Then there are those who put the major blame on CAA These critics maintain that the CAA's dilatory passion for perfection has led it into an attitude of insistence upon conductng all research on a somewhat theoretical plane.

Whatever the reasons for the delay, the fact remains that today bad flying conditions offer the airline passenger a choice of staying on the ground or taking to the air with a good chance of being killed. The result is that more and more airline customers are expressing a disinclination to do any flying in winter unless it s absolutely necessary.

The fear of accident is probably felt more often than it is expressed .But the usual reason given is perfectly valid Why plan a four-hour plane trip in preference to a 24 hour train ride when there is a possibility that the weather will close in for 24 or 48 hours?

The responsibility would seem to rest with the CAA, since blind-landing equipment will necessarily have to be standarized. It is certainly as much the CAA's job as it is the airlines' to try to prevent accidents and to minimize the inconvenience and loss of time and money which passengers suffer when planes are grounded.

WASHINGTON, D. C .- (NEA) -A new "omnibus bill" to incluse W all peacetime Army organization plans and policies is a major legislative objective which the War Department hopes it can attach from the 80th Congress.



Action on this measure may have to be delayed until decision call measure may have to be delayed until decision can be made on the fundamental question of whether or not the armed services are to be merged. Pending that, the War Department will have to ask for continuation of the Selective Service System to give it enough men for its assigned tasks at home and in zones of occupation overseas.

Again this year the Army lays great stress on the need for unification of the armed services. First decision to be made on this question is whether the Air Forces are to remain under the Army or be set up as a separate and equal branch with

be set up as a separate and equal branch will Army and Navy in a Department of National D.

Army and Navy in a Department of National Defense. Whichever way that goes, the case for unification will be presented as a needed means a eliminate duplication in military planning.

Four main fields where complete co-ordination must be achieve are pointed out. First, in industrial mobilization of raw material manufacture and procurement. Second, in agreement on missions of the armed services in support of American foreign policy. Third, in the creation of a central intelligence authority. Fourth, in the establishment of a central research organization. lishment of a central research organization.

THE War Department will go before the new Congress with a conplete bill of particulars on what it wants under this set-up. Or ganization of the Regular Army, National Guard, organized reserve

and special service units would be covered.

What the Army faces is a need for completely rebuilding its or Most of the basic assumptions of a year ago are no longer considered valid. A year ago it looked as if the peacetime Army could get by with a force of 1,070,000. Today that figure is set at 1,750,000.

The volunteer enlistment program adopted at the end of the war has not kept the Army at required strength either at home or abroad.

WITHIN five or six years the 12 million men who received military

WITHIN five or six years the 12 million men who received military training in the last war will have lost their usefulness as military reserves. That is why a start on a new Universal Military Training plan is being urged now, to build up a reserve of manpower that will take the place of the ex-Gls.

The War Department will make no recommendations of its own on what this U. M. T. service should be until the President's new nineman Commission on Military Training has had time to study the subject and make its report.

In general, however, this program is now analyzed as a need to give a year's training to the estimated 726,000 physically fit men who reach service age each year. Cost of the program is estimated at \$900 million a year, or just about what was spent in a day and a half of the war, the saving in time in case the country had to mobilize an Army of five million men or more is put at a full year. of five million men or more is put at a full year.
