Large Crowd Honors Firemen At Nazareth Wednesday Night

Nazareth community's appreciation dinner for the Dimmitt Volunteer Fire Department Wednesday night did not have the originally scheduled program, but planners of the affair felt it was a whopping success anyway. Nazareth Sausage Supper workers did not have an accurate tabulation of costs and profit on the affair but it was estimated that about \$450 would be placed in the firemen's general fund. The firemen received all receipts at the supper less costs of the dance band, food and incidental expenses. The Nazareth community donated its time and facilities for the supper.

Probably the biggest point of the evening was simply the amount of people there. Slightly over 400 persons, the largest number on record, attended. This large attendance put the Firemen's Sausage Supper right at the top for attendance at any county function during the year. Said ticket committee chairman Wm. (Bill) Hochstein with a grin: "If our crowds keep growing we'll have to build on to our auditorium." The giant room at the community center was literally filled to capacity.

Cotton John Smith KGNC-TV and Mason King of the Amarillo Daily News were unable to attend due to an accident Wednesday suffered by Mr. Smith. Mr. Smith was to have been the principal speaker.

The night's activities were opened by John M. Slavik, superintendent of Nazareth Public Schools who made the welcoming address. He was followed by Father Peter Morsch who lauded the community feeling that made the supper possible and expressed his appreciation for the services performed by Dimmitt firemen and firemen in general.

There was no main speaker at the evening. Fire Chief Willie John Word introduced the Dimmitt firemen and expressed his appreciation to the Nazareth community for the supper and the other work being done by the community for the fire department. He also explained where the money went after it was turned over to the firemen. Among the things he listed were a two-way radio system, respirator for persons overcome by smoke or lack of oxygen, asbestos suits, and the firemen's boy scout work.

Mr. A. B. Slagle, editor of Southwestern Crop and Stock of Lubbock made a short talk praising the community spirit between the towns of the county that made such things possible.

Edwin "Gossett" Ramey wound up the night's activities with one of his well-known home-spun humorous talks that resulted in peals of laughter.

E. L. Hochstein was master of ceremonies for the evening and he had been in general charge of the activities.

B. M. Nelson Named New Manager Of County Chamber of Commerce

B. M. Nelson was appointed manager of the Castro County Chamber of Commerce Friday at a meeting of the Board of Directors. He succeeds Glen Youts who resigned last month.

Nelson will devote full time to the job of Chamber of Commerce manager and secretary. His plans, as stated to the board of directors, will be to build membership in the Chamber of Commerce, promote a vegetable program, build and hold trade in Castro County communities and maintain an aggressive road program. Nelson has been publisher of the Castro County News since 1943.

He will retain his title but general management of the newspaper will be by his two sons, Don and Bascom Nelson.

Plans were also made at the directors meeting for the election of new directors at a called meeting next week. On the nominating committee are T. A. Singer (chairman), Cecil Dennis, and Raymond Wilson. The election will be to fill the vacancies left by the expired terms of T. E. Harrison, G. P. Dyer, George Bradford and Russel Moran. Plans were also discussed for the Soils Fertility Day Banquet in February. Vice President Earl Brock presided at the meeting.

12 ACP Practices Approved for Castro County

\$25,000 Remains in Fund for Improvement Of Land, Resources

The Castro County ASC office this month received the eleven Agricultural Conservation Practices approved for Castro County. According to ASC director Charley Hill some 325 farmers have already signed up to participate and out of the \$109,000 allotted for Castro County about \$25,000 remains in the fund.

ASC personnel will continue to take applications for practices to be carried out within the next 90 days. Due to the largest number participating in recent years, the county committee has set a \$500 per farm limit for 1957.

The practices that were approved are:

- (A-2) Initial establishment of a permanent vegetative cover for soil protection or as a needed land-use adjustment.
- (C-1) Initial establishment of permanent sod waterways to dispose of excess water without causing erosion.
- (C-5) Constructing diversion terraces to intercept runoff and divert excess water to protected outlets.
- (C-12) Reorganizing farm irrigation system to conserve water and prevent erosion.
- (C-13) Leveling land for more efficient use of irrigation water and to prevent erosion.
- (C-15) Lining irrigation ditches to prevent erosion and loss of water by seepage.
- (D-1) Establishing legumes for summer protection from erosion.
- (D-2) Establishing legumes for summer protection from erosion.
- (E-1) Stubble mulching and to protect soil from wind and water erosion.
- (E-3a) Contour listing, contour chiseling, cross slope chiseling, pit cultivation, or listing or chiseling not on the contour for wind erosion control.
- (E-3c) Control of Bindweed (*Convolvulus Arvensis* and *C. Sepium*) as a necessary step in the control of wind erosion.

Don Howell won first place in the Hampshire division; first place in Other Breeds, and fourth place in lightweight Hampshire. Donald Curry won Reserve Champion Berkshire, second place heavy Berkshire and third place in Pen of Three. Danny Bruton won first and second in his lightweight Poles. Other boys winning and entering this show were Glen Odum, Ben Holcomb, Mike Bailey and Jerry Buchanan, whose animals won ribbons; and Jerry Cluck, Ronnie Elder, and Cecil Stehr who also had hogs entered.

There's One Way To Do Everything

It's a long, long way from jackrabbit country to moose country. Some might say that a Panhandle boy wouldn't know how to handle himself where there are trees, mountains, bear, and moose. But they're wrong.

Take the case of Pvt. David Behrends, Dimmitt High '51, Texas Tech '55.

Behrends arrived in Anchorage, Alaska, two weeks ago to help the US Army further its duties in our near-arctic territory.

March of Dimes Campaign In High Gear This Week

With just one week left in the annual March of Dimes drive, Castro County volunteers are setting the stage for a whirlwind campaign to replenish the county's almost exhausted polio funds.

The "Mother's March" will be staged by Dimmitt Jay-Cee-ettes Monday night beginning at 7 o'clock. Families wishing to donate to the March of Dimes should leave their porch lights on and they will be visited by a Jay-Cee-ette member. The Mother's March last year netted \$381.76.

Last week the county infantile paralysis fund had dropped to a low of \$336.01 according to treasurer Dr. James E. Wohlgenuth. This was augmented by \$276.15 received from the KPDA-TV Telethon Saturday night. This leaves a net balance of \$612.16—less than one-half the amount spent on the care of Castro County's polio victims last year. Since one-half of all donations are sent to the national headquarters for research and care of patients with no other financial resources.

Forty-six attend Retail Merchants' Credit Course

The Retail Merchant's Association course on "Retail Credit Procedures" is apparently highly successful with an enrollment of forty-six persons, according to manager H. R. Pickard.

"Everyone I talked to were enthusiastic and appreciative of the course," Mr. Pickard said. The ten-hour course is slated to finish Thursday night in the District court room. About one third of the county's businesses were represented.

The course was a daily conference directed by Heinz Ulrich, retail credit specialist from the University of Texas. The series began Monday night.

Grand Jury Has Six Indictments Here Monday

Hot Checks, Murder In Charges Brought For Court Decision

At the grand jury meeting Monday in the Castro County Court House, six indictments were returned. They were for assault, murder and bad checks.

Andrew Sanchez was indicted on two counts for assault with intent to murder Juan De Luna and for the killing of Bernardo Lopez. The affair allegedly took place November 12 on a country road near the Flag Community. De Luna was recently released from the hospital while Lopez died after several weeks. Bail was set for Sanchez at \$1,500.

V. R. Settle was indicted for "Defrauding by obtaining things of value with a worthless check." Bail was set at \$1,500. Settle allegedly gave a worthless check in the amount of \$392.70 in payment for 28,000 pounds of alfalfa hay.

Two indictments were made against O. T. Harris for "Forgery and knowingly passing a forged instrument." His bail was set at \$1,000 for each of two counts charging him with forging payroll checks.

Out on \$1,000 bail is Jean Hartwell, indicted for forgery. She allegedly passed a bad check to a Dimmitt store in the amount of \$98.42 on the Friona State Bank on December 3 of last year.

Short Overtime Costs Bobbies Game

The Dimmitt Bobbies apparently have lost their first conference game. It was Tuesday night with the Tulla Hornets with a score of 68-70.

The score was in dispute due to a misunderstanding concerning the duration of an overtime at the end of the game to play off a tied-up score. The Bobbies reportedly were under the impression the overtime was three minutes but it was stopped after two minutes and four seconds. Just as Doyle Smithson tossed in what would have been the tying two points, Bobbie Coach Johnny Ethridge said it was his understanding that the game officials had ruled Wednesday that Tulla won and that it would be official. If it goes into the books that the overtime period was two minutes and not three then the Bobbies will have a three won, one lost record at this stage of the conference season.

The victory-hungry Bobcats lost their game to the Tulla Hornets Tuesday night 47-70 with Harold Ratcliff high point man for Dimmitt with 16 points. Hone of Tulla scored 24. This leaves the Bobcats with a conference record of three lost, one won.

The second team also fell to Tulla Tuesday 46-62.

In Friday night's contest in Dimmitt with Muleshoe, the Bobbies broke a 19-19 halftime deadlock and went on to win 44-36. The Muleshoe Mules left the Bobcats trailing in the wake of a 65-43 score and the Mule B team dropped the Bobcat B team 65-54.

Miss Mary Helen Behrends will preside at the assemblage. She is chairman of the county 4-H council.

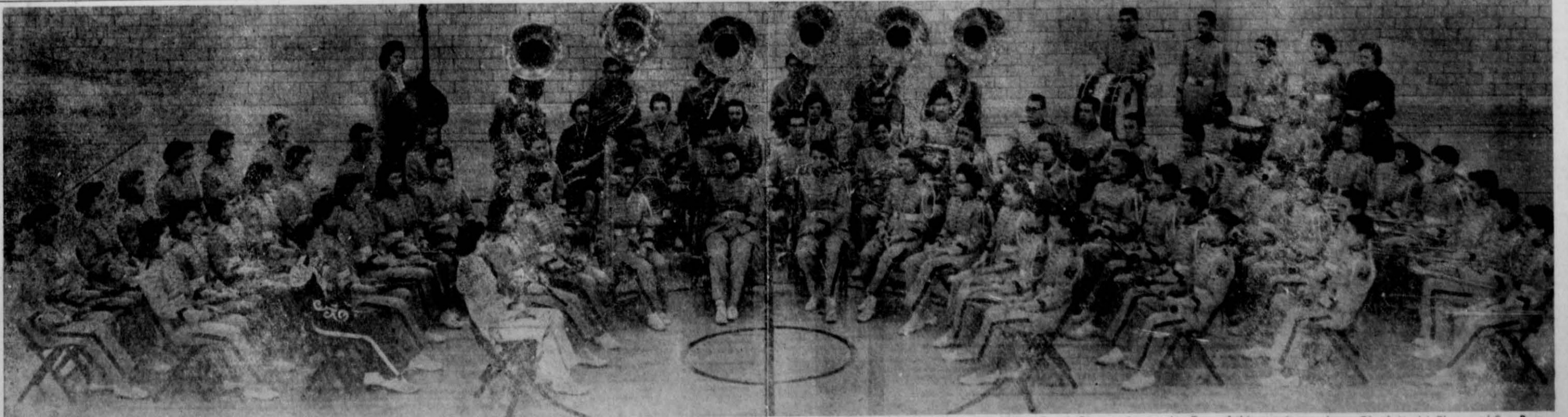
The invocation will be by Richard Hunter and the introduction

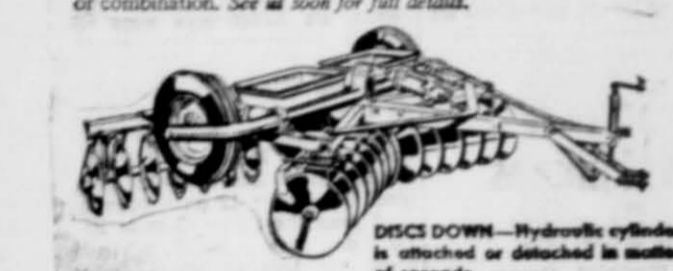

Warships added a realistic "softening-up" phase to the operation by shelling San Clemente Island. Carrier based planes, and planes of the 3rd Marine Aircraft Wing based at El Toro and Mojave, Calif., provided air support and cover for the task force.

The exercise was based on simulated situation in which southern California had been invaded and conquered by an aggressor nation.

Renner Foundation Sub-Station Gets Ready to Plant First Crop

Preparation for the 1957 crop year got under way at the High Plains Station of the Texas Research Foundation at Halfway last week. Clearing away old fences and plowing has been started. Construction of a pole shed for equipment so storage is underway. Sponsors of the project were delighted to see this long desired research in operation.

The 310 acre research farm at Halfway was purchased in two separate agreements. Harold Hinn purchased the 147 acre east half of the site and through the Harvest Queen Foundation, has given this acreage to the High Plains Station on a 25 year lease at \$1.00 a year for agricultural research. The purchase of the West half of the station, consisting of 153 acres has been underwritten

by Mr. George Green, President of the Green Machinery Co. of Plainview. The purchase price of this land is to be repaid to Mr. Green over the next 5 years by the Texas Research Foundation from funds subscribed to the High Plains Station by farmers and business concerns of the High Plains.

In addition to Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Head, and Dr. Johnny Davis, Associate Head; Reuben Cargill, Foreman; and Jesse Reed, Assistant Foreman, are on the job at the station. The office for the High Plains Station will remain at 704 1/2 West 5th Street in Plainview until additional funds are available for the construction of a headquarters building at Halfway.
