LAND, SEA, AIR ACTION IS REPORTED IN PACIFIC AS THE WARNING COMES OF JAP THREAT

Australian air minister says that the Japanese have facilities for 2,000 planes in the islands around Australia

Allied communiques today reported land, sea and air actions against Japanese bases as Australia army minister F. M. Forde warned that the enemy had facilities built for 2,000 planes in the Island are menacing Australia.

Forde, returning from a tour of Western Australia, said strategic plans were blasted on the assumption that sooner or later the Japanese will try to invade Australia and that troop in the western end of the nation was set to meet the attempt.

Gen. Douglas MasArthur's mmunique reported the probable sinking of an 8,000-ton Jap anese freighter off Kavieng, New Ireland, and said ground forces last week wiped out 20 Japanese holding an outpost only even miles from Salamaua, on the New Guinea coast.
