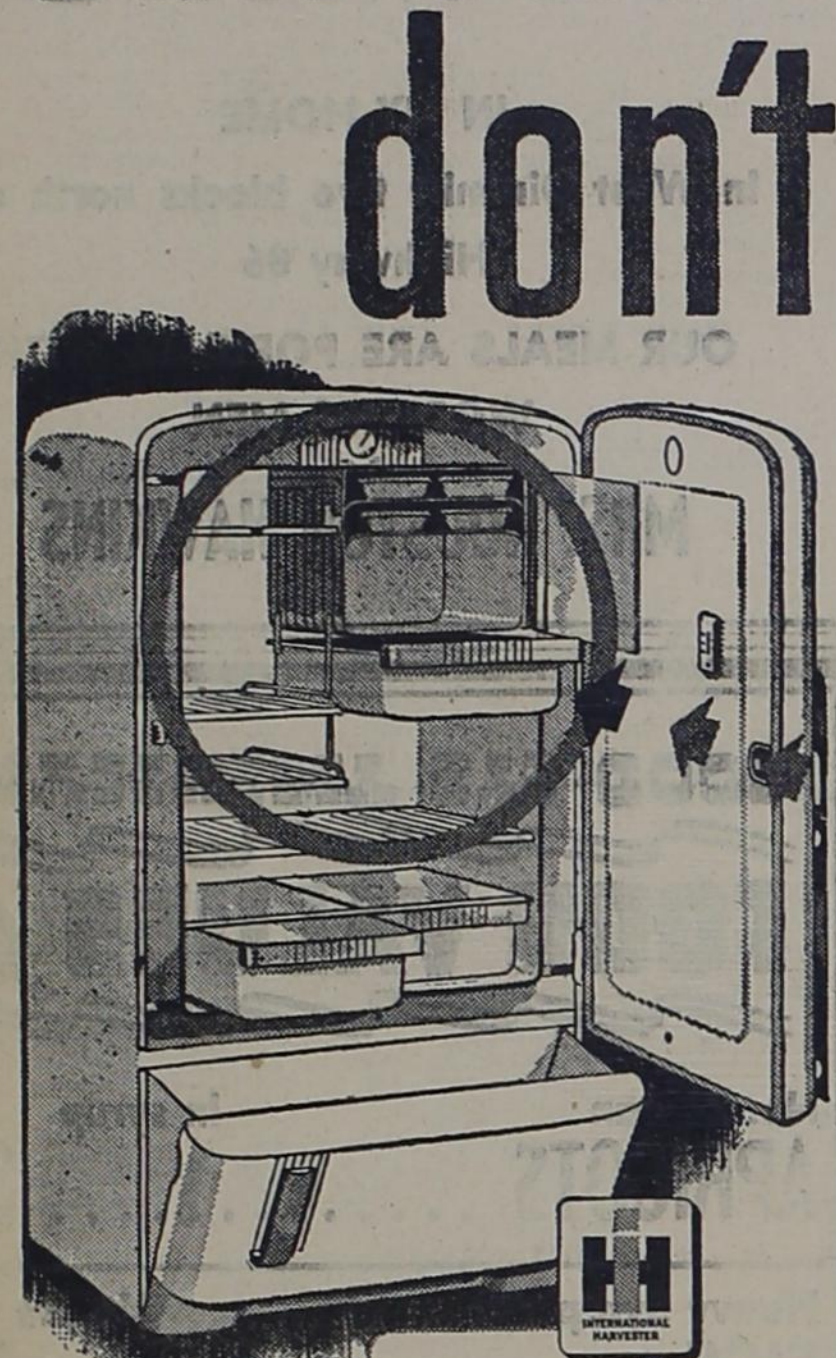

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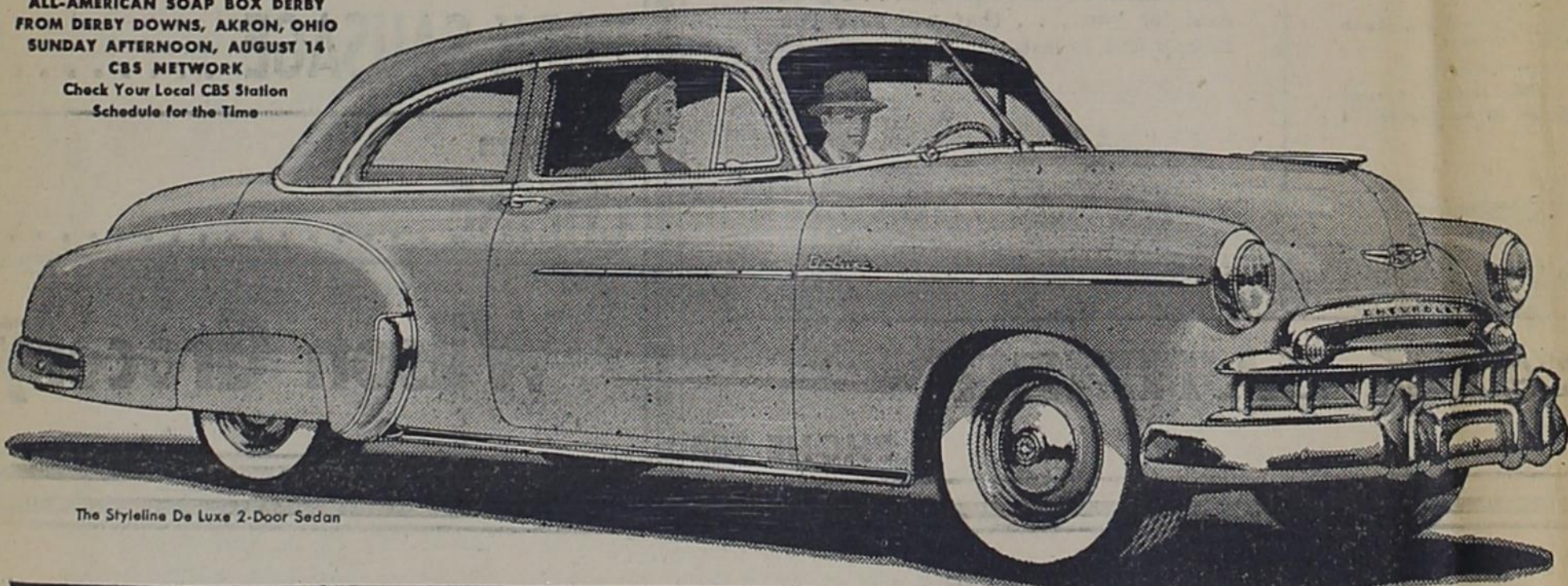

I know of no better training for the hunter-rifleman than chuck shooting. Except for crowd shooting, it requires more skill and better equipment than any other form of rifle shooting. Chuck hunting is full of thrills, and a dead shot at fairly long range, after a good piece of stalking or spying, is quite an achievement.

The mark one has to shoot at is quite small. Often only the head is visible and this sportiest of all targets is equivalent to a 3 1/2-inch bull's eye. What the successful woodchucker needs, therefore, is a rifle, ammunition and equipment with which he can surely hit a 3 1/2-inch bull's eye at an estimated 200 yards the first shot.

Col. Townsend Whelen, well known arms and ammunition authority, says that first of all, good binoculars are a must for finding chucks. Since the development of the .22 Hornet cartridge, he has used that almost exclusively in a variety of rifles equipped with a 4-power scope with double micrometer target mounts.

He writes "I have found this type of mount very essential in long-range varmint shooting. You want to continually keep your rifle sighted to strike almost precisely 1 inch, or 1 1/2 inches above aim at 100 yards.

"I practically never miss a chuck up to 175 yards with my Hornet rifles when I can get a good, steady prone or sitting position, or get worked into a steady position along a stone wall, always aided by the gun sling. More often than not I make clean kills at 200 yards. Up to that distance, when the Hornet bullet enters the chest or abdominal cavities, it practically always kills the chuck dead in its tracks.

"Finally my friends persuaded me that I was out of date and that I ought to get a rifle for the .22-3000 R2 cartridge because I would have a much longer sure-hitting range, considerably less wind drift, better accuracy, and a flatter trajectory. I found this to be true. In many respects I think it is the best of all the chuck cartridges. But the expense is much greater than for a Hornet, the rifle has to be custom-made and the ammunition has to be very carefully hand-loaded.

"There are two reasons why I am so partial to the .22 Hornet and the .22-3000 R2 cartridges for woodchuck shooting. First, the cartridges are so small, and

any farmer objects to their use. Second, the rifles have a practically unlimited accuracy life, and a pet rifle for either cartridge, tuned up to perfection, should last you almost a lifetime.

"One year I used my .257 Roberts rifle for chuck, and it also did well, but it is quite a sausage machine in the way it blows up the little beasts. The .22 long rifle, high-speed, hollow-point bullet will kill quickly only when it enters the brain, breaks the spinal column, or drives well into the center of the chest cavity of the chuck. Such a hit, even with a scope, cannot be assured

Urges Checking Of Pensions as Good Business

Checking on your old age and survivors account is like having your bank account balanced and is just as good business. This is the advice of John R. Sanderson, manager of the Amarillo office of the Social Security Administration, in reminding workers of this free service.

"We urge all workers to check at intervals on their accounts," Sanderson explained, "so that they may be sure of receiving credit for all wages they earn. We make every precaution to insure the accuracy of our records, but some wages are reported that cannot be posted. Most errors on reports are due to mistakes in the worker's name or account or the failure to show any number.

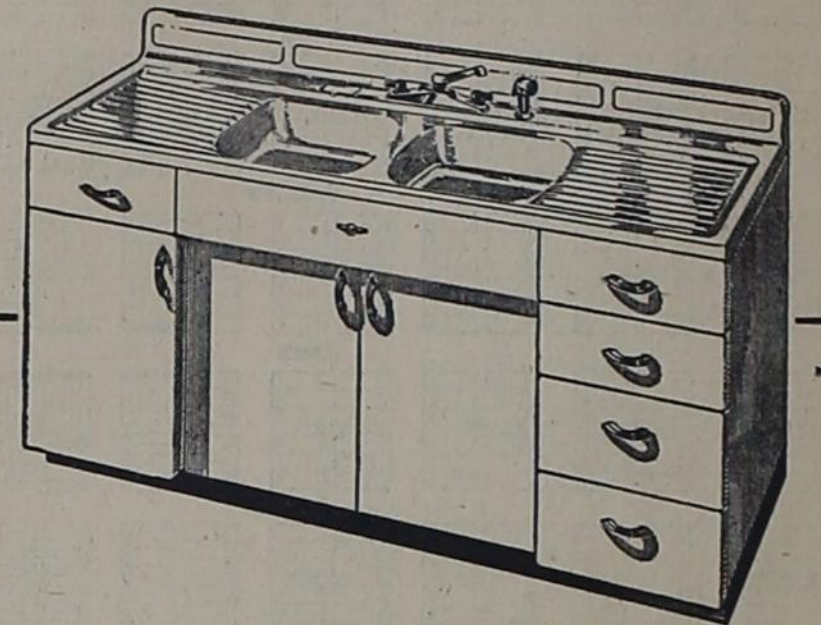
Sometimes the wrong amount of wages is reported and occasionally no report at all is made." Sanderson added there is no charge for furnishing wage statements and any worker can obtain one easily. 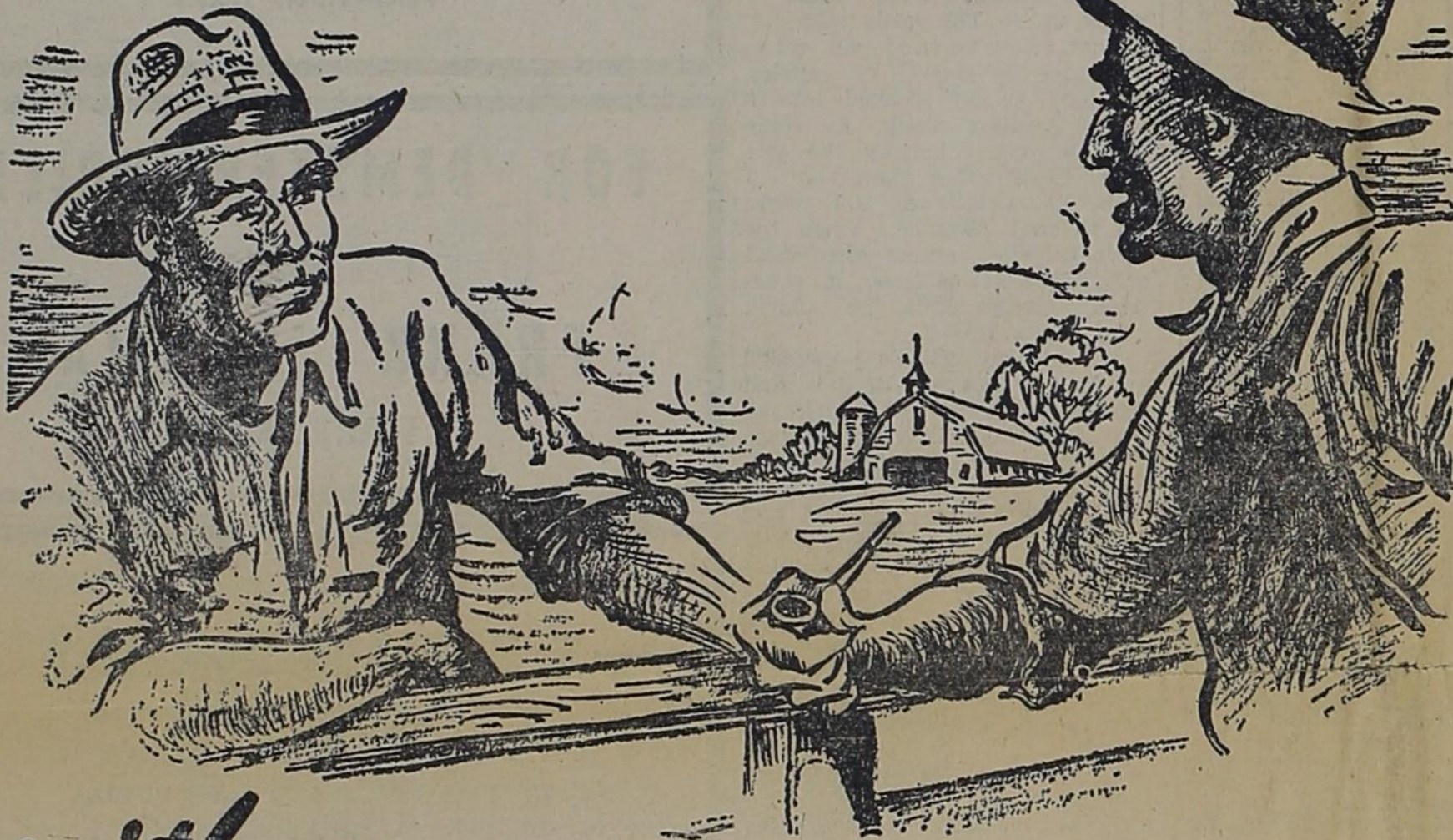
