# Italians Resisting Nazi Near Rome

# **REDS ADVANCE** ON SOUTHERN AND CENTRAL BATTLEFRONTS

By Henry Shapiro

United Press Staff Correspondent MOSCOW, Sept. 11, (UP) -Triumphant Red armies speeded up their coordinated offensive on the Southern and Central fronts today to a pace that held promise for reaching the Dniepar river along possibly a 600-mile stretch before the Autumn rains turn battlefields to mud.

Advances of up to 25 miles and the capture of nearly 320 towns and villages in the past 24 hours were reported by the Soviet high command and German forces were retreating in some sectors as such a rate that they had no time to sow mines behind them.

German prisoners were being rounded up in groups of hundreds and wholesale lots of abanddaed equipment were found intact. Three hundred Germans were captured south and west of Stalino alone, while the day's booty included 37 tanks and 105




