Later, somewhat battered from a struggle with Ney, he explained: "I thought he said, 'You want to wrestle!'"

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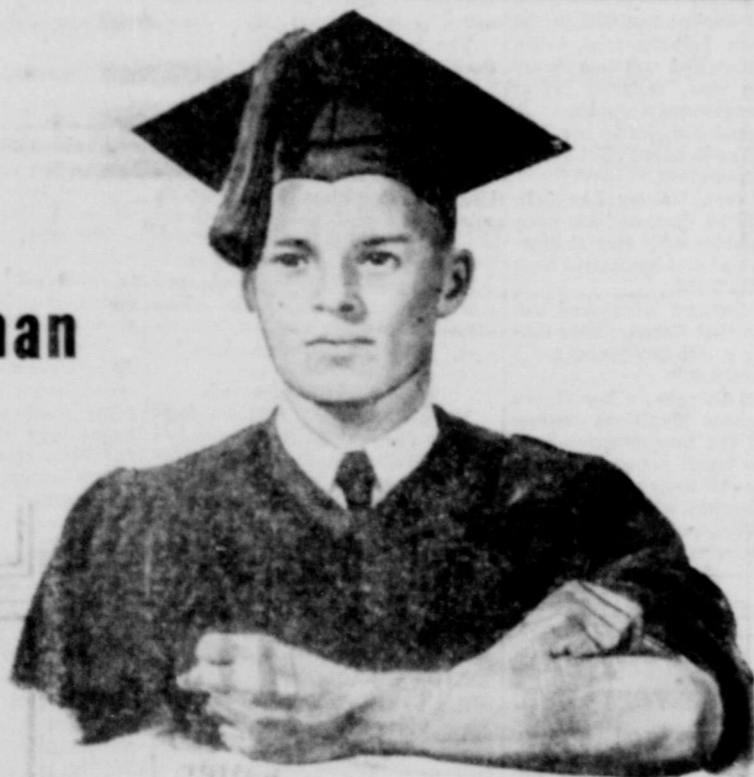

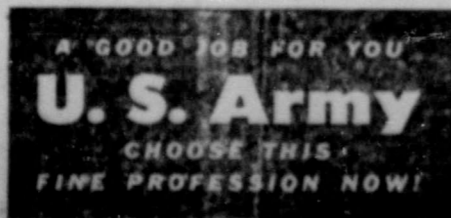

PITTSBURGH (UP)—Some may gain fame building a better mousetrap. Another way is to give away \$350,000.

Eight months after giving away his \$350,000 fortune, Charles A. Locke, Pittsburgh attorney has become a local institution and a national celebrity.

Last July, Locke decided it was "ridiculous" for him to have so much money. So he established, in honor of his mother, the Emma W. Locke Memorial Fund for the Pittsburgh YMCA, the University of Pittsburgh and the Protestant diocese of Pittsburgh.

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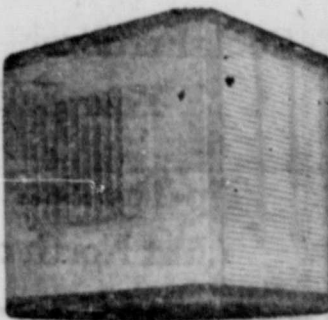
