Coffee and donuts will be served between 8 and 9 a. m. The tournament will begin at 9 a. m. with a shotgun start. The ladies will have a luncheon after play is completed. We want to urge all the lady golfers to come out and participate in this event, which will come around only once a year. The event will be a partnership tournament. We would like to see good representation from the ladies of our club. As I stated in this column last week, competition is the best way to sharpen your golf game.

Speaking of lady golfers, I just read a little article about Mickey Wright, Miss Wright (no relation by the way) is in my opinion the greatest woman golfer of all time. She has won 80 Ladies Professional Golf Association tournaments and prize money totaling over \$250,000. Although Mickey does not play nearly as many tournaments as in the past, she is still always a constant threat.

The Memorial Day weekend Handicap Golf Tournament this last weekend was won by Kenneth McPherson, who played some very fine golf on a rather windy course. Kenneth shot gross scores of 82 and 78, which was excellent golf under the playing conditions. Other places in the event went to Bo Pruitt, second place; Jerry Sweet, Bob McNeil and Cliff Burfield tied for third place.

How about that 61 shot by Steve Reid in the Memphis Open last week. Fantastic golf. This round consisted of 9 birdies and no bogeys. Think about it. He birdied half of the holes on an 18-hole round of golf. But even with that amazing round he finished four shots behind the eventual winner, Dave Hill. Hill played some amazing golf himself shooting 67-67-66-63 for a 265 total. This will more than likely be the lowest 72-hole score of the year on the PGA tour. Also Abilene pro Charles Coody fared very well in this tournament with scores of 66-67-67 for 268, only three shots out of first place and good for \$8,850 prize money.

Tony Conigliaro of the Boston Red Sox, appears destined to become this year's comeback baseball player of the year. In 1967 Tony was hit in the eye with a pitch thrown by Jack Hamilton of the California Angels, putting him out for the rest of the season. Last year when he tried to return, he could not see well enough and was told by doctors that he would never play again. But he has now fully recovered and so far this year is hitting close to 300, has 10 home runs and has close to 40 runs batted in. Not much doubt that he should walk away with the award.

Course records are falling left and right at Shady Oaks. This past week Bobby Black fired a red hot 33-37 for a two under par 70 for a new 9 and 18 hole record at Shady Oaks. It must come in bunches because not one hour later, I shot 33 myself to tie his 9-hole record. Mrs. John Wright Jr., shot 40-40-80 for a new ladies record, eclipsing her old mark of 82. The men's course record for 18 holes had been held by Travis Bruton of Abilene at 71 for only about a week. Black held the old 9-hole record of 34.

A swine short course for adult farmers will be held June 16-19 under the sponsorship of the Baird High School Vocational Agriculture Dept., according to Jon Tate, Superintendent and Dick Vestal, Teacher of VA.

Mr. Bob Jacobs, swine specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the Department of Animal Husbandry at Texas A&M, will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at A&M University.

Mr. Jacobs hold a B. S. Degree in Agricultural Education from East Texas State University, and has done some graduate work toward his M.S. degree at Texas A&M. He has been a Duroc and Yorkshire breeder and commercial feeder for Paradise Swine Co., Vernon, Texas. He was a teacher of Vocational Agriculture for 13½ years and Assistant and Associate County Agent for three years.

Arrangements for the adult education short course in swine husbandry and in other fields are made through Mr. Ralph Moser's office.

The short course is scheduled to begin at 8:30 p. m. June 16 in the Baird Vocational Agriculture Building. Others meetings in the series of four will be held June 17, 18, 19. During the dates the short course is in progress, Mr. Jacobs will be available to assist students with individual problems and to provide on the farm instruction, according to Mr. Vestal.

Farmers interested in attending the short course should write or call the superintendent of schools, Mr. Jon Tate, or the Voc. Ag. teacher, Dick Vestal. An entry fee of \$2.00 will be charged. Swine Production Short Course Certificates are to be presented to each student who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Jacobs states that the short course will be adjusted to wishes and interests of farmers enrolled, but that he expects to cover such subjects as selecting and breeding, feeding and feeding requirements, management, disease and parasites, housing and equipment, and marketing.

## Clyde School Shows Increase In Students, Daily Attendance

Membership and attendance figures for Clyde Public Schools for the 1968-69 school year were released this week by school officials. The final report filed with the Texas Education Agency showed an increase in closing membership and in average daily attendance over those of one year ago. Both the closing membership and the average daily attendance were the third

largest in the history of Clyde Schools. Both figures were higher in 1965-66 and in 1966-67 than in 1968-1969.

Membership for the 1968-69 closing day was 834 pupils. The average daily attendance for 1968-69 year was 803. In 1965-66 there figures were 872 and 832; and in 1966-67 they were 840 and 820. Last year's figures were 801 and 788.

Estimates now are for the 1969-70 enrollment to be slightly lower than the year just past due to an expected decrease in first grade enrollment.

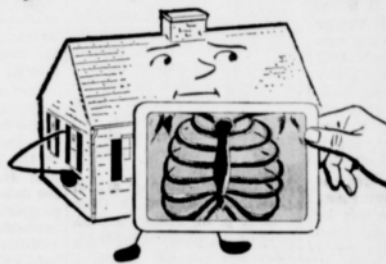

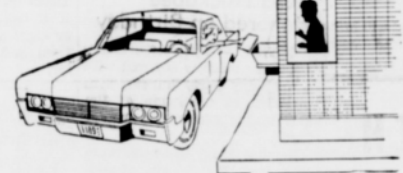

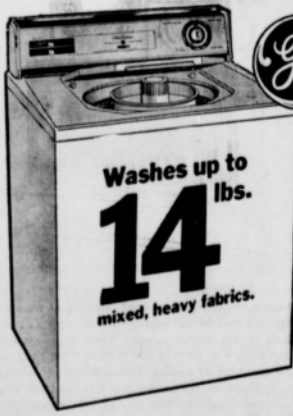

### G. I.'s Reminded Of Educational Program

June 1 was the third anniversary of the post-Korean GI Bill education and training program.

During the past three years, more than 1,148,000 veterans and 83,000 service-men nationwide entered training under this program, Jack Coker, Manager of the Waco Veterans Administration Regional Office, said today.

In Texas, more than 68,739 veterans and servicemen entered training during the past three years, some 43,390 of which went to college and 23,383 entered schools below the college level.

There were also 1966 veterans entered as on-the-job trainees since October 1, 1967, when this benefit went into effect.

This spring more than 33,454 veterans in Texas were enrolled in training. This is an all-time high for the three year old post-Korean GI Bill. Coker said. More than 21,770 were enrolled in institutions of higher learning.

To be eligible for post-Korean GI Bill education and training from VA, the veteran must have had at least 181 days of service, part of which was after January 31, 1955, and have received an other than dishonorable discharge, Coker said.

A recent change gives a veteran one and one half months of educational entitlement for each month of service with a maximum of 36 months entitlement. Veterans eligible under two or more VA programs may have a total entitlement of 48 months education.

Veterans who have not completed high school may receive full VA educational assistance while earning their high school diploma without having any of this time charged to their maximum entitlement to college training, Coker emphasized.

He reminded post-Korean and Vietnam era veterans in Texas that they must complete their training by May 31, 1974, or eight years after separation from service, whichever is later.

Students received 36 hours of clinical training with different agencies, and 108 hours of total training in the 12-week course. Funds for the class are provided by the Manpower Development Training Act.

A graduate of St. Luke's Hospital School of Nursing in St. Louis, Mo., Mrs. Cathcart has recently completed a two-week course on Coronary Care for Nurses. It was held at Harris Hospital in Fort Worth, and was co-sponsored by Harris, St. Joseph and All Saints Hospitals.

## PROCEDURE CHANGED FOR TRANSFERRING STUDENTS

The Sixty-First Legislature which adjourned in Austin this week, has recently passed and the Governor has signed a bill changing the procedure by which parents transfer their children from one school district to another. Senate Bill No. 435 provides that the parents now make application for transfer to the school which the children will attend. The application to the County Superintendent is no longer necessary.

The new Act provides that any child, other than a high school graduate, who is at least six years of age and under 21 years of age at the beginning of any scholastic year may transfer from his school district of residence to another Texas school district, provided that both the receiving district and the parent, guardian or person having lawful control of the child jointly agree in writing to the transfer.

All parents of children who transfer from the district of their residence are urged to contact the superintendent of the receiving district as soon as possible and make the application for transfer for the 1969-70 school year.
