At least eight and probably ten teams will participate in the tournament with four more teams, not eligible to play in the meet because of Texas Interscholastic League rules, slated to play exhibition games.

Teams which already have entered the tournament include Peacock, which boasts a 24-game winning streak, Avoca, Eula, Roby, Lawn, Tuscola, Merkel and Trent.

Hawley, McCauley, Mason and Denton Valley, which have played in three tournaments and thus are not eligible to compete in any more meets, will meet in exhibition games.

Dr. William O. Beazley, assistant to the president and prominent sport enthusiast, will direct the tournament. Assisting him will be Mrs. Ethel Weekes and Otho Polk of the physical education department, Bill Scott, head basketball coach, and E. W. (Bill) Ledbetter, business manager of the university.

Watches and individual awards will be presented at the conclusion of the meet which gets underway at 6 p. m. Thursday, Dr. Beazley stated. The tournament may develop into a 16-team bracket before pairings are made, he said.

Location places it 750 feet from the north and 1,500 feet from the east lines of SP Survey 1. No. 1 Brown is contracted for 1,500 feet with rotary.

Latest producer for the Eula Lower Hope Field, three and one-half miles southwest of Clyde, is Clark & Cowden Oil Co., et al, of Dallas, No. 1 Nellie Harrison, Section 46, BBB&C Survey.

Daily potential was 78.16 barrels of 37 gravity oil, flowing through 14-64 choke with 270 pounds on casing and 300 pounds pressure on tubing.

It is producing from an open hole at 1,789-1,818 feet. Top of the pay was called at 1,806 feet. No. 1 Harrison had a gas-oil ration of 800-1.

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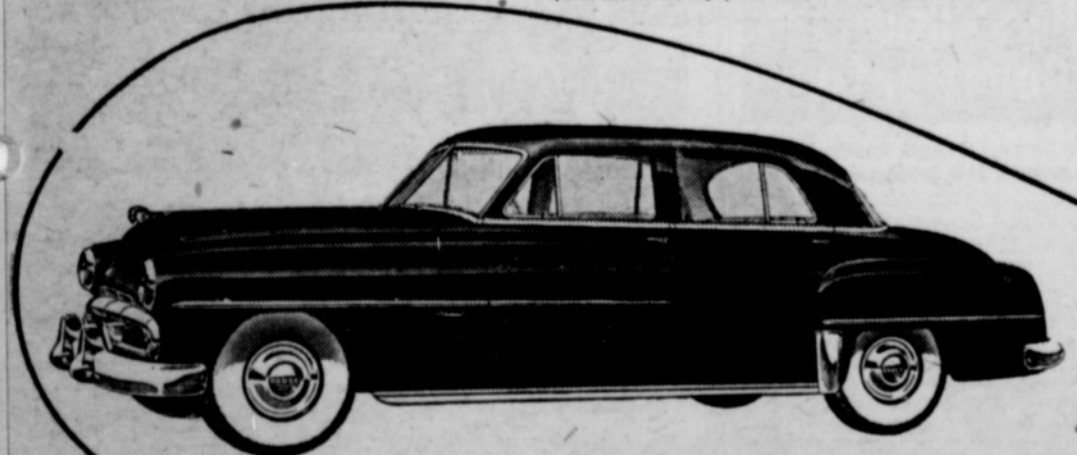

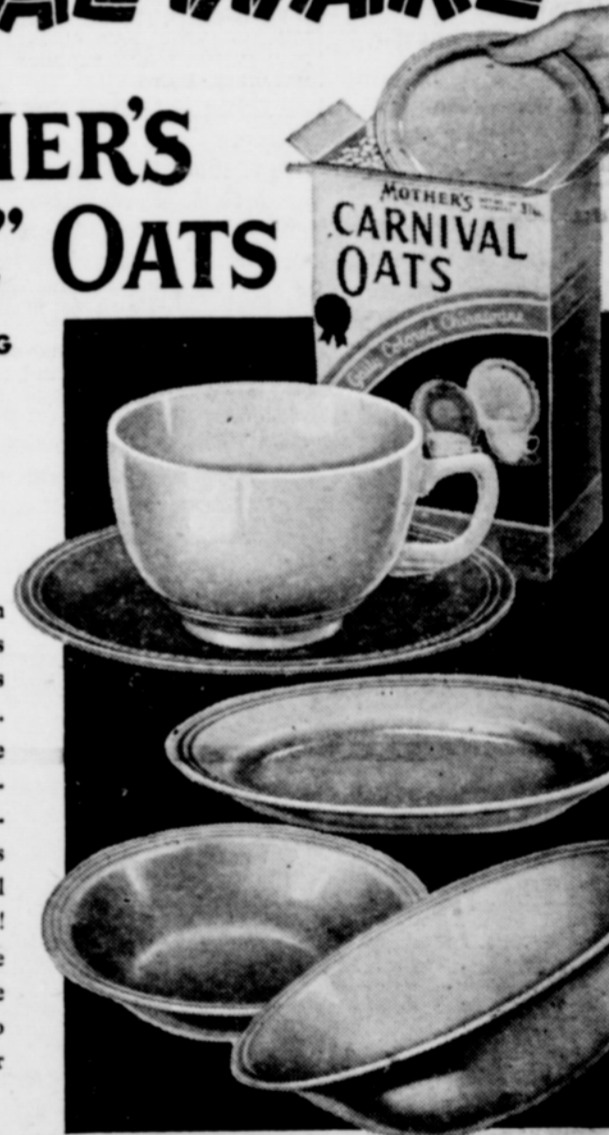

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance adopting standards for official traffic-control devices and signals as promulgated by the State Highway Departments Manual and Specifications; and establishing procedure for the placing of such official devices and signals upon the streets of the City of Baird, Texas; and providing for the enforcement thereof; and providing that it shall be illegal to fail to heed and observe such devices or signals and adopting the "uniform act regulating traffic on highways" for the City of Baird and all streets therein; and prohibiting the defacing, injuring, moving, obstructing or interfering with any stop sign or traffic control device; and prohibiting anyone from driving within the corporate city limits of Baird in excess of thirty miles per hour; and requiring the operator of any vehicle to stop at any stop sign; and requiring parallel parking on any point on Highway U. S. 80, said parking to be done in a space marked for this purpose and each vehicle to be parked with its right wheels to the curb and not more than 18 inches from the edge thereof; and requiring that no parking shall be done within 30 feet west of the northeast corner of Block 25 of the City of Baird; and prohibiting any vehicle from touching or protruding over any pedestrian island erected or to be erected; and prohibiting the operator of any vehicle from parking in a lane marked for pedestrian use; and providing that this ordinance shall be controlling of the "uniform act regulating traffic on highways" in the event this ordinance conflicts therewith; and providing that any person violating any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be fined in any sum not to exceed \$100.00 plus cost and each violation to be a separate offense; and declaring an emergency.

THIS WEEK IN Washington

WITH PRELIMINARIES out of the way, the second session of the 82nd congress set out to do some business, and the first action involved spending, with House passage of a 10 percent pay increase for all members of the armed forces and the reserves. Total will amount to some \$600 million. Passage was by an overwhelming vote of 269 to 89 and was bi-partisan. It is expected the Senate may also pass the measure.

Some of the so-called preliminaries included a joint-session address by Britain's Prime Minister Winston Churchill and the budget and economic message of the President, calling for expenditures in fiscal 1952 of approximately \$85 billion. While Mr. Truman asked for \$52 billion for military obligatory authority it was less than the \$60 billion in 1951.

What the President has done in his budget for military purposes is to spread the peak asked for by the military experts into another year, 1954, moving back the target date for maximum preparedness. The budget, for instance, still provides for the 143 wings in the air arm, but at a slower rate in that additional plant capacity required now in order to produce additional planes by 1954 will be deferred.

As a matter of practical economics, much of the money to be appropriated will go to pay for backlogs already placed on order, and extra money would not produce a single additional plane for the next year or so. As the economists see it, Mr. Truman, in cutting down on contractual authority, has weighed the danger of war in 1954 against the inflationary danger of increased expenses on the nation's economy and further accumulated deficit spending.

Even so, if the congress does not levy additional taxes, as the President asks and for which he re-proached congress, there will be a deficit in 1953 of some 14 billions of dollars. Even though the budget is the largest peace-time budget, there was a slash of approximately \$1 billion in domestic expenditures.

Insofar as the Truman-Churchill talks are concerned, among the most important agreements was the interchange of steel as against tin and aluminum. The agreement provides that this country furnish to the United Kingdom 1,108,000 net tons of steel, scrap and pigiron in 1952 in return for 15,000 tons of aluminum and 20,000 long tons of tin. Tin and aluminum are among the scarce essential metals needed in the production schedule.

Senator Estes Kefauver of Tennessee announced his candidacy for the presidency after a talk with President Truman, while on the Republican side of the fence, the preview of the GOP national convention held at San Francisco was considered by observers as driving a further wedge between the factions of the Republican party. As a result, the predictions are being freely made that GOP chairman Guy Gabrielson likely will resign immediately following the convention in Chicago in favor of a chairman more pleasing to the successful nominee.

Herschel D. Newsom, master of the National Grange has "re-examined" the more than 50-year-old policy of the Grange with regard to strict government control of railroads. Since 1876 the Grange has been a historic champion of strict federal regulation of the railroads. Newsom said: "Recent events have made it all too evident that railroad bankruptcy means eventual government ownership or government subsidy—neither solution is tolerable." He asked "modernization" of the transportation Act of 1940.

The American Farm Bureau Federation in a statement critical of some portions of the President's state-of-the-union message interpreted sections of the speech as an endorsement of the Brannan farm plan and declared the federation would oppose efforts to abandon the existing law, which it said, gave Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan enough authority to set price controls.

Mock Chicken Patties

1 lb. ground veal or lean pork
1 teaspoon salt
1/2 teaspoon pepper
1/2 cup rolled oats
1/2 cup Fat Milk

2 tablespoons flour
2 tablespoons hot fat
1 can condensed cream of chicken soup
1/2 cup water

Mix meat, salt, pepper, rolled oats and milk well. Dip hands in water, then shape meat mixture into 8 patties. Roll patties in flour. Brown slowly in skillet on both sides in hot fat. Mix soup and water, then pour into skillet. Cook very slowly for 20 minutes, or until soup is slightly thickened. Serve hot. Makes 4 servings.
