

Twenty Four Girls Enter Pageant To Vie For

Miss Grain Sorghum

Twenty-four young ladies from Texas, Kansas and Oklahoma will arrive here Friday, August 5th to begin competition for the title of "Miss Grain Sorghum of The Nation." Final selection will be made Saturday night, August 6th at a Pageant to be held in the Dimmitt High School Auditorium.

The new Miss Grain Sorghum will be crowned by Miss Lanell Lafon of Muleshoe, Texas. In addition to becoming a representative for the Grain Sorghum Industry for the coming year, Miss Grain Sorghum 1966 will receive a crown, a trophy, and a \$500 scholarship to the college of her choice. First runner-up will receive a trophy and a \$200 scholarship while the second runner-up will receive a trophy and a \$100 scholarship.

Registration will be held Friday at 1:00 p.m. Contestants will undergo briefings and rehearsals Friday afternoon, and then will attend a reception in their honor Friday night.

Saturday the girls will continue rehearsals and will be interviewed by a panel of judges as step one in the competition. Saturday night, the girls will compete in full pageantry in swim suit, formal, and talent competition.

Master of Ceremonies for this year's show is Odis "Pop" Echols of Station KCLV in Clovis, New Mexico. This year's pageant is under the direction of the Miss Grain Sorghum Committee of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce.

The News is in receipt of the following telegram from Congressman Walter Rogers:

"With deep regret and after exhaustive and careful consideration of all factors I have decided to decline the nomination to appear on the ballot in the general election in November. It is my intention to re-enter the private practice of law at the end of this term of congress. The great wealth of able and qualified individuals of the true American tradition in the Panhandle of Texas should enable the Democratic party to choose another nominee for this position in accordance with the law and in ample time for such nominee to conduct a highly successful campaign."

During the week end all news media and county democratic chairmen in this congressional district were notified, either by letter or telegram, of Congressman Rogers' decision to withdraw from the upcoming November election. The big question on everyone's mind, and repeatedly asked was, "Why? No one seemed to have the answer. Was he afraid that he would be defeated? Hardly. Is he getting an appointment to a federal judgeship? Not likely, there hasn't been an indication of deep and abiding affection between the congressman and the present administration in Washington. An appointment is highly unlikely.

Walter Rogers is an able attorney and from all indications he is well liked on the hill, a qualification and a situation that would auger well for a very lucrative position as a lobbyist for one of more major oil companies. To me this is the safest bet.

I don't have any statistics or documented data to support my opinion in the matter, but I believe that if somebody wanted to go to the trouble of researching the matter they would find that Congressman Rogers has voted with the Republicans in the Congress more times than he voted with his own party. I like Walter Rogers, and consider him to be my friend regardless of the fact that he lambasted me in every snooker game we ever played, but I am not blind to the fact that he is not a good democrat so far as his voting in the congress is concerned.

When announcement of Rogers resignation was made it was my belief that the Democrats would have to try to settle on some one candidate in the General Election with a write-in campaign. And because of that opinion I judged Rogers rather harshly because I thought he had let his district down by making the sure election of a republican possible. As it turns out, however, the Texas election code provides for the selection of a candidate by the county democratic chairmen in the district. This will assure the party of having a printed name on the ballot, and only one. Any candidates have been suggested and several are seeking the appointment as a candidate by the

Car And Trailer Skid Off Road As Funeral Procession Approaches

A 1963 Oldsmobile pulling a trailer house skidded off the road and narrowly missed a telephone pole when the car in front of it unexpectedly slowed down and stopped to let a funeral procession pass at approximately 3 p.m. according to Deputy Sheriff Granville Martin.

The accident occurred east of town on Highway 194 across from the Western Ammonia plant. The Oldsmobile driven by J. C. Louison of Corpus Christi swerved to the right, off the pavement and into the mud when Mrs. Joe Wall of Dimmitt suddenly stopped her car to let the funeral procession pass. Louison and his wife and grandson were on a trip at the time of the accident.

Both cars were traveling west at the time of the mishap. No injuries occurred.

Both men had been drinking at the time of the murder.

Two Dimmitt Girls Will Visit AFS Sisters In France And Belgium

Pat Moran and Jane Cleavinger will depart at 4 p.m. today from the Lubbock Municipal Airport enroute to Paris for a reunion with their American Field Service sisters. Pat's French sister, Michele Bertonneau, was an exchange student in Dimmitt High School in 1963-64, and Jane's Belgian sister, Francoise Sturbelle, was an exchange student here in 1964-65.

Pat and Jane are the 19-year-old daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Russel Moran and Mr. and Mrs. M. E. Cleavinger. Pat is a sophomore at Baylor University and Jane is also a sophomore at West Texas State.

The girls will fly to Paris with the youth group of the World Methodist Conference tour enroute to London. They will leave the tour in Paris where they will be met by the families of their respective sisters.

The Bertonneau family will take Pat to their home in Loudun, 150 miles south of Paris, after a few days in Paris. Jane will join the Sturbelles at home in Brussels. Both families have planned sight-seeing tours and entertainment for the girls during their stay. They will "see the things that the average tourist doesn't see."

Pat and Michele will take the train to Brussels a few days before the two American girls fly to London to rejoin the tour on August 18. They will return to Lubbock August 22.

The girls have been planning the trip for over a year and a half. They said, "They (Francoise and Michele) came here to see the way we live and now they will show us how they live."

Although they have saved for the trip for some time, the girls didn't expect to have "money for a Coke" by the time they get home.

American Cyanamid Company Is Constructing Plant In Dimmitt

The American Cyanamid Company, with home offices in Princeton, N. J., has begun construction of a fertilizer blending plant, and distributing center for farm chemicals, on a location on the Fort Worth & Denver Railway right-of-way just south of the Bruegel & Sons Elevators.

According to information released this week by Gene Morgan of Dallas, hub manager of the company's West Texas plants, the local plant facility would provide storage for 1,000 tons of dry fertilizer, tanks for anhydrous ammonia and a store building for farm chemicals and animal medical products. Commodities handled by the company will be on both wholesale and retail basis.

Construction contract for the farm service center was let to the Brown-McKee Construction Company of Lubbock at an estimated cost in excess of \$100,000. To be completed by January of 1967, the building will be of marine type plywood, because of corrosion.

Three to four people will be employed in the operation of the automated plant when it is completed. American Cyanamid Company a major manufacturer of fertilizers, farm chemicals and animal medical products, has similar plants to the Dimmitt installation at Kress, Bovina, Petersburg, Hereford, Ropesville and Lamesa in the Plains area.

Neon Sign Causes Fire In Colonial Inn Restaurant Early Saturday

A blaze caused by a defective neon sign destroyed the roof of the Colonial Inn Restaurant and manager's living quarters about 6 a.m. Saturday. Smoke and water damaged all carpeting in the restaurant and carpet, furniture and clothing in the living quarters.

Mrs. J. B. Richardson said the fire, which is estimated to have started about 5:30 a.m., was discovered by an unidentified girl who notified the restaurant cook that the sign was on fire. He investigated when he noticed smoke coming through the air conditioner. Mrs. Richardson and her husband are managers of the motel. At the present time repairmen are tearing out the damaged roof and carpet. The restaurant will be closed for three weeks while repairs are being made.

Mrs. Richardson said that the motel headquarters have been temporarily set up in the motel proper while the repairs are being made.

Otte Is Among 17 In Tractor Workshop At A&I

Elroy Otte of Dimmitt is among 17 vocational agriculture teachers presently at Texas College of Arts and Industries, Kingsville, participating in a Farm Tractor Reconditioning Workshop sponsored by the college's Agriculture Division.

The workshop is designed to add agriculture instructors in teaching tractor repair to junior and senior students in their own high schools and is similar to the occupational training offered by many schools in the field of automotive mechanics.

Texas A & I is the first college in the state to receive approval of the Texas Education Agency to conduct such a course, according to Paul R. Chilen, associate professor of agriculture at A & I and director of the workshop. While tractor repair is the only area being covered at present, Chilen added that Texas A & I plans next summer to add courses in the repair of tillage and planting machines as well as various types of harvesting equipment.

The tractors, along with required spare parts, are being provided by Kingsville farm implement dealers at no charge to the college. The repaired equipment will be returned to the dealers at the conclusion of the workshop. In addition, various farm machinery and electrical firms are providing test equipment and consultant personnel.

"It is appointed unto men once to die, and after this cometh judgment." Heb. 9:27. You may not have thought about death very much. Soil Intake Of Rain Or Irrigation Water Measured; Factors Named

Taken from "The Yearbook of Agriculture"

The major factors that affect intake of water by soil are — 1. Surface condition and amount of protection against the impact of rain; 2. Internal characteristics of the soil mass including pore size, depth or thickness of the permeable portion, degree of swelling of clay, content of organic matter, and degree of aggregation; 3. The moisture content and degree of saturation; 4. The duration of rainfall or application of water; the season of the year and temperature of soil and water.

Of the five factors, the one readily modified by man's action are those dealing with surface condition of land and its protection against rain impact. Protective covers of vegetation or mulch, with the consequent accumulation of organic matter in the soil, do essentially what nature has done throughout the centuries. By intensive tillage man disposes of or obliterates the vegetation that provides surface protection and accelerates the loss of organic matter. By crop rotation that includes grass and legumes, and by providing a mulch from high residue crop, he recovers a part of the loss he has caused. Infiltration is improved but not to its full

former rate. For further improvement in intake man must look largely to mechanical means.

An effective way to increase infiltration is use of mulch of crop residue. At Zanewille, Ohio, an extensive series of experiments with different kinds and rates of application of mulch were made. The results showed that the function of mulch is primarily to protect the existing favorable structure. If the soil is not permeable, the mulch does not make it so. When a tight soil was cultivated one inch deep and as little as two tons an acre of straw applied to the surface, however,

the infiltration rate after 60 minutes of rain was 2.0 inches an hour, and 1.63 inches an hour 100 minutes after the rain started. On land without mulch but otherwise similar in all respects, the rate of infiltration dropped to 0.28 inch an hour within 60 minutes after the start of the rain. The impact of the rain on the unprotected soil produced the typical dense soil surface, which at best is only slowly permeable.

Fields repeatedly in wheat were investigated at Hays, Kansas, and comparison made between plots on which the stubble was burned before tillage, and plots where tillage was such as to leave the stubble on the surface. The total amount of infiltration during a storm was 0.71 inch where stubble was burned and 1.16 inches where its protective influence remained at the surface.

Most plant life is dependent upon the intake of water by soil. Springs, wells, ground water supplies, and the base flow of streams are dependent on it. To no small degree, man's use and management of the land govern the rate and amount of intake. Fortunately, wise management of land, so that the natural structure of the soil is preserved or restored in some measure, is normally beneficial to crop and livestock production.

After any change in boundaries, the governing body of any such district, without the necessity of an additional election, shall have the power to assess, levy and collect ad valorem taxes on all taxable property within the district as changed, for the payment of principal and interest on such bonds in the manner permitted by the laws under which such bonds were voted.

(c) Upon receipt of the sworn statement in writing the local tax assessor shall determine whether or not such land qualifies for the designation as agricultural use as defined herein and in the event it so qualifies he shall designate such land as being for agricultural use and assess the land accordingly.

(d) Such local tax assessor may inspect the land and require such evidence of use and source of income as may be necessary or useful in determining whether or not the agricultural use provision of this article applies.

Headlines about the news of crisis in America's largest cities — of racial strife, rising crime rates, air and water pollution, inadequate transportation systems, overcrowded schools and hospitals, and strained municipal treasuries. Meanwhile, the cities compete aggressively to attract new industry to provide new jobs for their burgeoning populations and to generate new tax revenues. Cities such as New York are working with business leaders to hold the business-industrial base already developed, and to broaden it.

There are no easy answers to the problems cities face, but it is apparent that millions of residents of huge metropolitan areas, in the city cores and suburbs, desire improvements in the quality of their living. Many of these Americans were attracted to the cities in the first place because the economic opportunities were less attractive in the rural areas and small towns they had called home.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 48 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts created under Article IX of the Constitution.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 9, Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 9. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of hospital districts composed of one or more counties or all or any part of one or more counties with power to issue bonds for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping same, for hospital purposes; providing for the transfer to the hospital district of the title to any land, buildings, improvements and equipment located wholly within the district which may be jointly or separately owned by any city, town or county, providing that any district so created shall assume full responsibility for providing medical and hospital care for its needy inhabitants and assume the outstanding indebtedness incurred by cities, towns and counties for hospital purposes prior to the creation of the district, if same are located wholly within its boundaries, and a prorate portion of such indebtedness based upon the then last approved tax assessment rolls of the included cities, towns and counties if less than all

the territory thereof is included within the district boundaries; providing that after its creation no other municipality or political subdivision shall have the power to levy taxes or issue bonds or other obligations for hospital purposes or for providing medical care within the boundaries of the district; providing for the levy of annual taxes at a rate not to exceed seventy-five cents (75c) on the One Hundred Dollar valuation of all taxable property within such district for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the district's bonds, the indebtedness assumed by it and its maintenance and operating expenses, providing that such district shall not be created or such tax authorized unless approved by a majority of the qualified property taxing electors thereof voting at an election called for the purpose; and providing further that the support and maintenance of the district's hospital system shall never become a charge against or obligation of the State of Texas nor shall any direct appropriation be made by the Legislature for the construction, maintenance or improvement of any of the facilities of such district.

Provided, however, that no district shall be created except by act of the Legislature and then only after thirty (30) days' public notice to the district affected, and in no event may the Legislature provide for a district to be created without the affirmative vote of a majority of the taxpayers within the district concerned.

The Legislature may also provide for the dissolution of hospital districts provided that a process is afforded by statute for:

(1) determining the desire of a majority of the qualified voters within the district to dissolve it;

(2) disposing of or transferring the assets, if any, of the district; and

(3) satisfying the debts and bond obligations, if any, of the district, in such manner as to protect the interest of the citizens within the district, including their collective property rights in the assets and property of the district, provided, however, that any grant from federal funds, however dispensed, shall be considered an obligation to be repaid in satisfaction and provided that no election to dissolve shall be held more often than once each year. In such connection, the statute shall provide against disposal or transfer of the assets of the district except for due compensation unless such assets are transferred to another governmental agency, such as a county, embracing such district and using such transferred assets in such a way as to benefit citizens formerly within the district.

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

"AGAINST the constitutional amendment providing the method and manner for dissolution of hospital districts."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

ever, the precedent for tax write-off approaches was set some years ago by Congress in approving a bill advocated by the Defense Department to help disperse defense industries from areas regarded as prime targets in event of enemy nuclear attack.

A good, healthy trend toward non-urban plant locations is developing. All of us need to keep telling the wonderful Panhandle story, and the story of our own towns and cities.

Headlines about the news of crisis in America's largest cities — of racial strife, rising crime rates, air and water pollution, inadequate transportation systems, overcrowded schools and hospitals, and strained municipal treasuries. As I noted in this newsletter several weeks ago, money is an increasing problem for city governments and the Nation's largest cities have turned with increasing pressure to the Federal treasury in an effort to obtain assistance in solving their problems.

Meanwhile, the cities compete aggressively to attract new industry to provide new jobs for their burgeoning populations and to generate new tax revenues. Cities such as New York are working with business leaders to hold the business-industrial base already developed, and to broaden it.

In my views, there is increasing opportunity for areas such as our Texas Panhandle to attract the new business and industry on which a regional economy can be strengthened. We have the people, the community leadership the climate, the transportation structure, the recreational opportunity (so greatly augmented by Lake Meredith and other water projects being developed or in the planning stage), the pleasant life of friendly cities and towns where families can put down roots and feel at home. And we have the rich mineral and agricultural resources that provide the essential raw materials for numerous industrial enterprises.

With local chambers of commerce taking the lead, communities across the Panhandle are scouting for businessmen and industrialists who wish to relocate facilities or build new ones. The Amarillo Chamber of Commerce, to cite an example, has prepared a very attractive brochure based on a recent Texas Parade magazine article, "Amarillo: Space to Space Age." With many color photographs and drawings, the brochure's last page notes that Amarillo is the fastest growing metropolitan market in the Southwest, with a growth rate increase of 22.9 percent from 1960 to 1965. The Panhandle area as a whole can speak in the same terms.

Along with Chambers of Commerce, the utility companies, rural electric cooperatives, banks and other enterprises are working hard to bring industrial development. In my own conversations with business leaders, I have found growing interest for the possibilities of developing new facilities in our area. On the State level, the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and the Texas Industrial Commission pursue the search for new business and industrial development.

It is possible that Congress may next year consider some form of incentive plan to assist new plant construction in areas primarily rural in character. Legislation may be proposed providing Federal income tax incentives for such development, although such a measure would be almost certain to draw opposition from huge cities and their Representatives. How-

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an Amendment to Article IX of the Constitution of Texas by adding thereto a new Section 12; authorizing the Legislature to provide by law for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties; authorizing the creation of a board of directors by appointment or election; providing that the membership of the board shall be based upon the proportionate part of the population of each county, with no county having less than one member; providing for the necessary election; authorizing the levy of an annual tax not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation; provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; authorizing the Authority to employ or appoint an assessor and collector of taxes whose duty it shall be to assess and collect the taxes on the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors of said Authority, said taxes to be assessed equally and uniformly throughout the county or counties, comprising the Authority, as required by the Constitution; granting to such Authority the power to acquire by purchase, or through eminent domain, proceedings existing publicly financed airport properties or other sites necessary to have and to improve the same, power to issue and sell general obligation bonds and revenue bonds, or either of them; authorizing the assumption of outstanding indebtedness secured by general obligation bonds and assuming the obligations of the city or cities under ordinances and bond indentures under which revenue bonds have been issued and sold; to enact zoning regulations and other measures to protect the airport facilities from hazards and obstructions; providing for the adding of an additional county or counties to the Authority.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 12, to read as follows:

"Section 12. The Legislature may by law provide for the creation, establishment, maintenance and operation of Airport Authorities composed of one or more counties, with power to issue general obligation bonds, or either of them, for the purchase, acquisition by eminent domain or otherwise, reconstruction, repair or renovation of any airport or airports, landing fields and runways, airport buildings, hangars, facilities, equipment, fixtures, and any and all property, real or personal, necessary to operate, equip and maintain an airport; shall provide for the option by the governing body of the city or cities whose airport facilities are served by certified airlines and whose facility or some interest therein, is proposed to be or has been acquired by the Authority, to either appoint or elect a Board of Directors of said Authority; if the Directors are appointed such appointment shall be made by the County Commissioners Court after consultation with and consent of the governing body or bodies of such city or cities, and if the Board of Directors is elected they shall be elected by the qualified taxpayer voters of the county which chooses to elect the Directors to represent that county; such Directors shall serve without compensation for a term fixed by the Legislature not to exceed six (6) years, and shall be selected on the basis of the proportionate population of each county based upon the last preceding Federal Census, and shall be a resident or residents of such county; provided that no county shall have less than one (1) member on the Board of Directors; provide for the holding of an election in each county proposing the creation of an Authority to be called by the Commissioners Court or the Commissioners Courts, as the case may be, upon petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayer voters within the county or counties, said elections to be held on the same day if more than one county is included, provided that no more than one (1) such election may be called in a county until after the expiration of one (1) year; in the event such an election has failed, and thereafter only upon a petition of ten per cent (10%) of the qualified taxpayer voters being presented to the Commissioners Court or Commissioners Courts of the county or counties in which such an election has failed, and in the event that two or more counties vote on the proposition of the creation of an Authority therein, the proposition shall not be deemed to carry unless the majority of the qualified taxpayer voters in each county voting thereon vote in favor thereof; provided, however, that an Airport Authority may be created and be composed of the county or counties that vote in favor of its creation if separate propositions are submitted to the voters of each county so that they may vote for a two or more county Authority or a single county Authority; provide for the appointment by the Board of Directors of an Assessor and Collector of Taxes in the Authority, whether constituted of one or more counties, whose duty it shall be to assess all taxable property, both real and personal, and collect the taxes thereon, based upon the tax rolls approved by the Board of Directors, the tax to be levied not to exceed Seventy-Five Cents (75c) per One Hundred Dollars (\$100) assessed valuation of the property, provided, however, that the property of state regulated common carriers required by law to pay a tax upon intangible assets shall not be subject to taxation by the Authority; said taxable property shall be assessed on a valuation not to exceed the market value and shall be equal and uniform throughout the Authority as is otherwise provided by the Constitution; the Legislature shall authorize the purchase or acquisition by the Authority of any existing airport facility publicly owned and financed and served by certified airlines, in fee or of any interest therein, or to enter into any lease agreement therefor, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreeable to the Authority and the owner of such facilities, or authorize the acquisition of same through the exercise of the power of eminent domain, and in the event of such acquisition, if there are any general obligation bonds that the owner of the publicly owned airport facility has outstanding, the same shall be fully assumed by the Authority and sufficient taxes levied by the Authority to discharge said outstanding indebtedness; and likewise any city or owner that has outstanding revenue bonds where the revenues of the airport have been pledged or said bonds constitute a lien against the airport facilities, the Authority shall assume and discharge all the obligations of the city under the ordinances and bond indentures under which said revenue bonds have been issued and sold. Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13 proposing an Amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas as so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, effective February 1, 1968, by deleting the following language:

"and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election: Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she is the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost or misplaced and receive the receipt therefor."

provided, however, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered annually, but such requirement for registration shall not be considered a qualification of an elector within the meaning of the term 'qualified elector' as used in any other Article of this Constitution in respect to any matter except qualification and eligibility to vote at an election. Any legislation enacted in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment shall not be invalid because of its anticipatory nature. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. And this provision of the Constitution shall be self-enacting without the necessity of further legislation. Any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of en-

tering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces."

Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one (21) years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this State one (1) year next preceding an election and the last six (6) months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; and provided further, that any voter who is subject to pay a poll tax under the laws of the State of Texas shall have paid said tax before offering to vote at any election in this State and hold a receipt showing that said poll tax was paid before the first day of February next preceding such election. Or if said voter shall have lost or misplaced said tax receipt, he or she is the case may be, shall be entitled to vote upon making affidavit before any officer authorized to administer oaths that such tax receipt has been lost or misplaced and receive the receipt therefor."

"Section 4. In all elections by the people, the vote shall be by ballot, and the Legislature shall provide for the numbering of tickets and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of the ballot box; and the Legislature may shall provide by law for the registration of all voters in all cities containing a population of ten thousand inhabitants or more."

Section 3. If any other Amendment to Sections 2 or 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, being for a different purpose, is adopted at an earlier election or at the same election, the adoption of this Amendment shall not be construed as nullifying any change made by such other Amendment.

Section 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

"AGAINST repealing the poll tax as a requirement for voting."

Section 5. If the foregoing Amendment is adopted by a proclamation of the Governor declaring the adoption of the Amendment shall set forth the full text of the amended Sections, as amended herein and as amended by any other proposed Amendment which is submitted by the 59th Legislature and which has been duly adopted prior to such proclamation.

Section 6. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Any city which owns airport facilities not serving certificated airlines which are not purchased or acquired or taken over as herein provided by such Authority, shall have the power to operate the same under the existing laws or as the same may hereafter be amended. Any such Authority when created may be granted the power and authority to promulgate, adopt and enforce appropriate zoning regulations to protect the airport from

hazards and obstructions which would interfere with the use of the airport and its facilities for landing and take-off; an additional county or counties may be added to an existing Authority if a petition of five per cent (5%) of the qualified taxpayer voters is filed with and an election is called by the Commissioners Court of the county or counties seeking admission to an Authority and the vote is favorable, then admission may be granted to such county or counties by the Board of Directors of the then existing Authority upon such terms and conditions as they may agree upon and evidenced by a resolution approved by two-thirds (2/3rds) of the then existing Board of Directors, provided, however, the county or counties that may be so added to the then existing Authority shall be given representation on the Board of Directors by adding additional directors in proportion to their population according to the last preceding Federal Census."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1966, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

THE THREE P's — PLUMS, PEARS, POTATOES

The three P's — plums, pears and potatoes — promise to be the most plentiful foods at local markets during August. So reports the Consumer and Marketing Service, the U. S. Department of Agriculture agency which keeps you posted on current food supplies.

Also, turkeys, peanut butter and summer vegetables from near by truck gardens rate the official August plentiful list. With the hottest month at hand, look for the refreshment foods which are satisfying and nutritious, and at the same time economical.

Plums are the perfect "perk-you-up" food, just right for a-

ty snack. They are thirst-quenching and contain vitamins, A, B, and C. What's more, they're a bargain, as production is running about 20 percent above the last 5 year average.

Pears — the Bartlett variety so highly favored for salads — are expected to exceed the record 1964 crop. What an ideal situation for fruit lovers. You can serve low-calorie desserts or appetizers combining plums and pears.

Potatoes top the list of plentiful vegetables as early and late summer crops overlap, offering you both red and white potatoes in a variety of sizes.

Other summer vegetables in good supply include okra, tomatoes, squash and various field peas.

MANY VARIETIES OF BREADS AND MEATS

The butcher, the baker — even the candlestick maker. What tempting wares they are offering to make a big event of August Sandwich Month — the annual celebration in honor of that epitome of American life — the sandwich. Little did the Earl of Sandwich, who lent his name to what has become one of America's most popular foods, know that we would be eating around 100 million sandwiches daily.

When you visit your butcher, you'll find enough varieties of ready-to-serve luncheon meats and sausages to make a different sandwich for every meal during August.

Take a tip from our Scandinavian neighbors who feature open-faced sandwiches. Use hard rolls, buns and small French loaves, with the center removed for the sandwich filling.

GROUND BEEF
Here's a thrifty and nutritious way to stretch your supply of ground beef by grating coarsely aged. Use potatoes — one food which is much cheaper than last year.

Combine the potatoes with ground beef by grating coarsely about 2 cups to add to 1½ pounds of meat. Also, add 2 tablespoons of grated onion, 1½ teaspoons salt, ¼ teaspoon pepper and for flavor — a light touch of onion

Mrs. Mauldin is a certified director of music in the Methodist Church, and serves as choir director at Hale Center, First Methodist Church. The couple has five children.

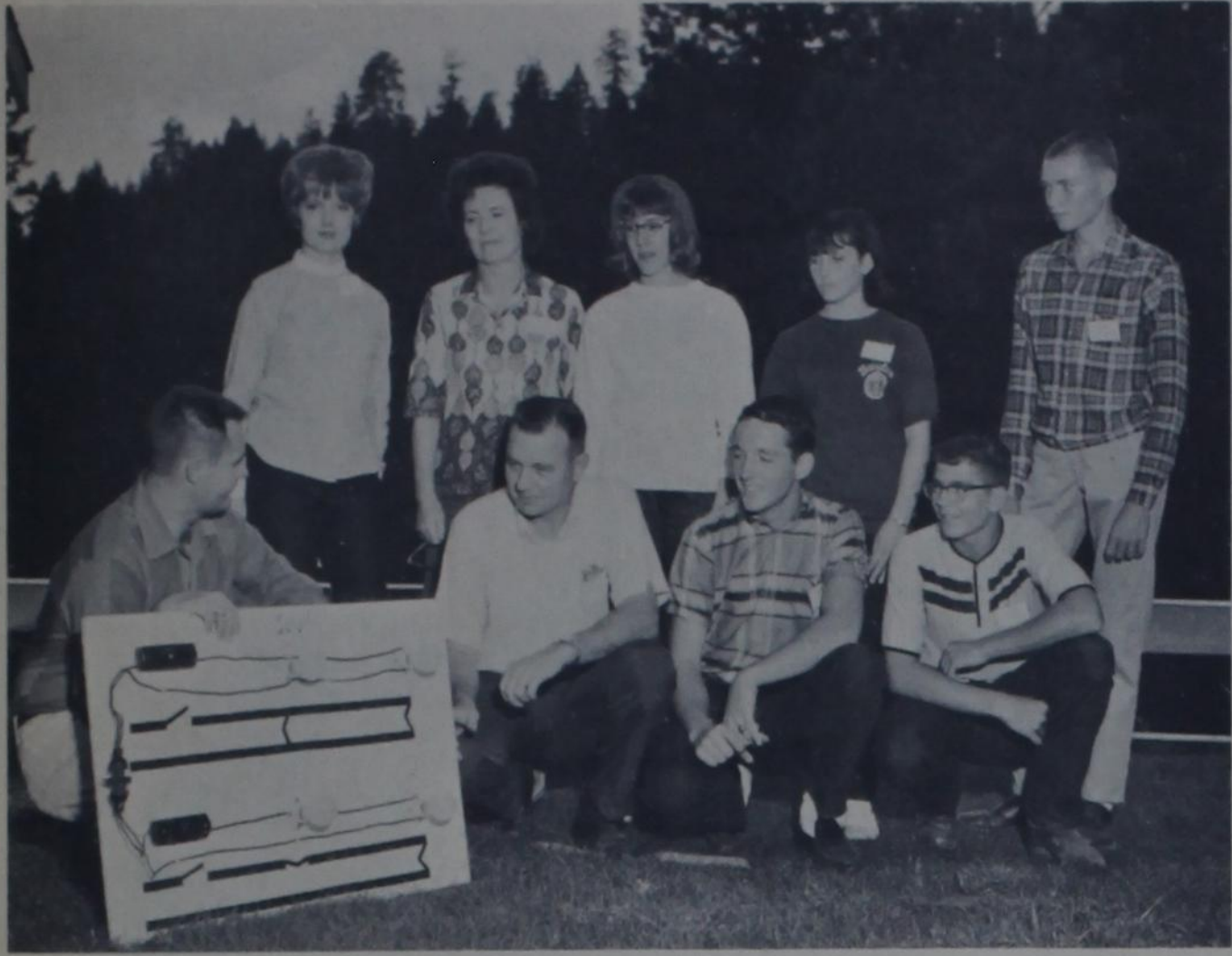
